Proposed Motion:

Receive input from the public related to the Community Development Block Grant available from HUD regarding the community needs and project ideas for the unincorporated areas of Travis County for Program Year 2011 and funding priorities for Program Years 2011-2013.

Summary and Staff Recommendations:

Annually, HUD requires each grantee to develop an Action Plan specifying the activities to be undertaken with CDBG funds. For the program year 2011 (October 1, 2011 through September 30, 2012), Travis County is expected to receive an estimated \$942,749 in CDBG funds. Travis County must determine how the funds will be allocated, and to do so CDBG staff will work with the public, Travis County departments, and social service agencies to receive input on the community needs and proposed projects.

In addition, the CDBG program will also collect "Consolidated Planning" information from the public to determine priorities for CDBG funding for Program Years 2011-2013 (October 2011 to September 2014).

Specifically, to be compliant with 24 Congressional Federal Regulation (CFR) Part 91.105 and the approved Travis County Citizen Participation Plan (CPP), Travis County must hold a public hearing at the Travis County Commissioners Court, and one public hearing in each of the four County precincts. This is the first public hearing of this series.

During these hearings the public will have an opportunity to learn the objective, eligible activities, available funds, and CDBG project history among other areas of the grant. This information is available in through power point presentations (in English and Spanish).

The dollar amount for funding for PY11 is an estimate. The federal budget has not been set and at this point in time, CDBG is expecting a reduction in funds of at least 7%, if not more.

Background:

On Tuesday, January 18, 2011, the Travis County Commissioners Court approved the public hearing dates and advertisements for the spring public hearings. Notice of the public hearings was provided in newspapers of general circulation, through postal and electronic mailings, on the County's website, Facebook, Twitter and the seven Travis County Community Centers.

Under the provisions of Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (42 USC 5301), the Federal government through the U.S Department of Housing and Community Development (HUD) sponsors the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) - a program that provides annual grants to cities and counties to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment and by expanding economic opportunities for low and moderate income persons.





ORDER LIFTING OUTDOOR BURNING BAN

WHEREAS, Section 352.081 of the Local Government Code provides that the commissioners court of a county by order may prohibit outdoor burning in the unincorporated area of the county if the commissioners court makes a finding that circumstances present in the unincorporated area create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and,

WHEREAS, Section 352.081of the Local Government Code further provides that an order prohibiting outdoor burning shall expire on the date that a determination is made by the commissioners court that the circumstances which necessitated the order no longer exist; and,

WHEREAS, on February 8, 2011, the Travis County Commissioners Court made a finding that circumstances present in the unincorporated area of Travis County created a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning and approved an Order Prohibiting Outdoor Burning in the unincorporated area of Travis County; and,

WHEREAS, the Travis County Commissioners Court has determined that conditions in the unincorporated area of Travis County have improved as a result of recent rainfall and that the circumstances which necessitated the Order Prohibiting Outdoor Burning no longer exist;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Travis County Commissioners Court hereby LIFTS its Order of February 8, 2011, Prohibiting Outdoor Burning in the unincorporated areas of Travis County. Although conditions in the unincorporated area of Travis County have improved, the Commissioners Court urge all persons to use extreme caution and to obey all laws when burning outdoors.

Summary & Staff Recommendation:

The CTECC program is an interlocal cooperative effort involving partners from the City of Austin, Texas Department of Transportation, Capital Metro, and Travis County. All four entities, along with citizens of central Texas currently benefit from ongoing operations at CTECC. This facility houses regional public safety/service systems related to two-way radio communications, computer-aided dispatch, 9-1-1, mobile data, joint emergency operations, and intelligent transportation. County emergency management activities presently operate out of CTECC, as do Sheriff dispatch functions.

The Travis County Emergency Services ("TCES") recommendation is to approve the contract modification. Given that this agreement automatically renews annually, the requested action will be an internal administrative change for informational purposes and to confirm contractual spending authority for Travis County's portion of the shared program budget this fiscal year.

County representatives on the Operating and Governing Boards, the CTECC General Manager, and other county resource staff support the recommendation.

Commissioners Court previously approved a similar item as Modification No. 7 for FY-2010.

There appear to be no issues or concerns with approving the requested action, as this is a routine and expected item that typically occurs in the December/January time frame each year.

Budgetary Impact:

The necessary funding of \$1,732,926 for Travis County's FY-2011 CTECC O&M share is a budgeted expense included in the 001-4705-579-5004 and 001-4705-823-5004 accounts for TCES.

Travis County's approved FY-2010 CTECC O&M budget was \$1,581,166. Therefore, the FY-2011 obligation is an approximate increase of 9% over last year.

Travis County's FY-2011 level, however, is about the same as the FY-2009 obligation.

APPROVE MODIFICATION NUMBER SEVEN TO AUTOMATIC-RENEWAL CONTRACT IL040167LC, INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY OF AUSTIN FOR THE OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE REGIONAL RADIO SYSTEM ("RRS") IN FY-2011. (TCES)

Summary & Staff Recommendation:

The RRS program is a cooperative effort involving partners from the City of Austin, University of Texas at Austin, Austin Independent School District, Travis County, and the State of Texas. This radio system enables public safety/service agencies to communicate and cooperate with each other by allowing for direct access to information and the beneficial exchange of it.

The Travis County Emergency Services ("TCES") recommendation is to approve the contract modification. Given that this agreement automatically renews annually, the requested action will be an internal administrative change for informational purposes and to confirm contractual spending authority for Travis County's portion of the shared program budget this fiscal year.

County representatives on the Operating and Governing Boards, the RRS Program Manager, and other county resource staff support the recommendation.

Commissioners Court previously approved a similar item as Modification No. 6 for FY-2010.

There appear to be no issues or concerns with approving the requested action, as this is a routine and expected item that typically occurs in the December/January time frame each year.

Budgetary Impact:

The necessary funding of \$952,850 for Travis County's FY-2011 RRS O&M share is a budgeted expense included in the 001-4705-579-5001 account for TCES.

Travis County's approved FY-2010 RRS O&M budget was \$952,857. Therefore, the FY-2011 obligation is about the same as last year.

AGREEMENT FOR CONSTRUCTION SERVICES

CONTRACT NO. 10K00260JE, IFB NO. B100260-JE

This Agreement for Construction Services (the "Construction Contract") is entered into by and between Travis County, Texas, a political subdivision of the State of Texas (the "Owner"), and <u>Thermal Mechanical Contractors, Inc.</u> (the "Contractor").

WHEREAS, the Owner desires to enter into the Construction Contract for the construction of <u>TCJ HVAC for</u> <u>Stairwells, TCSO #209246</u> (the "Project") in accordance with the provisions of the state statutes and in conformance with the Notice to Proceed (as issued by the Travis County Purchasing Agent), the Contractor's Bid (including the Bidding Documents, the Bid Form, any appendices to the Specifications addressing additional technical or other Project requirements, and any Addenda or Amendments thereto), General Conditions, Supplementary Conditions, and the Specifications, which term shall include the Drawings and/or Plans marked <u>"TCJ HVAC for Stairwells, TCSO #209246"</u> Travis County, Texas, <u>IFB Number</u> B100260-JE; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor has been engaged in and does comparable work and represents that it is fully equipped, competent and capable of performing the above-desired work, and desires to perform such work in accordance with the provisions of the Construction Contract; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions stated herein, the Owner and the Contractor agree as follows:

- ARTICLE 1.1 In addition to such there terms as may be specifically det ed herein, the capital ted terms referenced herein shall have the meanings as there is such terms and General Conditions.
- 1.2 The written notice to proceed as issued by the Travis County Purchasing Agent (the "Notice to Proceed"), the Contractor's Bid as accepted by the Travis County Commissioners Court, the General Conditions, the Supplementary Conditions, the Specifications (which term shall include the Drawings and Plans marked <u>"TCJ HVAC for Stairwells, TCSO #209246"</u> Travis County, Texas, <u>IFB Number 100260-JE</u>, any appendices to the Specifications addressing additional technical or other Project requirements, and all addenda issued by the Architect/Engineer or the Travis County Purchasing Agent prior to the execution of this Construction Contract are incorporated in the Construction Contract as if set out at length.
- 1.3 The Contractor agrees to perform the work described in this Construction Contract and any and all documents incorporated therein (the "Work"). The Contractor shall commence the Work upon issuance of the Notice to Proceed, and subject to authorized adjustments, shall achieve substantial completion of the Work within <u>120</u> <u>Calendar Days of such issuance</u> (the "Substantial Completion Date"). All time limits stated in the Construction Contract, and/or the Contract Documents are of the essence. The Substantial Completion Date will not be modified, extended, or otherwise revised except because of rain or other adverse weather conditions or as expressly provided in the Construction Contract documents, and the Contractor acknowledges that it may be required to work on weekends or holidays in order to achieve substantial completion by the Substantial Completion Date.
- 1.4 If the Contractor fails to achieve substantial completion of the Work by the Substantial Completion Date, the Contractor, by execution of this Construction Contract, specifically acknowledges that the Owner will sustain damages for each day the Work extends beyond the Substantial Completion Date. Because of the impracticality and extreme difficulty of fixing and ascertaining the Owner's actual damages, the Contractor agrees <u>\$450.00 per calendar day</u> shall be retained by the Owner from any amounts due the Contractor for every day that the Contractor's performance of the Work extends beyond the Substantial Completion Date.

ARTICLE II

- 2.1 For and in consideration of the Contractor's performance of the Work, the Owner shall pay the Contractor, in the manner provided for in Article 9 of the General Conditions, the total sum of <u>\$93,100.00</u> (the "Contract Sum"). The Contract Sum is comprised of (i) <u>\$66,036.00</u> for materials to be incorporated into the Project or completely consumed at the job site and services required by or integral to the performance of this Construction Contract and (ii) <u>\$27,064.00</u> for all other charges, including the cost of other services, overhead, and materials which do not become part of the finished project or are reusable. This division of the Contract Sum is made to reflect sales tax purposes only. Invoices and payments need not reflect this division. However, Contractor shall maintain internal records to verify. Contractor shall make these records available upon request of the Travis County Auditor.
- 2.2 If at any time during the performance of this Construction Contract the Travis County Commissioners Court (i) fails to provide funding for this Construction Contract during the following fiscal year of Travis County, Texas, (ii) does not adopt a budget for expenditures, or (iii) is able only to partially fund the expenditures required by this Construction Contract, then the Owner may, upon giving the Contractor written notice of such failure to fund and termination, terminate this Construction Contract, or a part thereof, without any further liability, effective thirty (30) days after the Owner notifies the Contractor in writing of such failure to fund and termination. The Owner shall pay the Contractor for any portion of the Work completed up to the effective date. The Contractor shall have no recourse as to sums beyond those for any portion of the Work performed up to the effective date, including without limitation any recovery for lost profits anticipated to be made hereunder.
- 2.3 This Construction Contract may be amended only by a Travis County construction "Change Order" form signed by the Travis County Sheriff's Office Department (TCSO), the Contractor, and necessary representatives designated by the Owner.
- 2.4 The Owner may te inate this Const if it ction Contra found the he C ract offered or gave gratuities to any employee of t Owner with the tent to influe e th ourchasi ny manner, either before or proces after the award of is Construction Court shall determine if the ntract. The avis -commissione he process Contractor used gr uities to inf etermined and the O enc f so her terminates this Construction Contract, the Owne all be Itled to DUISU remedies against th le sar Contractor as it could pursue if this Construction Contract were breached by the Contractor, and (ii) collect exemplary damages in an amount determined by the Travis County Commissioners Court which shall be not less than three nor more than ten times the amount given to any officer or employee of the Owner. The rights and remedies in this clause shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law.
- 2.5 The Contractor represents and warrants that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Construction Contract upon an understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bonafide employees and established commercial selling agencies maintained by the Contractor to secure business. If the Contractor breaches this warranty, then the Owner shall have the right to terminate this Construction Contract without liability, or in its discretion to deduct from the amount due to the Contractor from the Owner, or otherwise recover, the full amount of commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.
- 2.6 No action or failure to act by the Owner or the Contractor shall constitute a waiver of any right or duty afforded either of them under this Construction Contract, nor shall any such action or failure to act constitute an approval of or acquiescence in any breach thereunder, except as may be specifically agreed in writing.

The effective date of this Construction Contract shall for all purposes be the date of the execution of the last to sign, whether the Owner or the Contractor.



AGREEMENT FOR CONSTRUCTION SERVICES

CONTRACT NO. 11K00079JT; IFB NO. B110079-JT

This Agreement for Construction Services (the "Construction Contract") is entered into by and between Travis County, Texas, a political subdivision of the State of Texas (the "Owner"), and <u>AAR, Inc.</u> (the "Contractor").

WHEREAS, the Owner desires to enter into the Construction Contract for the construction of <u>5335 Airport</u> <u>Boulevard Building Asbestos Abatement and Demolition</u> (the "Project") in accordance with the provisions of the state statutes and in conformance with the Notice to Proceed (as issued by the Travis County Purchasing Agent), the Contractor's Bid (including the Bidding Documents, the Bid Form, any appendices to the Specifications addressing additional technical or other Project requirements, and any Addenda or Amendments thereto), General Conditions, Supplementary Conditions, and the Specifications, which term shall include the Drawings and/or Plans marked <u>5335</u> <u>Airport Boulevard Building Asbestos Abatement and Demolition</u>, Travis County Texas, IFB No. <u>B110079-JT</u>; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor has been engaged in and does comparable work and represents that it is fully equipped, competent and capable of performing the above-desired work, and desires to perform such work in accordance with the provisions of the Construction Contract; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions stated herein, the Owner and the Contractor agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

- 1.1 In addition to such other terms as may be specifically defined herein, the capitalized terms referenced herein shall have the meanings ascribed to such terms in the General Conditions.
- 1.2 The written notice to proceed as issued by the Travis County Purchasing Agent (the "Notice to Proceed"), the Contractor's Bid as accepted by the Travis County Commissioners Court, the General Conditions, the Supplementary Conditions, the Specifications (which term shall include the Drawings and Plans marked <u>5335</u> <u>Airport Boulevard Building Asbestos Abatement and Demolition</u>, Travis County Texas, IFB No. <u>B110079-JT</u>, any appendices to the Specifications addressing additional technical or other Project requirements, and all addenda issued by the Architect/Engineer or the Travis County Purchasing Agent prior to the execution of this Construction Contract are incorporated in the Construction Contract as if set out at length.
- 1.3 The Contractor agrees to perform the work described in this Construction Contract and any and all documents incorporated therein (the "Work"). The Contractor shall commence the Work upon issuance of the Notice to Proceed, and subject to authorized adjustments, shall achieve substantial completion of the Work within <u>90</u> <u>calendar days of such issuance</u> (the "Substantial Completion Date"). All time limits stated in the Construction Contract, and/or the Contract Documents are of the essence. The Substantial Completion Date will not be modified, extended, or otherwise revised except because of rain or other adverse weather conditions or as expressly provided in the Construction Contract documents, and the Contractor acknowledges that it may be required to work on weekends or holidays in order to achieve substantial completion Date.
- 1.4 If the Contractor fails to achieve substantial completion of the Work by the Substantial Completion Date, the Contractor, by execution of this Construction Contract, specifically acknowledges that the Owner will sustain damages for each day the Work extends beyond the Substantial Completion Date. Because of the impracticality and extreme difficulty of fixing and ascertaining the Owner's actual damages, the Contractor agrees <u>\$250 per calendar day</u> shall be retained by the Owner from any amounts due the Contractor for every day that the Contractor's performance of the Work extends beyond the Substantial Completion Date.



ARTICLE II

- 2.1 For and in consideration of the Contractor's performance of the Work, the Owner shall pay the Contractor, in the manner provided for in Article 9 of the General Conditions, the total sum of <u>\$83,200.00</u> (the "Contract Sum") (\$61,000.00 Base Bid and \$22,200.00 Add Alternate No. 1). The Contract Sum is comprised of (i) <u>\$12,460.00</u> for materials to be incorporated into the Project or completely consumed at the job site and services required by or integral to the performance of this Construction Contract and (ii) <u>\$70,720.00</u> for all other charges, including the cost of other services, overhead, and materials which do not become part of the finished project or are reusable. This division of the Contract Sum is made to reflect sales tax purposes only. Invoices and payments need not reflect this division. However, Contractor shall maintain internal records to verify. Contractor shall make these records available upon request of the Travis County Auditor.
- 2.2 If at any time during the performance of this Construction Contract the Travis County Commissioners Court (i) fails to provide funding for this Construction Contract during the following fiscal year of Travis County, Texas, (ii) does not adopt a budget for expenditures, or (iii) is able only to partially fund the expenditures required by this Construction Contract, then the Owner may, upon giving the Contractor written notice of such failure to fund and termination, terminate this Construction Contract, or a part thereof, without any further liability, effective thirty (30) days after the Owner notifies the Contractor in writing of such failure to fund and termination. The Owner shall pay the Contractor for any portion of the Work completed up to the effective date. The Contractor shall have no recourse as to sums beyond those for any portion of the Work performed up to the effective date, including without limitation any recovery for lost profits anticipated to be made hereunder.
- 2.3 This Construction Contract may be amended only by a Travis County construction "Change Order" form signed by the Travis County Facilities Management Department (TCFMD), the Contractor, the Purchasing Agent, and the Commissioners Court, as necessary.
- 2.4 The Owner may terminate this Construction Contract if it is found that the Contractor offered or gave gratuities to any employee of the Owner with the intent to influence the purchasing process in any manner, either before or after the award of this Construction Contract. The Travis County Commissioners Court shall determine if the Contractor used gratuities to influence the process. If so determined and the Owner terminates this Construction Contract, the Owner shall be entitled to (i) pursue the same remedies against the Contractor as it could pursue if this Construction Contract were breached by the Contractor, and (ii) collect exemplary damages in an amount determined by the Travis County Commissioners Court which shall be not less than three nor more than ten times the amount given to any officer or employee of the Owner. The rights and remedies in this clause shall not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law.
- 2.5 The Contractor represents and warrants that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Construction Contract upon an understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bonafide employees and established commercial selling agencies maintained by the Contractor to secure business. If the Contractor breaches this warranty, then the Owner shall have the right to terminate this Construction Contract without liability, or in its discretion to deduct from the amount due to the Contractor from the Owner, or otherwise recover, the full amount of commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.
- 2.6 No action or failure to act by the Owner or the Contractor shall constitute a waiver of any right or duty afforded either of them under this Construction Contract, nor shall any such action or failure to act constitute an approval of or acquiescence in any breach thereunder, except as may be specifically agreed in writing.



The effective date of this Construction Contract shall for all purposes be the date of the execution of the last to sign, whether the Owner or the Contractor.

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

SECTION 1 – Purpose and Legal Authority

- 1.1 This contract sets forth the obligations of the Texas Workforce Commission (Agency) and the Recipient identified on the cover page, hereinafter collectively referred to as "the Parties," pursuant to Texas Labor Code §§ 301.061 and 302.002(c) with respect to Agency's release of proprietary information to Recipient. The obligations of the Parties are set forth in detail in **Attachment A** which is made a part hereof.
- 1.2 Subject to certain limitations, the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Texas Government Code, Chapter 791, authorizes Recipient to enter into contracts for services with governmental entities, including state agencies.

SECTION 2 – Term, Amendments, and Termination

- 2.1 This contract shall be effective from the Begin Date to the End Date specified on the cover page.
- 2.2 Either party may suspend or terminate this contract at any time, on written notice to the other party specifying a termination date at least thirty (30) calendar days after the date of the notice. Such termination shall not relieve Recipient of the obligation to pay for all services prior to such termination at the rates provided herein, nor shall it entitle Recipient to any refund of the yearly subscription fee for online access to Agency records.
- 2.3 In the event of an emergency, Agency may suspend Recipient's online access without advance notice, and will reinstate access at the earliest practical time.
- 2.4 Agency may suspend all services without notice if Agency suspects a violation of the security provisions in **Attachment A**, Section 3. Services will remain suspended until Agency has fully investigated any suspected security violations and is satisfied that resumption of service will not result in security breaches. In the event of an extended suspension of service, Agency will notify Recipient as soon as possible.
- 2.5 Termination of this contract will not end Recipient's responsibility to protect the confidentiality of all Information obtained from Agency pursuant to this contract and remaining in Recipient's custody or control.

SECTION 3 – Consideration

- 3.1 Recipient agrees to pay Agency for services described in Attachment A.
- 3.2 Notwithstanding the rates set forth in **Attachment A**, Agency may unilaterally revise rates upon written notice to Recipient of at least thirty (30) calendar days.

SECTION 4 - Protecting the Confidentiality of Records

- 4.1 "Information" means any records obtained by Recipient from Agency, including records and data compilations provided orally, electronically, or on paper. Information shall also include records obtained by Recipient through online access to Agency electronic files. Recipient shall ensure that Information is used only for purposes authorized by law and consistent with this contract. Use of Information shall be subject to the provisions of this contract even if the Information is converted by Recipient into another format or medium or incorporated in any manner into Recipient's records, files, or data compilations.
- 4.2 Recipient shall limit access to Information to its officers and employees who need access to the Information to achieve the purpose listed in **Attachment A**, Section 1. Recipient shall not transfer the authority or ability to access or maintain Information under this contract to any other person or entity.
- 4.3 Recipient shall create and maintain a system to store and process Information, including that maintained in electronic format, such as magnetic tapes or discs, in such a way that unauthorized persons cannot obtain Information by any means. Recipient shall ensure that such system is sufficient to allow an audit of compliance with the requirements of this contract. Recipient shall store Information in a place physically secure from access by unauthorized persons.
- 4.4 Recipient shall comply with 20 Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.) § 603.9, incorporated herein by reference, regarding safeguarding Information and insuring its confidentiality. A copy of 20 C.F.R. § 603.9 is attached as Attachment A1.
- 4.5 Recipient shall instruct all personnel having access to Information about all confidentiality requirements including the requirements of 20 C.F.R. Part 603 as well as the sanctions specified in this contract and under state and federal law for unauthorized disclosure of Information. Recipient acknowledges that all personnel who will have access to Agency Information have been instructed in accordance with the terms of this contract.
- 4.6 Recipient shall notify Agency immediately if a security violation of this contract is detected, or if Recipient suspects that the security or integrity of Information or any Agency data has been or may be compromised in any way.
- 4.7 Recipient shall dispose of Information and any copies thereof after the purpose set out in Attachment A, Section 1, is achieved, except for Information possessed by any court. Disposal means return of Information to Agency or destruction of Information, as directed by Agency. Disposal includes deletion of personal identifiers in lieu of destruction. In any case, Recipient shall dispose of all Information within thirty (30) calendar days after the termination or expiration of this contract.

- 4.8 Texas Labor Code § 301.085 provides that unemployment compensation information is not public information for purposes of the Public Information Act, Texas Government Code, Chapter 552. Recipient shall not release any Information in response to a request made under the Public Information Act or to a request made under any other law, regulation, or ordinance addressing public access to government records. Recipient shall inform Agency within twenty-four (24) hours of receipt by Recipient of service of a subpoena or citation in any action seeking access to Information.
- 4.9 Recipient shall notify Agency within twenty-four (24) hours of the receipt of any subpoena, other judicial request, or request for appearance for testimony upon any matter concerning Information.

SECTION 5 – Inspection and Audit

- 5.1 Recipient shall fully cooperate with any on-site inspections and monitoring activities of Agency. So that Agency may audit Recipient's compliance with the requirements of state and federal law and this contract, Recipient shall permit Agency access to all sites containing Information, including Information maintained electronically, and to all workplaces used by personnel who have access to Information.
- 5.2 Recipient shall keep and maintain full, true, and complete and accurate records as necessary to fully disclose to Agency, the Texas State Auditor's Office, the United States government, and their authorized representatives sufficient information to determine compliance with this contract.

SECTION 6 - Breach of Agreement, Default, and Remedies

If Recipient or any official, employee, or agent of Recipient fails to comply with any provision of this contract, including timely payment of Agency's invoices, Agency may suspend services to Recipient (including any Information disclosure being processed) until Agency is satisfied that corrective action has been taken to assure that there will be no future breach. In the absence of prompt and satisfactory corrective action to cure default and assure future compliance with contract requirements, this contract shall be cancelled and Recipient shall surrender to Agency all Information and copies thereof that have not previously been returned to Agency, and any other Information relevant to this contract, which was obtained under this contract. Cancellation of this contract shall not limit Agency from pursuing penalties under state and federal law for the unauthorized disclosure of confidential Information. Agency shall undertake any other action under this contract, or under any law of the State or of the United States, to enforce this contract, secure satisfactory corrective action, and return of the Information. Agency shall take other remedial actions permitted under state or federal law to enforce this contract and 20 C.F.R. Part 603 including seeking damages, penalties, and restitution for all costs incurred by Agency in enforcing this contract and responding to Recipient's breach.

SECTION 7 – Miscellaneous

7.1 This contract shall be construed, interpreted, and applied in accordance with the laws of Texas, excluding its choice of law rules. Venue of any suit brought under this contract shall be in a court of competent jurisdiction in Travis County, Texas. NOTHING IN THIS SECTION SHALL BE CONSTRUED AS A WAIVER OF SOVEREIGN IMMUNITY BY AGENCY.

- 7.2 Recipient agrees to notify Agency in writing within ten (10) calendar days of any significant change affecting Recipient and Recipient's identity, including but not limited to changes in its ownership or control, name, governing board membership, authority of governing board, officeholders, or vendor identification number.
- 7.3 Agency's failure to enforce any provision of this contract does not constitute a waiver of that provision or any other provision.
- 7.4 Recipient, its employees, agents, contractors, and subcontractors agree to indemnify and hold harmless Agency, the State of Texas, and their employees and officials for any loss, damages, judgments, and costs of liability arising from any acts or omissions or alleged acts or omissions of Recipient or its employees, agents, contractors, and subcontractors, including the inappropriate release or use of Information by Recipient.
- 7.5 If any provision of this contract is held to be unenforceable by a court, this contract shall be construed as if such provision did not exist and the unenforceability of such provision will not render any other provision or provisions of this contract unenforceable.

STATEMENT OF WORK – PROJECT OBLIGATIONS

SECTION 1 – Project Abstract

The purpose of this contract is to provide Recipient with Agency's current unemployment compensation Information as follows:

- Direct online access to Agency computer files for the following:
 - Wage Records;
 - Unemployment Compensation Claim Benefit Information limited access

Subject to the security and confidentiality provisions of this contract, Recipient shall use Information obtained from Agency solely for the following specific purpose: to assist in locating fugitives, witnesses, defendants and suspects in criminal and civil cases; to assist in criminal investigations; to assist in locating individuals with outstanding warrants and persons who have absconded. Any other use of the Information by Recipient shall be a breach of this contract.

SECTION 2 – Obligations of Agency

- 2.1 Agency authorizes online "read-only" access to the following Agency mainframe computer screens:
 - Wage Records File (BN75 screen);
 - Unemployment Compensation Claim Benefit Information limited access (CMES, CTCS, and BPCS screens)
- 2.2 Online access to Agency's data will routinely be available to Recipient Users on Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Central Time, excluding State holidays. Access to Agency's data may not be available at other times due to Agency's computer maintenance needs.
- 2.3 Agency reserves the right to conduct monitoring, evaluation, and audit of Recipient's access to Agency's Information, as provided under this contract.
- 2.4 Agency records include Information provided to Agency by third parties including employers and employees. Agency does not warrant or guarantee the accuracy of Information provided under this contract.

SECTION 3 – Obligations of Recipient

- 3.1 Recipient shall not release or otherwise make accessible to any other party, the Information obtained hereunder except as specifically required in order to discharge the official duties described herein. Recipient shall not release any Information without the written consent of Agency. Recipient shall maintain sufficient safeguards over all Information obtained from Agency to prevent unauthorized access to or redisclosure of any Information provided hereunder.
- 3.2 Security measures utilized by Recipient for the protection of Agency's confidential Information will conform, at a minimum, to the federal regulations contained in 20 C.F.R. Part 603 and to the Texas Workforce Commission Data Security Policy, Attachment A2.
- 3.3 All Recipient Users granted access under this contract to Agency data must execute Agency's User Information Security Agreement and complete TWC Information Technology Security Awareness training prior to being assigned a security password for online access to Agency data. A copy of the User Information Security Agreement is attached as Attachment A4. A copy of an executed User Information Security Agreement with certification of completion of TWC Information Technology Security Awareness training must be received by the Agency contact person listed in this contract before a Security Password will be issued. Each User Information Security Agreement submitted must be cosigned by the supervisor of the Recipient User. Executed Recipient User Information Security Agreements must be submitted by Recipient contact person listed in this contract with a completed Cover Sheet for Transmitting User Information Security Agreement which is attached as Attachment A5. On March 1, 2011, all Recipient Users accessing the system under a prior contract will be terminated unless before that date Recipient submits a new User Information Security Agreement executed by Recipient User no more than thirty (30) calendar days prior to the date submitted, with an attached certification of completion of TWC Information Technology Security Awareness training dated no more than thirty (30) calendar days before submission.
- 3.4 Recipient must maintain on file a signed copy of the User Information Security Agreement and certification of completion of TWC Information Technology Security Awareness training for each Recipient User. The security password for an individual Recipient User shall be immediately revoked upon termination of that individual or upon reassignment of a Recipient User into a position not authorized to access Agency's Information. Recipient shall notify Agency within three (3) calendar days of the resignation or termination of a Recipient User. Failure to revoke access of a Recipient User who has been terminated or reassigned and inform Agency of any termination or reassignment of a Recipient User shall be a breach of this contract and may result in immediate suspension of all access and termination of the contract as well as other penalties provided by law and this contract. All security codes, Recipient User names and passwords issued under this contract shall be cancelled upon the expiration of the contract. One (1) year after the Begin Date of this contract and each year on the anniversary date of the Begin Date of this contract for the term of this contract so long as the contract or any renewal thereof shall be operative, access by a Recipient User shall be cancelled unless within thirty (30) calendar days of the anniversary date Recipient submits a new User Information Security Agreement executed by Recipient User no more than thirty (30) calendar days prior to the date submitted, with an attached certification of completion of TWC Information Technology Security Awareness training dated no more than thirty (30) calendar days before submission. Agency will grant access to a maximum of twenty-five (25) Recipient Users, all of whom shall be direct Recipient employees. Recipient shall screen potential Users and shall submit User Information Security Agreements for only those employees whom Recipient has determined shall pose no threat to the security of Agency Information.

- 3.5 Recipient Users shall not change or update any Information contained in Agency's computer stored files. Recipient Users shall not use any automated system or software to make multiple queries of Agency's computer stored files.
- 3.6 Recipient shall not place Information obtained from Agency on mobile, remote, or portable storage devices; nor shall Recipient remove storage media from the facility used by Recipient without the prior written authorization of Agency.
- 3.7 Recipient Users are authorized to access Agency's Information for the official purposes listed in Section 1 of this Attachment A only and may not divulge information obtained under this contract to any other individual or entity, except as strictly required to accomplish the official purposes listed in Section 1 of this Attachment A.
- 3.8 Recipient agrees to adopt and implement security guidelines and to ensure that only authorized Recipient Users will have access to view Agency's confidential Information and that any screen dump or other extraction of Agency Information will be protected from unauthorized use or redisclosure.
- 3.9 Recipient will be solely responsible for disseminating any Information provided by Agency to the remainder of Recipient Users.
- 3.10 Recipient agrees to notify Agency immediately if a security violation of this contract is detected, or if Recipient suspects that the security or integrity of Agency's Information has been or may be compromised in any way.
- 3.11 Texas Labor Code § 301.085 provides that unemployment compensation information is not public information for purposes of Texas Government Code, Chapter 552. Recipient shall not release any Information obtained from Agency under this contract in response to a request made under Texas Government Code, Chapter 552, or to a request made under any other law, regulation, or ordinance addressing public access to government records.
- 3.12 Recipient will pay each invoice on or before the 30th calendar day following the date of receipt of the bill from Agency. Recipient shall send the payment to the address listed on the invoice along with a copy of the invoice.
- 3.13 Recipient will treat Wage Records, Unemployment Compensation Claim Benefit Information, and Employer Tax Records obtained from Agency as confidential as required under Texas Labor Code § 301.081 and the Social Security Act of 1934.
- 3.14 Recipient shall establish and maintain security safeguards and procedures to guarantee the confidentiality of all Information obtained from Agency. Such safeguards shall, at a minimum, comply with the requirements found at 20 C.F.R. § 603.9, a copy of which is attached as **Attachment A1** and the requirements included in this contract.
- 3.15 Recipient's procedures to safeguard Information provided shall be subject to audit by Agency.
- 3.16 Recipient shall be responsible to provide and maintain its own computer hardware and software to accomplish the necessary computer communications linkages with Agency's mainframe data base.
- 3.17 Recipient agrees to accept liability for any damage to Agency's hardware, software, or Information when such damage is caused by the actions of employees or agents of Recipient, whether authorized or unauthorized Users pursuant to this contract.

- 3.18 Recipient shall pay a **two thousand dollar (\$2,000.00)** annual subscription fee for the online access described in Section 2.1 of this **Attachment A.** The twelve (12) calendar month period covered by the yearly subscription fee begins on the Begin Date listed in this contract. Payment of the yearly subscription fee is due within thirty (30) calendar days from the Begin Date listed in this contract. The yearly subscription fee is nonrefundable and shall not be prorated in the event of early termination of this contract or suspension of services. Recipient shall send the payment to the address listed on the invoice and shall include with the payment a copy of the invoice.
- 3.19 Recipient shall submit to Agency a fully-executed Quarterly Self-Assessment Report, a copy of which is attached as Attachment A3, on the next-occurring quarterly filing date after the Begin Date of this contract, and on each quarterly filing date for as long as this contract is in effect.  - (iii) Require the recipient to store and process disclosed information maintained in electronic format, such as magnetic tapes or discs, in such a way that unauthorized persons cannot obtain the information by any means;
 - (iv) Require the recipient to undertake precautions to ensure that only authorized personnel are given access to disclosed information stored in computer systems;
 - (v) Require each recipient agency or entity to:
 - (A) Instruct all personnel having access to the disclosed information about confidentiality requirements, the requirements of this subpart B, and the sanctions specified in the State law for unauthorized disclosure of information, and
 - (B) Sign an acknowledgment that all personnel having access to the disclosed information have been instructed in accordance with paragraph (b)(1)(v)(A) of this section and will adhere to the State's or State UC agency's confidentiality requirements and procedures which are consistent with this subpart B and the agreement required by § 603.10, and agreeing to report any infraction of these rules to the State UC agency fully and promptly.
 - (vi) Require the recipient to dispose of information disclosed or obtained, and any copies thereof made by the recipient agency, entity, or contractor, after the purpose for which the information is disclosed is served, except for disclosed information possessed by any court. Disposal means return of the information to the disclosing State or State UC agency or destruction of the information, as directed by the State or State UC agency. Disposal includes deletion of personal identifiers by the State or State UC agency in lieu of destruction. In any case, the information disclosed must not be retained with personal identifiers for longer than such period of time as the State or State UC agency deems appropriate on a case-by-case basis; and

- (vii) Maintain a system sufficient to allow an audit of compliance with the requirements of this part.
- (2) In the case of disclosures made under § 603.5(d)(2) (to a third party (other than an agent) or disclosures made on an ongoing basis), the State or State UC agency must also
 - (i) Periodically audit a sample of transactions accessing information disclosed under that section to assure that the entity receiving disclosed information has on file a written release authorizing each access. The audit must ensure that the information is not being used for any unauthorized purpose;
 - (ii) Ensure that all employees of entities receiving access to information disclosed under § 603.5(d)(2) are subject to the same confidentiality requirements, and State criminal penalties for violation of those requirements, as are employees of the State UC agency.
- (c) Redisclosure of confidential UC information.
 - (1) A State or State UC agency may authorize any recipient of confidential UC information under paragraph (a) of this section to redisclose information only as follows:
 - (i) To the individual or employer who is the subject of the information;
 - (ii) To an attorney or other duly authorized agent representing the individual or employer;
 - (iii) In any civil or criminal proceedings for or on behalf of a recipient agency or entity;
 - (iv) In response to a subpoena only as provided in § 603.7;
 - (v) To an agent or contractor of a public official only if the person redisclosing is a public official, if the redisclosure is authorized by the State law, and if the public official retains responsibility for the uses of the confidential UC information by the agent or contractor;
 - (vi) From one public official to another if the redisclosure is authorized by the State law;
 - (vii) When so authorized by Section 303(e)(5), SSA, (redisclosure of wage information by a State or local child support enforcement agency to an agent under contract with such agency for purposes of carrying out child support enforcement) and by State law; or
 - (viii) When specifically authorized by a written release that meets the requirements of § 603.5(d) (to a third party with informed consent).
 - (2) Information redisclosed under paragraphs (c)(1)(v) and (vi) of this section must be subject to the safeguards in paragraph (b) of this section.
- (d) The requirements of this section do not apply to disclosures of UC information to a Federal agency which the Department has determined, by notice published in the Federal Register, to have in place safeguards adequate to satisfy the confidentiality requirement of Section 303(a)(1), SSA.

2011 RENEWAL AND AMENDMENT OF CONTRACT BETWEEN TRAVIS COUNTY AND AUSTIN AREA URBAN LEAGUE

PARTIES

This 2011 Renewal and Amendment ("2011 Renewal") of Contract is entered into by the following Parties: Travis County, a political subdivision of the State of Texas ("County"), and Austin Area Urban League ("Contractor").

RECITALS

County and Contractor entered into an agreement to provide services for the care of indigents, for public health education and information and/or for other authorized services ("Contract") the Initial Term of which began January 1, 2009, and terminated December 31, 2009 ("Initial Contract Term").

Under the Contract, Contractor agreed to provide personal and professional services for the care of indigents and other qualified recipients and for public health education and information, in accordance with the terms of the Contract, thus providing services which further a public purpose.

The Contract provides for renewal of the agreement and changes to the agreement by the written agreement signed by both Parties.



The AAUL is a partner with the WorkSource Board and coordinates with such organizations and institutions as: SkillPoint Alliance, Austin Community College District, Austin Independent School District, Capital Idea, LifeWorks, SafePlace, the City of Austin Health & Human Services Division, the City of Austin Neighborhood Housing & Community Development Division, and a number of other community advocates, including the faith community, broadly defined.

It collaborates with other organizations such as the various Chambers of Commerce (Greater Austin, Hispanic, African-American) in educating the public on policy matters that impact the delivery of social services. In other grant funded work there is a great deal of collaboration with the largest school system in the region, AISD, and tow of the most challenged high schools in that district, Reagan and LBJ, with its associated feeder middle schools. The intent is always to provide a continuum of service and knowledge transfer among these organizations so that individuals and families have appropriate support in having pathways out of poverty and into greater self sufficiency.

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



1. UNDUPLICATED CLIENTS Performance Measures: The most important concept is that <u>at the beginning of the contract year. All clients are counted as New and Unduplicated</u>. Furthermore, each individual client is to be counted only one time within each entire contract year. For most of our contracted programs with a calendar year term, this means that all individuals who were existing clients in December (counted in the previous contract year) <u>AND who are continuing into January of the new contract year as "carryover clients" are counted again only once, in the first quarter (Q1) of the new contract term. This "carryover" number is added to the number of <u>additional NEW clients who lust started in the program during January through March</u>, to make up the than Q1. Obviously, certain programs with different enrollment or demand cycles could reflect larger numbers in a different quarter, such as a school year-based program which may have the most new clients (and/or its own internal carryover from a previous program cycle) starting in August or September (Q3) instead, etc.</u>

2. Proposed changes to measures always require careful review and advance approval. One of our goals is to keep performance measures and reporting both meaningful and simple, so adding or changing measures is generally discouraged. Issues such as the following would be appropriate to discuss with your review team during the annual contract application/renewal process, for possible implementation in a future contract year. SUBJECT:	Increase Funding for the Counterfeit Motor Vehicle Inspection Program (CMVIP)

Proposed Motion: CONSIDER AND TAKE APPROPRIATE ACTION TO ALLOCATE ADDITIONAL LOCAL INITIATIVE PROGRAM (LIP) GRANT FUNDS TO THE CMVIP TO IDENTIFY VEHICLES THAT HAVE COUNTERFEIT STATE INSPECTION CERTIFICATES.

Summary:

The LIP grant will reimburse the county for the salaries of law enforcement officers who participate in the CMVIP. Officers will have 24-hour access to a database to investigate vehicle records of potential offenders. An officer enters a license plate number into the North Central Texas Council of Governments Emissions Database (NED) to verify the validity of the emissions certificate and vehicle registration. If the emissions certificate is a fake or counterfeit certificate, a citation is issued. The officer also verifies registration. Affected vehicle owners are provided information about the Drive A Clean Machine Program to assist in bringing their vehicles into compliance.

TNR requests an additional \$99,371.28 from the LIP funds be allocated for the CMVIP, described above.

Background, Issues and Opportunities:

On May 4, 2010, the Travis County Commissioner's Court approved the use of \$172,796 in LIP grant funds from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) to pay the salaries and training for law enforcement officers to engage in a pilot program called the CMVIP through August 31, 2010. Travis County received a Notice to Proceed on June 7, 2010 from TCEQ. On August 31, 2010, Commissioner's Court approved additional funds for the CMVIP and extended the program until funds expire.

Fiscal and Budget Impacts

There will be a positive impact on Travis County's budget. The grant will provide an additional \$99,371.28 for the program. The grant requires a match which Travis County will provide (\$24,842.82)

using in-kind contributions. This additional amount will bring the total of allocated LIP funds for this program to \$774,373.94. The total Travis County in-kind match is \$193,593.98.

The in-kind match will include the cost of fringe benefits for law enforcement officers who participate in the program.

Project Description:

<u>Summary</u>: Law enforcement officers will check the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) Emissions Database (NED) for counterfeit, fictitious, improperly issued or expired state inspection certificates. If a certificate is identified as being counterfeit, fictitious, improperly issued, or expired, the certificate will be scraped from the windshield of the vehicle and a citation will be issued. Information about the Drive A Clean Machine Program may be given to the driver of the vehicle.

<u>How:</u> When (if) a vehicle is pulled over for a moving violation, (or if the vehicle is identified by a parking lot check) an officer will run the license plate number through NED to verify the validity of the emissions certificate and registration. If the emissions certificate is a fake, expired, or counterfeit certificate, a citation will be issued. The officer will also verify registration. Usually if the emissions certificate is counterfeit, fake, or expired, so is the registration. Periodically, vehicles in various parking lots will be surveyed to ensure that the vehicle has valid certificates. If the emissions certificate is expired, or deemed as fake, a note will be placed on the vehicle informing the owner that the vehicle needs to pass an annual

inspection within the next 60 days. Failure to comply may result in enforcement action. Compliance with the annual inspection can be confirmed by checking NED. Information referencing the Drive A Clean Machine Program will be given to the driver or placed on a vehicle to assist the owner with compliance.

<u>Training</u>: Training is paramount to the success of the program. All officers participating in this program will attend training on Motor Vehicle Inspections and how to use NED. Training on Motor Vehicle Inspections will be conducted by the Texas Department of Safety. The purpose of the training is it familiarize the officers with the proper procedures of safety inspections (what to look for as officers), and how the emission portions of the inspection affect the total program overview. NCTCOG will train law enforcement officers on how to use NED.

NED: NED was developed in order to effectively and quickly determine if a vehicle is displaying current and legitimately issued a Vehicle State Inspection Certificate. NED contains information about vehicle inspection reports from the following counties since 2001: Brazoria, Collin, Dallas, Denton, Ellis, Ft. Bend, Galveston, Harris, Johnson, Kaufman, Montgomery, Parker, Rockwall and Tarrant. Information for Travis and Williamson Counties started in 2006 when emission testing began. This database also contains information about reported smoking vehicles for the counties in North Central Texas. Smoking vehicle information can be entered if an offense is observed and reported. NED is updated weekly, internet based, password protected, and available to Law Enforcement officers 24/7.

The Travis County Attorney's Office has previously determined that parkland fees are not applicable to this development, as the original plat allowed for two residences per lot and was approved prior to parkland fee requirements. No condominium construction agreement is required for this project as no additional subdivision infrastructure improvements are required.

As this condominium site plan application meets Travis County standards, TNR staff supports granting an exemption to platting for the proposed condominium project.







LOCATION MAP (N.T.S.)





Budgetary and Fiscal Impact: None at the present time. However, a product of this committee could be an expectation that more resources will be allocated to maintaining roadways frequented by bicyclists at a higher standard.

Issues and Opportunities:

- A Task Force can develop materials and methods to educate the public, cyclists, and elected officials about the issues of cycling on rural roads.
- The cycling community can report bicycle obstacles and potential hazards to jurisdictions for quicker response and better planning.
- Build partnerships between cyclists and elected officials and agency staff.

Background: Population growth has added vehicle traffic volume and loading to our 1200+ miles of county roads, exacerbating the existing maintenance problems. This is particularly evident where roads are built across areas having poor soil conditions. Flooding of our roads further reduces the service life of our pavements. Jointly, these factors lead to pavement failures such as cracking, heaving, rutting and sloughing. Pavement failures can be found throughout the County, but they are particularly noticeable on roads built over the expansive clays of eastern Travis County. At the same time, funds for road maintenance are being substantially reduced by fuel efficient vehicles and a gas tax that has remained the same for twenty years. Meanwhile, more people are bicycling and using rural roads for recreation and commuting. Therefore, it would be beneficial to the public's general health and welfare for the proposed joint task force to address the issues of bicycle safety outside municipal jurisdictions.

Summary and Staff Recommendation:

On October 19, 2010, the Commissioners Court approved an amendment to Chapter 82, Travis County Code, to adopt temporary subdivision plat approval requirements regarding the availability and protection of groundwater from the Trinity Group Aquifers. The Travis County Commissioners Court is seeking to appoint a stakeholder committee to assist TNR staff identify, review, and analyze issues relating to availability and protection of groundwater aquifers in Travis County. Members of the Stakeholder Committee will make recommendations for rules regarding availability and protection of groundwater.

To assist the Court with soliciting volunteers for this committee Transportation and Natural Resources (TNR) worked with Information and Telecommunication Systems (ITS) to have information regarding this stakeholder committee placed on the Travis County website for a period that exceeded two week period. The committee charter, the appointment threshold criteria along with an application form was placed on the website. The application form asked for the applicant's address, contact information and whether they have experience serving on previous Travis County stakeholder committees. The applicant was able to check the interests they represent and a box to check for the precinct in which they live. Space was also provided for the applicant to give a short explanation on why they would like to be on the committee and for the applicant to state their relevant expertise. As of this date twenty eight applications have been received.

SUBJECT: Amendments of Chapter 82 Travis County Code and Title 30 Travis County-City of Austin development code to require land use notification on the cover sheet of a final plat

Summary:

The Commissioners Court set a public hearing on January 25, 2011 to receive testimony regarding proposed changes to Chapter 82 - Travis County's Standards for Construction of Streets and Drainage in Subdivisions and proposed an amendment to Title 30 - the Travis County-City of Austin combined development code in the Austin Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) to add the requirement for a plat note that details the lack of authority in Texas to regulate land use in unincorporated areas. The purpose of this requirement was to alert constituents in the unincorporated area that cities and counties have very limited land use controls outside the city limits.

Similar language was proposed for a Title 30 amendment. City of Austin staff had concerns that the amendment language could cause unintended problems regarding grandfathering under Chapter 245, Local Government Code, so the City did not move forward with its adoption into Title 30. Code amendments to Title 30 must be approved by both Travis County and the City of Austin before Title 30 can be amended.

To address the concerns raised by the City of Austin staff, Travis County staff is now proposing that the cover page of residential plats outside the city limits include a consumer protection notification to homebuyers regarding the difference in the level of land use controls inside and outside the city limits. Please see Exhibits A and B for the proposed code amendments including the consumer protection notification wording. It is proposed that this amendment both be added to Title 30 and replace the plat note requirement previously adopted in §82.204(d)(6)(E), Travis County Code.

Notification of the public hearing was published in the Austin American Statesman on December 22 and 23 2010. Notice of the hearing was also placed on the Transportation and Natural Resource (TNR) webpage on the county website. As of this date there have been no inquiries regarding the proposed code amendments.

Issues and Opportunities:

Representatives of the Home Builders Association (HBA) raised concerns regarding the form, content and timing of the proposed notification during the January 25, 2011 public hearing. Transportation and Natural Resources (TNR) staff has met with HBA representatives to get additional information and work through the objections. At that meeting several different possible solutions were discussed, including altering the wording of the notification; having the county file a separate notification document that would show up with the title commitments; and having the notification being included in the sales contract. TNR staff is working with the County Attorneys office and the HBA to evaluate the proposed alternatives.

ORDER OF THE TRAVIS COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT AMENDING CHAPTER 82, TRAVIS COUNTY CODE

WHEREAS, a residential subdivision plat is the document that land developers use to convert land from raw acreage into finished lots with adequate infrastructure on which to build homes;

WHEREAS, as consumers, prospective homebuyers are deserving of complete and relevant information about the finished product they are buying;

WHEREAS, many consumers are not aware that homes outside the city limits are more likely to be affected by incompatible development or land uses nearby because state law historically has allowed fewer controls on development and land use outside the city limits than inside the city limits;

WHEREAS, one important consideration when choosing to buy a home can be whether the surrounding area is susceptible to being developed or used in a way that disturbs quiet enjoyment of the neighborhood, decreases the property value of the home, or is otherwise incompatible with a residential area;

WHEREAS, prospective homebuyers typically receive a copy of their subdivision plat along with the title insurance commitment for the home or lot they are buying;

WHEREAS, state law authorizes cities and counties to regulate the form and content of subdivision plats;

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds that it will promote the health, safety, morals, and general welfare and the safe, orderly, and healthful development of the unincorporated area of the County if the cover page of residential subdivision plats outside the city limits includes a provision making prospective homebuyers aware of the historical difference between land use and development controls inside and outside the city limits so that they can make an informed decision regarding their purchase of a home outside the city limits.

NOW, THEREFORE,

The Travis County Commissioners Court hereby adopts the amendments to Chapter 82, Travis County Code, that are attached hereto as Exhibit A and the amendment to Title 30, Austin/Travis County Subdivision Regulations, that is attached hereto as Exhibit B, both of which exhibits are made a part hereof. The amendment to Chapter 82, Travis County Code, is effectively immediately. The amendment to Title 30, Austin/Travis County Subdivision Regulations is effective upon adoption by the City Council of the City of Austin. If a court of competent jurisdiction holds any part of this order to be invalid, illegal, or ineffective, it shall not impair, invalidate, or nullify the remainder of the order, and the effect of the ruling shall be limited only to the specific part held invalid, illegal, or ineffective.

Part II. Section 82.204 is amended to add new subsection (f) to read as follows:

Section 82.204 Final Plat

(a) through (e) No change.

(f) Consumer Protection Notice for Homebuyers.

For a plat containing lots intended for residential use, the first page must include a location map for the subdivision, the name of the subdivision, and the notice set out below. The subdivision name and the notice must be printed in bolded capital letters one half inch high.

CONSUMER PROTECTION NOTICE FOR HOMEBUYERS

IF YOU ARE BUYING A LOT OR HOME IN THIS SUBDIVISION, YOU SHOULD DETERMINE WHETHER THE SUBDIVISION AND THE LAND AROUND IT ARE INSIDE OR OUTSIDE THE CITY LIMITS.

Summary and Staff Recommendations:

A. As required in 24 CFR Part 58, an environmental assessment has been completed for the additional four lot Gilbert Lane Land Acquisition for Affordable Housing Development Project by Crespo Consulting, Inc. The assessment revealed the project will have no significant impact on the human environment. Therefore, an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969, as amended, is not required.

On January 25, 2011, the Travis County Commissioners Court received the report and approved postings to notify the public of same. On January 26, legal notices were posted on the Travis County website, Channel 17, the seven Travis County Community Centers, taxing jurisdictions, and notices were mailed or emailed to area neighborhood associations, school districts and other interested parties to notify the public of the County's 18 day comment period regarding the result of the Gilbert Lane Land Acquisition for Affordable Housing Development Project's environmental review and HUD's 15 day comment period to allow the release of funds. The County's comment period ran from January 26, 2011 – February 14, 2011, however, no comments or objections have been received. HUD's comment period is anticipated to begin on or about February 17 – March 3.

As of February 8th, no comments have been received. If any comments are received prior to the end of the comment period on February 14th, staff will update the memo prior to the Commissioners Court's meeting on February 15th.

Staff recommends proceeding with the project.

B. To date, no comments have been received. The results must be certified by the County so that release of funds may be requested from HUD.

HUD identifies the County Judge as the certifying official, and as such, is responsible for certifying the results of the environmental review with his signature on the attached Environmental Assessment for HUD funded proposals.

C. Submission to the HUD San Antonio Field Office is required so that the County may request release of funds and move through the second 15 day comment period overseen by HUD. The certifying official must sign the attached HUD form 7015.15 to request the release of funds.

Staff anticipates the release of funds for the Gilbert Lane Land Acquisition for Affordable Housing Development project on or about March 3, 2011.

Issues and Opportunities:

The environmental assessment indicates no significant impact to the human environment; however, several mitigation measures are needed to ensure minimal impact to the human environment. See the report for the full details.

The release of funds allows the Austin Habitat for Humanity to move forward with expending funds for acquisition of 4 lots allocated through substantial amendments to the Program Year 2007, 2008 and 2009 Action Plans.

Certifying the environmental review requires the County to defend the report in Federal Court if it is ever challenged. The County accepts this responsibility through the executed grant agreement with HUD.

Background:

Gilbert Lane is a New Housing Development project, located approximately 2.4 km (1.5 miles) south of Walter E. Long Lake and 0.8 km (0.5 miles) east of SH 130 in eastern Travis County, Texas, and is located off of FM 969. The site location allows the creation of 31 affordable single family homes - 17 of which will be for very low and low income homeowners and 14 of which can be for moderate income homeowners. The nearest bus route is 3.37 miles at Decker and Loyola which is not walking distance, but is within biking distance. Additionally, the Del Valle ISD serves this area with plans for a new Elementary across from the new development.



This project will assist Habitat for Humanity with purchasing four (4) new home sites in order to provide affordable housing for families of this income level. Austin Habitat for Humanity is working to obtain an additional estimated \$264,000 through other funding sources for the construction of the new residences to accommodate low-to-moderate income families and the lots will be completed and occupied within 5 years of the acquisition.

Existing Conditions and Trends: [24 CFR 58.40(a)]

The proposed project site is located on relatively flat land that has been graded and filled during recently completed subdivision development. Soils in the area are clay and clayey loams typical of the Lower Colorado River Terrace deposits found in the area. Land use for the project area is mostly undeveloped and agricultural land, surrounded in the general area by single family, large-lot single family and mobile homes. Gilbert Elementary is currently being constructed

across Gilbert Lane from the project site. The trend on the outskirts of the City of Austin is to continue developing the eastern side of Travis County, where the "Desired Development Zone" exists. The subdivision roadways and utilities for the project site have already been constructed. Using existing infrastructure enables the County and Habitat for Humanity to provide affordable housing to Austin area residents.

Executive Summary

The Gilbert Lane Housing Development Project is located along Gilbert Road in eastern Travis County, Texas, just east of SH 130 and north of FM 969, and within the City of Austin Extraterritorial Jurisdiction (ETJ). Travis County is working with Austin Habitat for Humanity (AHFH) to secure U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for the purchase of four single-family residential lots at this location. There is an urgent need for adequate new home buying opportunities for very low-to-moderate income families in Travis County. This project will assist Habitat for Humanity with purchasing four new home sites in order to provide affordable housing for families of this income level.

The Federal funding for this project requires that an Environmental Assessment (EA) be completed for commitment of the funds and advancement of the project. The environmental assessment must be compliant with NEPA Statutes and Authorities (24 CFR Part 58.5 and 58.6) and HUD environmental standards (24 CFR Part 51). This Environmental Assessment, prepared for Travis County, Texas by Crespo Consulting Services, Inc. (Crespo) along with Cox McLain Environmental Consulting, Inc. (CMEC), fulfills that requirement.

Data for the Block Group, Census Tract, and County were compared to determine socioeconomic status for this project. Based on 2000 data, approximately 10% of total persons in Census Tract 22.06 were living below the poverty level, based on median household income in 1999 and the poverty level at that time. Approximately 17.6% of total persons in Census Tract 22.06 Block Group 4 were living below the poverty level in 1999. Based on the Census Tract level data, the project will increase affordable housing options in an area that has racial and ethnic diversity and allow for more income diversity in the area.

No displacements or adverse impacts other than minimal inconveniences to current residents and businesses along FM 969 during the construction phase would occur to persons in the project area.

The proposed project site is located on relatively flat land that has been graded and filled during recently completed subdivision development. Soils in the area are clay and clayey loams typical of the Lower Colorado River Terrace deposits found in the area. Land use for the project area is mostly undeveloped and agricultural land surrounded by single-family, large-lot single-family and mobile homes.

According to the noise calculations, the existing noise levels at the site are less than 55 dB, which is within the range of acceptable noise levels. No noise attenuation or special approvals would be required for the proposed project.

A site visit was conducted on December 7, 2010 by the Crespo Consulting team to identify any environmental constraints for the project. A previous search of hazardous materials databases through TelAll Corporation was completed for the subject lots on June 29, 2010 associated with the approved EA on the 27 adjacent lots. Both the site visit and database search did not identify any areas of concern.

Surface waters, wetlands, Sole Source Aquifers, Wild and Scenic Rivers and floodplains are not located within or applicable to the project site. No impacts to parkland, national forest, historical sites, protected species or waterways are anticipated for this project. Coastal zones and airport clear zones are also not applicable to this proposed project site. The lots are not



located in designated floodplains. Temporary impacts to soil will occur during construction activities, but protection will be accomplished with erosion and sedimentation controls. Approximately 4.6 acres of vegetation would be removed and trees would be protected as mandated by the City's Environmental Criteria Manual.

No federally-listed or state-listed threatened or endangered species or their habitats are found within the project area. The proposed project would have no effect on federally-listed species and would have no impacts on state-listed species.

Because the proposed project involves both a political subdivision of the State of Texas (Travis County) and federal funding via HUD, both the Texas Antiquities Code and Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) apply. Coordination with the Texas Historical Commission (THC) concluded when THC concurred on January 11, 2011 that no survey was required. To comply with Section 106 requirements, indirect impacts were also considered, particularly via changes in the visual environment. All parcels, including the project site and those adjacent to the project area, were examined. No historic structures were found that would be directly or indirectly impacted by this project.

The land acquisition project must go through several public comment processes in order to proceed. The first public comment period ended on December 23rd. The Travis County Commissioners Court (TCCC) gave final approval of the project on January 11th. After completion of the environmental assessment and TCCC approved posting of the Environmental Report, the public will have 18 days to provide written comment to Travis County regarding any concerns on the project's impact to the environment and an additional 15 day written comment period to HUD to identify any procedural issues related to the completion of the Environmental Assessment. The anticipated Notice of No Significant Findings and Request for Release of Funds will be posted on January 26, 2011 with final Release of Funds anticipated on or about March 4, 2011.

This Environmental Assessment shows that the proposed project on Gilbert Road would not have any significant effects on the surrounding natural or man-made environment. All requirements of the NEPA Statutes and Authorities (24 CFR Part 58.5 and 58.6) and HUD environmental standards (24 CFR Part 51) have been met for this project; and in conclusion, this assessment has determined a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI).

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1.0 **Project Description**

The Gilbert Lane Housing Development Project is located along Gilbert Road in Eastern Travis County, Texas, about ½ mile east of State Highway 130 and ½ mile north of FM 969. The project site is positioned on the Manor 7.5' USGS Quadrangle and is located within the Decker Creek Watershed and the City of Austin two-mile Extraterritorial Jurisdictional (ETJ) area. The project location is shown on **Figures 1A and 1B** (all maps and figures are in **Appendix A**).

To fill the urgent need for adequate new home buying opportunities for low-to-moderate income families, Travis County is working with Austin Habitat for Humanity (AHFH) to secure an estimated \$174,000 in U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for the purchase of 4 single-family residential lots. These lots cover a total area of approximately 0.65 acres and are within the nearly completed Gilbert Lane Subdivision. The purchase of these four lots is an addition to 27 previously funded and approved adjacent lots in the same subdivision. The former 27 lots were secured in October of 2010. The Gilbert Lane Subdivision has already been cleared and leveled under previous development projects undertaken by others. Nearly all subdivision improvements have been completed by the subdivision developer, including streets, drainage and utilities. **Appendix B – Subdivision Plans** (sheets 2 and 3) includes plat maps of the new subdivision. The 27 lots included in this environmental assessment are lots 3 through 7 and 9 through 30. See Figure 1C – Site Map for lot locations. Austin Habitat for Humanity is working to obtain an additional estimated \$264,000 through other funding sources for the construction of the new residences to accommodate low-to-moderate income families and the lots will be completed and occupied within 5 years of the acquisition.

The Federal funding for this project requires that an Environmental Assessment (EA) be completed for commitment of the funds and advancement of the project. The environmental assessment must be compliant with National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Statutes and Authorities (24 CFR Part 58.5 and 58.6) and HUD environmental standards (24 CFR Part 51). This Environmental Assessment, prepared for Travis County, Texas by Crespo Consulting Services, Inc. along with Cox McLain Environmental Consulting, Inc., fulfills that requirement.

2.0 Need for Project

There is an urgent need for adequate safe and decent home buying opportunities for very lowto-moderate income families in Travis County. Very low-income (less than or equal to 30% Median Family Income, or MFI) and low-income (up to 50% MFI) households in Travis County face housing problems at the highest rates. Of the county's low- and very low-income households, 80% (61,524 households) face one or more housing problems. By comparison, 49% of moderate-income households (up to 80% MFI) and 35% of all households in the county face one or more housing problems. Cost burden is the most frequent housing problem. Of the 113,476 Travis County households with a housing problem, 83% (94,563 households) face a cost burden (i.e. pay more than 30% of household income on housing expenses) and 37% face a severe cost burden (i.e. pay more than 50% of household income on housing expenses.) (Travis County, 2007 and HUD CHAS databook, 2000).

Additionally, the cost of land in Land Market 26 (which includes Travis County) increased by 106% from 2000 to 2005 (Real Estate Center at Texas A&M, 2010). The cost of land, along with a lack of available lots with pre-existing infrastructure, significantly increase the costs of



new home construction, often making housing unaffordable to households under 80% of median family income. (Travis County, 2007).

This project will assist AHFH with the purchase of 4 new home sites in order to provide affordable housing for low to moderate income families. At the time of sale to the homeowner, a forgivable 10 year loan with no required payments will be provided. If the house is sold, refinanced, leased or title transferred within 10 years, the loan must be repaid in full within the first five years and is forgiven on a pro-rata basis for years 6-10. After year 10, the loan is fully forgiven.

3.0 Alternatives for Proposed Project

One preliminary alternative was considered by the County, but it was eliminated due to environmental constraints. The alternative considered is located in the Austin's Colony subdivision southeast of the Gilbert Lane project site. Due to a proposed sand and gravel mining project adjacent to Austin's Colony, this site was determined to be unsatisfactory. The Gilbert Lane project was suitable for continued consideration.

After the elimination of the Austin's Colony location, two alternatives were considered for new housing developments for low-to-moderate income families in Travis County.

- No Build: Leave the housing situation as-is and do not build additional affordable housing.
- Build: Construct the housing development in the Gilbert Lane Subdivision.

NO BUILD ALTERNATIVE

The No Build alternative would leave the housing situation in Travis County as-is. Additional housing would not be built to accommodate low-to-moderate income families in the Austin area.

GILBERT LANE ALTERNATIVE

The Gilbert Lane Housing Development would increase the number of safe and decent homes and would fulfill the need for affordable housing for low-to-moderate income families. This Environmental Assessment was completed to further discuss this preferred alternative. The additional four lot purchase allows AHFH control over the street and related architectural control thus ensuring affordability.

4.0 Affected Environment and Impacts

4.1 Land Development

LAND USE

Land use for the project area is mostly agricultural and undeveloped land surrounded by singlefamily, large-lot single-family and mobile homes. **Figure 4A** illustrates land uses according to City of Austin 2008 GIS data. The northern edge of several commercial/industrial lots abuts the proposed project to the south and east of the existing site. Land uses on those parcels, which are long and narrow and stretch from FM 969 up nearly to Barteny Cove, include some hay cultivation/baling and farther to the east, some mechanical mulching associated with an organic mulching operation. The mulching business is called "Organics By Gosh", which is next to Ibarra Auto Sales.

Water wells and aboveground water tanks exist on a number of surrounding properties. There is a City of Manor water storage tank and treatment facility for groundwater and a wastewater lift station for Southwest Water Company adjacent to the property. None of these facilities are on the subject lots. Other subdivisions currently exist or are being developed on adjacent lands. Across Gilbert Road from Lot 1, a new elementary school, Gilbert Elementary School, is currently under construction at 5412 Gilbert Road. No parks or historical structures were identified during the site visit.

CONFORMANCE WITH COMPREHENSIVE PLANS AND ZONING

The City of Austin's Interim Comprehensive Plan (COA, 2008a) generally recommends this type of development in this portion of Travis County and east Austin. The proposed Gilbert Lane Housing Development is located within the City of Austin two-mile ETJ. Because the project site is currently outside the City limits, there is no zoning. The ETJ is the unincorporated area within two miles of the City of Austin boundary. The proposed project site is not situated within the city limits, but City development regulations are in effect in addition to County regulations. The ETJ allows the City to regulate development adjacent to city limits and ensure that roads, housing and other development meet minimum standards to protect the quality of life and environmental quality within the City. However, these regulations do not include zoning authority. The subdivision and related subdivision construction plans were reviewed by both the City of Austin and Travis County under Title 30 City of Austin/Travis County Subdivision Regulations. The subdivision plat was approved by Commissioner's Court on February 2, 2010, and recorded on February 10, 2010.

COMPATIBILITY AND URBAN IMPACT

The project site is located in a 'Desired Development Zone' according to the City of Austin's Interim Comprehensive Plan. The housing development site is located in an area not limited by environmental sensitivity, water hazards, water supply or preserved/protected land. Although the original property was considered agricultural land, the subject properties are part of an approved single-family subdivision; therefore, the proposed project site is compatible with surrounding land uses. Further development in the area includes SH 130 completed in 2009, Austin's Colony subdivision on Hunters Bend Road, and Forest Bluff subdivision on Delta Post Drive.

The urban impact of the proposed project is minimal since the use is consistent with the current and future uses of the surrounding area, and is also consistent with the urban use within the City's "Desired Development Zone". With the project location within the "Desired Development Zone", the relative proximity to SH 130, and type of existing uses in the surrounding areas, the project will not have a negative urban impact. The City and County have also targeted development of services to the "Desired Development Zone" near SH 130 to promote this type of development.

SLOPE

The topography of the project area is relatively flat with gentle slopes in the southeast direction. The elevation ranges from 450 to 460 feet above sea level. All slopes throughout the subdivision are less than 15% grade.

EROSION

No significant erosion is present on the 4 lots as observed during the site visit on June 28, 2010. However, the southern edge of the project, along lots 1 and 2, some shallow rills have formed in the unprotected soil in the "Open Space Amenity Area". **Appendix B – Subdivision Plans.** These are not significant to the project site. Travis County and the City of Austin



requires filling of these rills and complete revegetation by the subdivision owner, as described on the subdivision plans and notes, prior to any home construction.

All construction projects have the potential for erosion and compaction of soils resulting from disturbed vegetation and heavy equipment use. As mentioned above, the roadways, grading and utilities are completed for the subdivision. In compliance with the City's Environmental Criteria Manual, temporary erosion controls were installed and maintenance provided for the duration of the construction period.

Some of the same criteria will be observed and followed for construction of the homes. This project will disturb more than one acre, but less than five acres of land; therefore, the project will be required to incorporate a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SW3P) in the construction plans, unless the limits of construction at any one time are maintained below one acre. The most important factor in controlling soil erosion is immediate revegetation of disturbed areas at the end of construction. The relatively short construction timeline (anticipated to take one to three months per house over a maximum of five years) utilized by Habitat for Humanity will minimize the erosion potential of this project.

SOIL SUITABILITY

The project site is predominantly Houston Black-Heiden-Wilson soil. More specifically, Burleson clay (BsA) and Wilson clay loams (WIB), listed in **Table 1**, occur on or near the project site (USDA, 1974 and NRCS, 2010). **Figure 4B – Soils Map**.

Both the Burleson and Wilson soil series have high water capacity and are slowly permeable. These characteristics cause cracking in the soil when dry and swelling when wet giving the soils a shrink/swell tendency. Both series occupy gently sloping soils; however, Burleson clay tends to occur in valleys and gently undulating uplands; whereas, Wilson clay occurs on ridges, adjoining side slopes and along drainageways.

According to Fugro's geotechnical report prepared for development of the Gilbert Lane Subdivision Phase I, "the site is underlain by unconsolidated sand, silt, clay and gravel of the Lower Colorado River Terrace deposits" (Fugro, 2005). The geotechnical report provides the results of the field and laboratory investigations of the soils within the subdivision and criteria for the design of flexible pavement for the roads. The report also includes a section on "Residential Lot Fill" with the HUD-FHA requirements as stated in the HUD-FHA Data Sheet 79g, as guidance to supplement future foundation design.

Due to the high water capacity and shrink/swell tendency of the native soils, engineering consideration has been and will be considered for the road and home construction. Structural



engineers, geotechnical engineers and home builders are familiar with this design issue and are familiar with the proper foundation construction techniques. The future homes will be constructed on fill brought in and placed for the specific purpose of road and home construction.

HAZARD AND NUISANCES INCLUDING SITE SAFETY

A site visit was conducted on December 7, 2010 by Crespo Consulting team staff to identify any environmental constraints for the project. No evidence of surface hazardous materials was identified during the field investigation. Additionally, a search of hazardous materials databases through TelAll Corporation was completed on June 29, 2010. There were no findings or sites listed in any of the database searches for this site, which included CERCLIS, RCRA TSD, TXSSF, TXLF, TXLUST, TXUST, TXAST and TXSPILL. See **Appendix C** for a description of all databases searched and a summary of findings from the Environmental Database Search.

ENERGY CONSUMPTION

Construction of each proposed home is anticipated to last approximately one to three months. Completion of all 4 homes will occur within five years, but will most likely occur in a much shorter time frame. Typically, three to five homes will be under construction at any one time, thus reducing the energy consumption through the economies of scale. During that time, a number of construction vehicles would be in use within the project area, including earth moving equipment (bull dozer, grade maintainer, loader, and back hoe), dump trucks, compactors (rollers), and light trucks. All of these vehicles are gasoline or diesel-powered. The larger vehicles will be used for a short time (two or three days per home) during preparation for foundation construction and some smaller equipment will be used for several days for clean-up and landscape grading. Construction equipment would be active within the project area for approximately eight to 10 hours per day, five to six days per week, only for the phases described above. There will likely be extended periods of inactivity between housing starts. Energy consumption is expected to be less than a similarly priced home due to the relatively short construction period and economies of scale related to the construction scheduling typical of Habitat for Humanity projects.

The home construction will have energy efficient features including R-15 wall insulation, sealing along the slab and wall penetrations, 5.5-inch nominal depth closed cell foam roof and attic wall insulation, double-paned Low-E vinyl windows, insulated doors, and tree and shrub plantings. The energy consumption for these new homes will generally be much less than similarly priced homes.

4.2 Noise

HUD standards for noise abatement and control are established in 24 CFR Part 51 B. In order to raise awareness of noise issues, encourage the use of noise control measures in construction and land use planning, and present noise measurement and control procedures, the standards require HUD staff and other entities subject to the standards, such as the administrators of HUD-funded projects, to consider the acoustical environment in the planning and construction of residential and other noise-sensitive facilities. Additional guidelines for HUD funding recipients and other responsible entities are given in 24 CFR Part 58.

According to Section 51.101 of the regulations, HUD's general policy is to provide minimum national standards applicable to HUD programs to protect citizens against excessive noise in



their communities and places of residence. The HUD standards require measurement of the external noise environment in order to determine the day-night average sound level (DNL). Sound levels at or below 65 decibels (dB) are considered acceptable (24 CFR 51.103). Any levels over 65 dB are generally deemed unacceptable and would require special approvals, environmental review, and noise attenuation measures.

Noise calculations were performed consistent with HUD's Noise Assessment Guidelines in *The Noise Guidebook* [1991]. The calculations require data input for airports within 15 miles, major roadways within 1,000 feet, and railways within 3,000 feet. The calculations were prepared based on the proximity of these features. According to the noise calculations, the existing noise levels at the site are less than 55 dB, which is within the range of acceptable noise levels. No noise attenuation or special approvals would be required for the proposed project. **Appendix D** – **Noise Assessment Calculations**.

Table 2 includes building specifications used as noise reduction measures by Habitat forHumanity. These measures also serve to increase energy efficiency. They will be incorporatedinto all Habitat for Humanity homes, regardless of the measured noise levels.

4.3 Air Quality

The climate of Austin is humid subtropical with hot summers and relatively mild winters. Mild weather prevails during most of the winter, but temperatures fall below freezing an average of 25 days per year. Conversely, dry west winds during the winter can occasionally produce summer-like temperatures. Daytime temperatures during summer are hot, with highs greater than 90 degrees Fahrenheit (°F) over 80% of the time. Temperatures range from an average low temperature in January of 38°F and an average high in July of 96°F, and the average yearly rainfall is approximately 32 inches (TSHA, 2010). Precipitation is fairly evenly distributed throughout the year. Heaviest amounts occur during May and September. Precipitation from April through September usually results from thunderstorms, with large amounts of rain falling within short periods of time.



Austin is considered a near nonattainment city. A nonattainment area is a geographic area where air pollution levels do not meet federal ambient air quality standards for ozone and other pollutants. Due to the area's high temperatures, lack of cloud cover and low wind conditions, the Austin area is susceptible to air quality issues. Based on this status, if ozone levels exceed federal standards four or more times in a three-year period, the City of Austin will be declared to be in nonattainment (COA, 2010). Currently, Austin and surrounding areas (including Travis, Williamson, Bastrop, Hays and Caldwell Counties) are part of an Early Action Compact (EAC) Area; however, the City of Austin does currently meet air quality standards (TCEQ, 2010b).

The project site is located approximately nine miles from the center of the downtown area of Austin, where smog, ozone and air quality issues are the greatest. Air quality away from the City's center, including the project site, is cleaner and clearer. The project itself, a residential subdivision will not significantly impact air quality. A relatively small amount of additional pollutants may be added from additional vehicle trips by the residents; however, this would not be considered significant. Bus transportation is located within a reasonable distance, approximately 3.37 miles away. Travis County is served by the Capital Area Rural Transportation Service (CARTS), and Capital Metro bus system.

There are no significant air emissions in the vicinity of the project. The City of Austin operates a natural gas fueled Decker Power Plant on the western shore of Decker Lake at 8003 Decker Lane, which is approximately 3.5 miles from the project site. Natural gas power plants have generally low emissions. The power plant is operated under a number of TCEQ air permits and is equipped with approved air quality control devices (TCEQ, 2010a). TXI operates a variety of rock and stone crushing activities approximately 2.2 miles from the site at 12900 Harold Green Road. These operations also have a number of TCEQ air permits. As mentioned in Section 4.6, Community Facilities and Services, of this report, TXI is proposing to expand its gravel mining operations in the area; however, the nearest corner of the proposed gravel mining is approximately 1.5 miles from the project site. TCEQ has oversight on air quality, and dust will be managed by applying water to the haul roads. Also, the excavated material is generally wet, thus reducing the potential for dust. At these distances, no impacts are expected from any of these sources.

4.4 Environmental Design

No impacts to parkland, national forest, historical sites, protected species or waterways are anticipated for this project. Temporary impacts to vegetation and soil will occur during construction activities, but protection will be accomplished with erosion and sedimentation controls as mandated through the TPDES SW3P and the City's Environmental Criteria Manual.

Permanent features within the subdivision include open space amenity areas and parkland greenbelts, along with a water quality wet pond (Murfee, 2006). **Appendix B – Subdivision Plans**.

4.5 Socioeconomic Conditions

Demographic Character Changes

DEMOGRAPHIC CHARACTERISTICS

Socioeconomic data for the project area are presented in **Table 3** and subsequent paragraphs below. The smallest geographic area for population information is the Census Block. The most



recent data available at this geographic level are from the year 2000. Recognizing these data limitations, Race/Ethnicity and Income information are provided in this section in compliance with applicable regulations and guidance. For analysis, most of the socioeconomic information will be analyzed at the census tract or zip codes level to provide context to the area where the housing development is proposed.

The populations of the Blocks that characterize the Gilbert Lane project area (depicted on **Figure 4C**) differ demographically. In Tract 22.06 Block Group 4, Block 4002, just less than 30% of the population was White and 63.1% was Hispanic in 2000. Approximately six percent was Black or African American and other races/ethnicities comprised less than one percent of the population. In contrast, Tract 22.06, Block Group 5, Block 5019 was comprised of 64% White persons, 5.6% Asian, 2.8% Two or More Races, and 27.8% Hispanic persons. Overall, Census Tract 22.06 has a White population of slightly above 45%, a Hispanic/Latino population of 36%, and a Black or African American population of 16.3%.

Data for the Block Group, Census Tract, and County are provided for comparison. The project will place affordable housing in an area, based on the Census Tract level data that has racial and ethnic diversity. No displacements or adverse impacts other than minimal inconveniences to current residents and businesses along FM 969 during the construction phase would occur to persons in the project area.

ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS

Economic data are not available at the Block level but are available at the Tract and Block Group level. Based on 2000 data, approximately 10% (838) of total persons in Census Tract 22.06 (8,405) were living below the poverty level, based on median household income in 1999 and the poverty level at that time. Approximately 17.6 % (101) of total persons in Census Tract 22.06 Block Group 4 (574) were living below the poverty level in 1999. The Median Household Income in 1999 for Travis County Census Tract 22.06, Block Group (BG) 4 was \$40,705. Based on the data mentioned above, increasing affordable housing options in the area allows for more income diversity in the area.

PROJECT ELIGIBILITY AND ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE CONSIDERATIONS

From a policy perspective, Executive Order (EO) 12898 "Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations" requires each Federal agency to "make achieving environmental justice part of its mission by identifying and addressing, as appropriate, disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects of its programs, policies and activities on minority populations and low-income populations."

Based on the socioeconomic data reviewed, the Gilbert Lane project area has a higher than average Hispanic population at 36% for the Census Tract as opposed to 28% for the County, and can be considered an Environmental Justice community of concern. However looking at the project in its larger context, the area is racially and ethnically diverse with a low concentration of poverty, and the property is located in a desirable development area accessible to public transportation and approximately nine miles from downtown Austin.

Disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects are defined as adverse effects that: (1) are predominately borne by a minority population and/or a low-income population, or (2) will be suffered by the minority population and/or low-income population and are appreciably more severe or greater in magnitude than the adverse effects that will be suffered by the non-minority population and/or non-low-income population.



Because there are no homes currently along Barteny Cove (as field-verified by CMEC on June 28, 2010), the proposed construction project would not require any displacements or adverse effects of any kind. To the contrary, the proposed project would support construction of affordable housing in a desirable development zone, which includes a new major corridor with the potential to increase businesses, schools and housing development, and makes it available to low income and minority residents in an area where basic infrastructure has already been installed.

4.6 Community Facilities and Services

EXISTING INFRASTRUCTURE

The Gilbert Lane Subdivision is substantially complete. Although no homes have been built along either Barteny Cove at the site of the current project (or on adjacent Breve Lane), currently there are curb and gutter roadways and utility hook-ups along both streets. According to Gilbert Lane Subdivision Phase I construction plans (**Appendix B**), water and wastewater systems were constructed to City of Austin standards and specifications, the water service will be provided by Manville Water Supply Corporation, and wastewater service by Hornsby Bend Utility. Based on a conversation with staff members at the City of Austin (COA, 2010b), since there are no homes currently along Barteny Cove (or Breve Lane), a solid waste service provider has not been identified for the proposed Habitat Houses.

South of FM 969, there is an existing industrial aggregate operation called the Hornsby Bend project. There are active portions of the quarry and proposed expansion areas, along with buffers near residential areas. Currently, there is a proposal under consideration for sand and gravel aggregate extraction to replace an existing aggregate operation. This industrial land use would take place south of FM 969, not north of FM 969 where the proposed Gilbert Lane project is located. The Hornsby Bend operation is approximately1.5 miles away from the proposed



homes on Barteny Cove east of Gilbert Road; therefore, it would have no effect on the construction of Habitat for Humanity houses.

Although there is currently no development along Barteny Cove, there are community facilities along FM 969. On FM 969 west of Gilbert Road, there are few developments up to SH 130. Hornbsy Bend Assembly of God and Santa Barbara Catholic Church are located east of Gilbert Road toward Hunters Bend Road, south of FM 969. Hornsby-Dunlap Elementary School is also located south of FM 969. There are various businesses in this area, and residential developments exist both north and south of FM 969.

Del Valle ISD (DVISD) provides services to people along FM 969 and would serve the Gilbert Road neighborhood. The schools that serve Gilbert Road include Creedmoor Elementary School (FM 1327), Del Valle Junior High School (Ross Road), and Del Valle High School (Ross Road). Additional students may be added to DVISD schools as a result of new residents moving into the area. Currently, a new elementary school, named Joseph Gilbert Elementary, located at 5412 Gilbert Road, is anticipated to be completed in August 2011. Property taxes benefitting the DVISD would be levied on homeowners to offset growth within the school district.

Gilbert Road is in Emergency Service District (ESD) 12 in Travis County, according to the Travis County Emergency Management Office (the map is dated December 2006). ESD 12 covers approximately 63,610 acres. Transportation services available to rural Travis County residents include those provided by the Capital Area Rural Transportation Program (CARTS), and a bus stop served by CapMetro is approximately 3.37 miles away at Decker Lane and Loyola. The East Rural Community Center which houses the East Rural Health Clinic is approximately four miles north in Manor, along with social services including food pantry, WIC, and rent, mortgage and utility assistance among others. The South Rural Community Center which houses similar services is located on FM 973 and is approximately 6.3 miles along FM 969 and FM 973 southwest of the project location.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING CONTEXT

The proposed Gilbert Lane project would provide affordable housing for Travis County residents. Homes on lots 1, 2, 31 and 32 on Barteny Cove would be built by Habitat for Humanity (Habitat) and the sales price would be market value. At this time, Habitat does not plan to construct homes on Breve Lane but expects another developer will build housing there. Habitat works within normal appraisal and mortgage lending guidelines for financing. Habitat homes typically sell for between \$95,000 and \$115,000 depending on house size and costs. Habitat layers the financing for their partner families, making the homes accessible to families who make less than 80% of Median Family Income, specifically targeting families at 25% - 50% MFI. The home owner only actually pays a mortgage on \$55,000-75,000 and the funding difference is made up with down payment assistance programs and forgivable loans (five to 10 years) that encourage long-term home ownership through supportive financing practices. This structure actually makes a Habitat home with a market value of \$115,000 (for example) more accessible to qualified participants. (Pers. Comm. Habitat for Humanity, June 29, 2010).

According to Realtor.com (accessed December 17, 2010), there was a range of housing available in zip codes surrounding the project area. Most listings had three bedrooms and two bathrooms. These data represent just a snapshot in time of available housing stock. See **Table 4** below.

Introducing four (in addition to the previously secured 27) new affordable homes into the area would support housing for a low-income population in an area that is generally growing and developing. The population in the Census Tract was over 8,000 persons in 2000, and population has greatly increased in the greater Austin area over the past ten years. Austin Habitat for Humanity has identified the Gilbert Lane site as an appropriate opportunity to expand the affordable housing stock in Travis County.

4.7 Natural Features

WATER RESOURCES/SOLE SOURCE AQUIFERS

The highly regulated Edwards Aquifer, located through much of central and west Texas, is defined as a Sole Source Aquifer and divided into Edwards Aquifer I and Edwards Aquifer II. It is the only Sole Source Aquifer in the state of Texas. A portion of Edwards Aquifer II is located in Travis County. Although portions of the aquifer are located in Travis County, the Gilbert Lane proposed subdivision site is not located over or near any zones (recharge, contributing or transition) of Edwards Aquifer II.

The proposed project site is approximately 15.5 miles from the EPA-defined Edwards Aquifer II Recharge Zone, approximately 12.5 miles from the artesian zone and almost 18 miles from the streamflow source (contributing) zone. See **Figure 4D** for a map of the project site in relation to the Edwards Aquifer II Sole Source Aquifer.

In addition, no groundwater was encountered in any of the boring logs completed by Fugro Consultants in October 2005 (Fugro, 2005). The project site is located over the Trinity Aquifer (not a Sole Source Aquifer) and several wells, operated by the City of Manor and the Southwest Water Company, were observed within the vicinity of the proposed project site.

SURFACE WATERS

The project site is located in the Decker Creek watershed of the Colorado River Basin. No waterways or wetlands exist on the project site. An unnamed tributary to Decker Creek flows just northeast of the property from the west and meets with the Colorado River approximately 6.25 river miles downstream from the project site. **Figure 4E – Surface Water Map**



illustrates surface waters for the project area. A wet pond was constructed as part of the subdivision development to control peak flows and water quality from the subdivision runoff.

Wetlands, as defined by U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), are areas that are inundated or saturated by surface or groundwater at a frequency and duration sufficient to support, and under normal circumstances do support a prevalence of vegetation typically adapted for life in saturated soil conditions (hydrophytic vegetation). No wetlands are shown on the NWI wetlands map of the project area. See **Appendix E** for the NWI wetlands map. No wetlands were identified on site during the field visit on December 7, 2010. The closest potential wetlands would be located at the wet pond just east of the project site. Because this project will not affect jurisdictional waters of the U.S., a USACE permit is not required.

The wet pond was designed to control stormwater runoff from the Gilbert Lane Subdivision to protect water quality downstream and to prevent flooding. Stormwater runoff from the project site will be conveyed to the stormwater detention/wet pond before entering the tributary to Decker Creek.

According to TCEQ's 2008 303(d) List, no portion of Decker Creek (unclassified) is listed as impaired. However, two to three miles away, Gilleland Creek (unclassified segment ID 1428C) from the Colorado River upstream to Taylor Lane, is listed for bacteria. A Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) was adopted for this segment of Gilleland Creek in 2007, but an Implementation Plan has not yet been approved.

Because the home construction sites will possibly disturb more than one but less than five acres, compliance with the Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Construction General Permit does apply. As part of the permit, a SW3P plan will be developed and implemented for erosion and sedimentation control and water quality protection.



WILD AND SCENIC RIVERS

Wild and Scenic Rivers, as defined by the Wild & Scenic Rivers Act, are free-flowing streams that possess one or more values as follows:

(1) Wild river areas -- Those rivers or sections of rivers that are free of impoundments and generally inaccessible except by trail, with watersheds or shorelines essentially primitive and waters unpolluted. These represent vestiges of primitive America.

(2) Scenic river areas -- Those rivers or sections of rivers that are free of impoundments, with shorelines or watersheds still largely primitive and shorelines largely undeveloped, but accessible in places by roads.

(3) Recreational river areas -- Those rivers or sections of rivers that are readily accessible by road or railroad, that may have some development along their shorelines, and that may have undergone some impoundment or diversion in the past.

The project site is not located within one mile of a listed wild and scenic river, and thus will not have an effect on the value and characteristics of such a river. The closest wild and scenic river is the Rio Grande, located in west Texas between the Mexico/United States border. The designated segment begins in Big Bend National Park above Mariscal Canyon and continues 191 miles to the Terrell-Val Verde County line. The closest portion of this Wild and Scenic River is approximately 252 miles from the proposed project site.

UNIQUE NATURAL FEATURES

No unique natural features or critical environmental features were identified on the project site. During the December 7th site visit, the site was inspected for seeps, springs, wetlands and associated plants and soil, and significant trees. None of the above features were identified during the site investigation.

AGRICULTURAL LANDS

The Farmland Protection Policy Act (FPPA) is intended to minimize the impact that federal programs have on the unnecessary and irreversible conversion of farmland to nonagricultural uses. For this project site, the FPPA is not applicable because the proposed project site is already developed, thus, no prime farmland soils will be impacted. Although some ranch/farmland is present in the surrounding area and adjacent lots, farmland does not currently exist on the project site.

4.8 Vegetation and Wildlife

VEGETATION

The proposed project is located in the Blackland Prairies Natural Region of Texas (Gould, 1960). The Blackland Prairies region was formerly a medium-tallgrass prairie dominated by dropseeds (*Sporobolus sp.*), switchgrass (*Panicum virgatum*), eastern gamagrass (*Tripsacum dactyloides*), yellow indiangrass (*Sorghastrum nutans*), big bluestem (*Andropogon gerardii*), and little bluestem (*Schizachyrium scoparium*) (Telfair, 1999). Grassland areas were interspersed with smaller woodland patches dominated by deciduous trees. However, little of the original



grassland remains in the region due to conversion of the land for agricultural purposes, including both farming and livestock grazing.

According to The Vegetation Types of Texas, vegetation of the project area is mapped as Post Oak Woods/Forest (McMahan, et. al, 1984). This vegetation type consists of woodland vegetation dominated by oaks (*Quercus sp.*), junipers (*Juniperus sp.*), mesquite (*Prosopis glandulosa*), cedar elm (*Ulmus crassifolia*), and sugar hackberry (*Celtis laevigata*), with an understory comprised of grasses and forbs. The natural region and vegetation type are shown on **Figure 4F – Natural Regions and Vegetation Types Map**.

Vegetation within the project area is dominated by grasses and forbs, with some scattered trees and shrubs. Project area vegetation appears to have been disturbed by recent mowing. The majority of the project area consists of grassland dominated by common bermudagrass (*Cynodon dactylon*), and Johnsongrass (*Sorghum halepense*). Other species observed in the area include giant ragweed (*Ambrosia trifida*), sunflower (*Helianthus sp.*), black-eyed susan (*Rudbeckia hirta*), goldenrod (*Solidago sp.*), and Mexican hat (*Ratibida columnaris*). A few honey mesquite saplings are also found in the area.

Some fenceline vegetation is present along fences around the properties adjacent to the project. Fenceline vegetation is dominated by honey mesquite. Other tree species found along the fenceline include sugar hackberry and live oak (*Quercus virginiana*). Trees near the fenceline would remain undisturbed.

Approximately 0.65 acres of existing grassland vegetation would be removed for construction of the proposed residences. Based on a field visit conducted by CMEC on July 5, 2010, no rare or unique vegetation types are present within or adjacent to the proposed project area, and none would be impacted. No unusually large trees would be impacted.

WILDLIFE

The project area is located within the Texan Biotic Province, as mapped by Blair (1950). The Texan Biotic Province generally corresponds to the Blackland Prairies region of the state. Approximately 49 species of mammals, 23 species of amphibians (including five amphibians and



18 frogs/toads), and 57 species of reptiles (including two turtles, 16 lizards, and 39 snakes) can be found in the region (Blair, 1950). Approximately 471 species of birds can be found in the region (Freeman, 2003). Common species are listed below.

Typical mammal species found in the vicinity of the proposed project include the Virginia opossum (*Didelphis virginiana*), Mexican free-tailed bat (*Tadarida brasiliensis*), eastern cottontail (*Sylvilagus floridanus*), hispid cotton rat (*Sigmodon hispidus*), deer mouse (*Peromyscus maniculatus*), coyote (*Canis latrans*), common raccoon (*Procyon lotor*), striped skunk (*Mephitis mephitis*), bobcat (*Lynx rufus*), and white-tailed deer (*Odocoileus virginianus*) (Davis and Schmidley, 1994).

Common amphibian species found in the project vicinity include the gulf coast toad (*Bufo valliceps*), Woodhouse's toad (*Bufo woodhousii*), Great Plains narrow-mouthed toad (*Gastrophryne olivaceous*), green treefrog (*Hyla cinerea*), Strecker's chorus frog (*Pseudacris strecker*), bullfrog (*Rana catesbeiana*), Rio Grande leopard frog (*R. berlandieri*), southern leopard frog (*R. sphenocephala*), and Couch's spadefoot (*Scaphiopus couchii*). Common reptiles include the red-eared slider (*Trachemys scripta elegans*), common snapping turtle (*Chelydra serpentina*), green anole (*Anolis carolinensis*), six-lined racerunner (*Cnemidophorus sexlineatus*), cottonmouth (*Agkistrodon piscivorus*), Texas rat snake (*Elaphe obsoleta*), eastern hog-nosed snake (*Heterodon platirhinos*), coachwhip (*Masticophis flagellum*), diamond-backed water snake (*Nerodia rhombifer*), bullsnake (*Pituophis catenifer*), and eastern garter snake (*Thamnophis sirtalis*) (TCWC, 2009).

Avian species common to the vicinity of the project include the Great Blue Heron (*Ardea herodias*), Black Vulture (*Coryagyps atratus*), Turkey Vulture (*Cathartes aura*), Red-shouldered Hawk (*Buteo lineatus*), Killdeer (*Charadrius vociferous*), White-winged Dove (*Zenaida asiatica*), Mourning Dove (*Z. macroura*), Eastern Screech Owl (Megascops asio), Great Horned Owl (*Bubo virginianus*), Red-bellied Woodpecker (*Melanerpes carolinus*), Ladder-backed Woodpecker (*Picoides scalaris*), Blue Jay (*Cyanocitta cristata*), American Crow (*Corvus brachyrhynchos*), Carolina Chickadee (*Poecile carolinensis*), Tufted Titmouse (*Baeolophus bicolor*), Carolina Wren (*Thryothorus ludovicianus*), Northern Mockingbird (*Mimus polyglottos*), European Starling (*Sturnus vulgaris*), Northern Cardinal (*Cardinalis cardinalis*), Red-winged Blackbird (*Agelaius phoeniceus*), Eastern Meadowlark (*Sturnella magna*), Great-tailed Grackle (*Quiscalus mexicanus*), Brown-headed Cowbird (*Molothrus ater*), and House Sparrow (*Passer domesticus*) (Freeman, 2003).

THREATENED OR ENDANGERED SPECIES

Lists of threatened and endangered species maintained by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) were consulted to determine which species could occur in the vicinity of the proposed project. A total of 12 federally-listed endangered species, eight state-listed threatened species, four federal candidate species and one species proposed for federal listing as threatened were identified as having the potential to occur in Travis County. These species are listed in **Table 5**, along with their listing status, a description of appropriate habitat, and a determination of whether habitat for those species occurs within the project area.

In addition to the species listed in **Table 5**, 22 species of concern could also occur in Travis County (TPWD, 2010). These include six plants (basin bellflower, Campanula reverchonii; bracted twistflower, Streptanthus bracteatus; canyon mock-orange, Philadelphus ernestii; Correll's false dragon head, Physostegia correllii, Texabama croton, Croton alabamensis var texensis; and Warnock's coral-root, Hexalectris warnockil), one mollusk (creeper, Strophitus undulatus; pistolgrip, Tritogonia verrucosa; and rock pocketbook, Arcidens confragosus), three crustaceans (an amphipod, Stygobromus russelli, Balcones Cave amphipod, Stygobromus balconis; and bifurcated cave amphipod, Stygobromus bifurcatus), one arachnid (Bandit Cave spider, Cicurina bandida), three insects (Leonora's dancer damselfly, Argia leonorae; Rawson's metalmark, Calephelis rawsoni; and Tooth Cave blind rove beetle, Cylindropsis sp 1), one fish (Guadalupe bass, *Microperus treculii*), one amphibian (Pedernales River springs salamander, Eurycea sp 6), two reptiles (spot-tailed earless lizard, Holbrookia lacerata, and Texas garter snake, Thamnophis sirtalis annectens), two birds (Arctic Peregrine Falcon, Falco peregrinus tundrius; and Western Burrowing Owl, Athene cunicularia hypugaea), and two mammals (cave myotis bat, Myotis velifer, and plains spotted skunk, Spilogale putorius interrupta). Species of concern are locally rare, but are not currently listed as threatened or endangered at either the state or federal levels.

TPWD's Texas Natural Diversity Database (TXNDD) was consulted on April 7, 2010 for information regarding recorded occurrences of threatened and endangered species in the project vicinity. According to the TXNDD, no occurrences of threatened or endangered species have been reported within or adjacent to the project area (TXNDD, 2010). No recorded occurrences of any listed species occur within five miles of the project area.

The proposed project is located outside of the area included on the Balcones Canyonlands Conservation Plan habitat maps (BCCP, 2006). No known or suspected Golden-cheeked Warbler (*Dendroica chrysoparia*) or Black-capped Vireo (*Vireo atricapilla*) habitat has been mapped in the vicinity of the project area and none was identified during field investigations.

According to the 2007 revised Karst Zone Maps for the Austin area, the proposed project is located outside of the area mapped by George Veni and Associates as likely to contain endangered cave species (Veni, 2007). Therefore, no impacts to karst invertebrates would occur as a result of the proposed project.

Federally-listed species and their habitats are protected under the Endangered Species Act of 1973. No critical habitat for federally-listed species occurs within the project area. No habitat for any federally-listed threatened or endangered species was observed within the project area during field investigations; therefore, no effects to federally-listed species are anticipated as a result of the project.

Under state law, direct impacts to state-listed species are prohibited. No impacts to state-listed species would occur. If any individuals of state-listed species are observed within the project area during construction, care should be taken to avoid any impacts to the species.

4.9 Cultural Resources and Historic Preservation

Because the proposed project involves both a political subdivision of the State of Texas (Travis County) and federal funding via the HUD, both the Texas Antiquities Code and Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) apply. According to a search of the restricted Sites Atlas maintained by the Texas Historical Commission (THC) and the Texas Archeological



Research Laboratory (TARL), no known archeological sites, historic cemeteries, Official State Historical Markers, State Archeological Landmarks (SALs), or properties or districts listed on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) are located in the project area (THC, 2010). Within 0.62 miles of the project area, five archeological sites have been recorded, all located at a distance of approximately 0.56-0.62 miles:

- 41TV1108, a minor scatter of possibly prehistoric lithics and historic-age debris;
- 41TV1111, a minor deposit of historic-age debris along with a shed and corral;
- 41TV1255, a deposit of lithic flakes and possible cores characterized by the recorders as ineligible for NRHP/SAL status;
- 41TV1275, a multi-component site with burned rock, lithics, and historic-age ceramics, tested by PBS&J and found to be ineligible for NRHP/SAL status; and
- 41TV1987, a very large (approximately 984 feet in diameter) deposit of diagnostic lithics and other materials, including a human cranial fragment. Also tested by PBS&J, the site was found to lack the integrity and data potential necessary for NRHP/SAL status (THC, 2010).

According to the Atlas, the current project area was included in two archeological surveys carried out in 1985 and 1986 by Espey, Huston and Associates (EHA) for the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Austin Municipal Utility District (MUD); no archeological sites were documented within the project area, although several were documented within 0.56-0.62 miles, as discussed above (THC, 2010). Other surveys for the EPA and Austin MUD were carried out north and west of the project area, also in the 1980s. Later nearby surveys include SH 130 corridor studies performed from 2001 through 2005 by PBS&J and Hicks & Company 0.5 miles to the west (sponsored by the Texas Department of Transportation [TxDOT] and the Federal Highway Administration [FHWA]), as well as a 2008 survey carried out by Raba-Kistner for the Del Valle Independent School District (ISD). The latter project, which concerned a 27-acre parcel immediately across Gilbert Road from the present project area, entailed the excavation of 15 shovel test units, none of which yielded cultural materials (Held, 2009). Overall, despite the presence of known sites within 0.62 miles, the 1985-1986 EHA surveys of the project area and the recent Raba-Kistner survey across the road from it illustrate the low archeological potential of the project area and its immediate environs.

To fully evaluate the proposed work's potential for impacts to historic-age structures as well as archeological sites, additional review was undertaken of documents such as historic aerial photographs (available via aggregators such as HistoricAerials.com), historic maps in the Texas Historic Overlay (THO) (Foster et al., 2006), and property records maintained by the Travis Central Appraisal District (TCAD). The proposed construction will not directly impact any standing structures, as the area has been completely cleared.

To comply with Section 106 requirements, indirect impacts were also considered, particularly via changes in the visual environment. All parcels adjacent to the project area were examined. Indications of two structures immediately southeast of the project area were found on 1896 and 1955 United States Geological Survey (USGS) quadrangle maps available in the THO. However, no evidence of structures was visible at that location in aerial photographs of any age, from the mid-twentieth century through 2009, or on the more recent USGS quadrangle maps, published in 1988 and 2010. The TCAD deed record for the parcel that apparently contained these structures contained a reference to a residence with a 1950 build date (TCAD parcel ID



0202500208). However, this structure does not appear to correspond to the locations of the notations on the USGS maps; it is visible in aerial photographs on the south end of the parcel, approximately 0.37 miles from the project area. Even if the 1950 residence were eligible for the NRHP, it would not be indirectly affected by the proposed residences in the Gilbert Lane New Housing Development, as it is located at a considerable distance from the project area and is screened from potential visual impacts by heavy tree cover on the parcel upon which it is located and on intervening parcels. No other evidence of structures was found in the archival research, and no other deed records for parcels adjacent to the project area contained any mention of structures other than modern residences (typically dating to the 1980s-2000s).

The results of this background research were forwarded to THC on December 15, 2010, accompanied by a recommendation that no further archeological or historic-structures research is undertaken. THC concurred on January 11, 2011 that no survey is required. **Appendix F** – **Agency Coordination**.

4.10 Other Factors

FLOOD DISASTER PROTECTION ACT (FLOOD INSURANCE)

Executive Order 11988 "Floodplain Management" requires Federal agencies to avoid actions, to the extent practicable that will result in the location of facilities in floodplains and/or affect floodplain values. HUD regulations for protecting floodplains (24 CFR Part 55 Floodplain Management) restrict financial support for projects located within the designated 100-year floodplain, unless it can be demonstrated that there are no practicable alternatives outside of the floodplain.

None of the four lots are within the existing FEMA 100-year floodplain as illustrated on the FIRM Map Panel 48453C0490H (Effective Date - September 26, 2008). In addition, as part of the overall subdivision development, a FEMA Conditional Letter of Map Revision (CLOMR, Case No. 06-06-BC44R) has been issued confirming that completed channelization and land grading improvements will establish the four lots for this project to be outside the 100-yr floodplain. **Appendix B – Subdivision Plans** (Sheet 5) shows the Revised Effective FEMA floodplain (based on an updated FEMA model without the proposed development) and the proposed floodplain, as developed for the FEMA CLOMR submittal. All drainage improvements proposed by the CLOMR are substantially complete, as observed on the December 7, 2010 site visit and concurred by the subdivision engineer. The final Letter of Map Revision has been submitted and is awaiting FEMA approval.

Figure 4G – Floodplain Map has been included to illustrate the boundary for the 100-year (Zone A) floodplain (FIRM, Map Panel 48453C0490H, Effective Date - September 26, 2008) Based on the FIRM floodplain boundary, all four lots are entirely out of the 100-year floodplain. Figure 4G also illustrates the approved (proposed) CLOMR 100-year floodplain boundary.

COASTAL BARRIER RESOURCES ACT/COASTAL BARRIER IMPROVEMENT ACT

The Federal Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972 provided that coastal states develop resource-management programs to regulate coastal resources. In 1975, the state of Texas developed the Texas Coastal Management Program. Currently managed by the Texas General Land Office, the Coastal Management Program is designed to protect the following counties:



Aransas; Brazoria; Calhoun; Cameron; Chambers; Galveston; Jackson; Jefferson; Kenedy; Kleberg; Matagorda; Nueces; Orange; Refugio; San Patricio; Victoria; and, Willacy. **Figure 4G** – **Coastal Zone Map**, illustrates the boundary of the Texas coastal zone in relation to Travis County. This project is not located within a coastal zone as defined by the Texas Coastal Management Program.

AIRPORT RUNWAY CLEAR ZONES OR CLEAR ZONE DISCLOSURE

HUD policy as described in 24 CFR 51, Subpart D, describes that assistance for construction or major rehabilitation of any real property located on a clear zone site is prohibited for a project that will be frequently used or occupied by people. The proposed housing development site is not located close enough to any airfield (civil or military) for this to be applicable.

The nearest civil runway is the east runway at Austin Bergstrom International Airport, located approximately 28,000 feet (5.3 miles) southwest from the proposed housing development site. No military runways exist within Travis County, so the site is clear of the 8,000 feet clearance for military airfield runways as well. See **Figure 1B** for project location in relation to Austin Bergstrom International Airport (ABIA).

5.0 Public Involvement

The land acquisition project must go through several public comment processes in order to proceed. The first public comment period lasted for 30 days and ended on December 23rd. The Travis County Commissioners Court (TCCC) gave final approval of the project on January 11th.

After completion of the environmental assessment and TCCC approved posting of the Environmental Report, the public will have 18 days to provide written comment to Travis County regarding any concerns on the project's impact to the environment and an additional 15 day written comment period to HUD to identify any procedural issues related to the completion of the Environmental Assessment. The anticipated dates for the Travis County and HUD written comment periods are January 26th through February 14th and February 17th through March 3rd, respectively. The anticipated Release of Funds is anticipated on or about March 4, 2011.

6.0 Mitigation Measures Recommended

No significant or adverse impacts resulting from this project were determined during this environmental assessment. However, all construction events have disruptive noises and some temporary effects on soils and nearby waterways. During the construction of the proposed four homes, Austin Habitat for Humanity is to carry out the following mitigation measures:

- A Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SW3P) is required by TCEQ for this project. The SW3P will be prepared by the design (engineering) firm and managed during construction activities.
- Appropriate dust control methods are currently in use for surrounding industrial activities; and more will be employed during construction phase for this project.
- Revegetation will be completed in a timely manner after completion of construction to protect natural features and nearby waterways, and to prevent erosion.



• Construction activities will be limited to normal daytime hours to minimize disruptive noises from construction equipment, machinery and vehicles.

In addition, a stormwater detention/wet pond has already been constructed to capture and treat stormwater from the subdivision site before it enters Decker Creek.

7.0 Summary of Findings and Conclusions

This environmental assessment shows that the proposed project on Gilbert Road would not have any significant effects on the surrounding natural or man-made environment. All requirements of the NEPA Statutes and Authorities (24 CFR Part 58.5 and 58.6) and HUD environmental standards (24 CFR Part 51) have been met for this project; and in conclusion, this assessment has determined a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI).

As a political subdivision of the State of Texas, Travis County requests your input regarding Phase Two of the Gilbert Lane New Housing Development project, located approximately 2.4 km (1.5 miles) south of Walter E. Long Lake and 0.8 km (0.5 miles) east of SH 130 in eastern Travis County, Texas (Figure 1). As part of the project, Travis County proposes to work with Austin Habitat for Humanity (hereafter Habitat) to secure an estimated \$174,000 in U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant funding for the purchase of four single-family residential lots (covering a total area of approximately 0.26 hectares [0.65 acres]) within the partially constructed Gilbert Lane subdivision, as well as additional funding through other sources for the construction of new residences for low- to moderate-income families. The Habitat residences would be constructed on home sites in an existing subdivision that has already been cleared and leveled under previous development projects undertaken by others (Figures 2 and 3). The proposed work has a federal component—and therefore National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) Section 106 implications—via the HUD Community Development Block Grant funding.

Note: the first phase of this project, which included 27 proposed residences to be constructed adjacent to the present project area, was cleared by the Texas Historical Commission on July 5, 2010.

The project area is located on level terraces associated with the Colorado River and its tributaries, two of which bracket the project area: Elm Creek approximately 2 km (1.2 miles) to the southwest, and Decker Creek 2 km (1.2 miles) to the northeast, while the main channel of the Colorado is located approximately 5 km (3.1 miles) to the south. Geologically, the project area is underlain by Holocene terrace deposits (Stoeser et al. 2007). A single soil map unit is present in the project area: Burleson clay on 0-1 percent slopes (NRCS 2010b). This very deep, fine, moderately well-drained soil is characterized by extensive vertisolic cracking, reducing the integrity of archeological deposits even in undisturbed areas (NRCS 2010a).

According to a search of the Texas Historic Sites Atlas maintained by the THC and the Texas Archeological Research Laboratory (TARL), no known archeological sites, historic cemeteries, Official State Historical Markers, State Archeological Landmarks (SALs), or properties or districts listed on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) are located in the project area (THC 2010). Within 1 km (0.62 miles) of the project area, five archeological sites have been recorded, all located at a distance of approximately 0.9-1 km (0.56-0.62 miles):

- 41TV1108, a minor scatter of possibly prehistoric lithics and historic-age debris;
- 41TV1111, a minor deposit of historic-age debris along with a shed and corral;
- 41TV1255, a deposit of lithic flakes and possible cores characterized by the recorders as ineligible for NRHP/SAL status;
- 41TV1275, a multicomponent site with burned rock, lithics, and historic-age ceramics, tested by PBS&J and found to be ineligible for NRHP/SAL status; and



 41TV1987, a very large (approximately 300 m [984 ft] in diameter) deposit of diagnostic lithics and other materials, including a human cranial fragment. Also tested by PBS&J, the site was found to lack the integrity and data potential necessary for NRHP/SAL status (THC 2010).

According to the Atlas, the current project area was included in two archeological surveys carried out in 1985 and 1986 by Espey, Huston and Associates (EHA) for the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Austin Municipal Utility District (MUD); no archeological sites were documented within the project area, although several were documented within 0.9-1 km (0.56-0.62 miles), as discussed above (THC 2010). Other surveys for the EPA and Austin MUD were carried out north and west of the project area, also in the 1980s. Later nearby surveys include SH 130 corridor studies performed from 2001 through 2005 by PBS&J and Hicks and Company 0.8 km (0.5 miles) to the west (sponsored by the Texas Department of Transportation [TxDOT] and the Federal Highway Administration [FHWA]), as well as a 2008 survey carried out by Raba-Kistner for the Del Valle Independent School District (ISD). The latter project, which concerned a 27-acre parcel immediately across Gilbert Lane (also Gilbert Road on some maps) from the present project area, entailed the excavation of 15 shovel test units, none of which yielded cultural materials (Held 2009). Overall, despite the presence of known sites within 1 km (0.62 miles), the 1985-1986 EHA surveys of the project area and the recent Raba-Kistner survey across the road from it illustrate the low archeological potential of the project area and its immediate environs.

In addition to a low baseline level of archeological probability, the project area and the area around it are characterized by an extremely high level of previous disturbance. During previous projects undertaken by the subdivision developers, the entire area was cleared of vegetation, bladed, and excavated by heavy equipment for utility installation, road construction, and the preparation of residential lots (see Figure 2). Also, various fill sediments were brought in to level the area; these fills are visible as a patchwork of contrasting ground-surface colors in Figure 2. Following these activities, short streets ending in cul-de-sacs were constructed, and the area was trenched for utility lines to serve future residences (see Figure 3).

To fully evaluate the proposed work's potential for impacts to historic-age structures as well as archeological sites, additional review was undertaken of documents such as historic aerial photographs (available via aggregators such as HistoricAerials.com), historic maps in the Texas Historic Overlay (THO) (Foster et al. 2006), and property records maintained by the Travis Central Appraisal District (TCAD). The proposed construction will not directly impact any standing structures, as the area has been completely cleared (see Figures 2 and 3). Due to the applicability of Section 106 to the proposed work, indirect impacts were also considered, particularly via changes in the visual environment. All parcels adjacent to the project area were examined. Indications of two structures immediately southeast of the project area were found on 1896 and 1955 United States Geological Survey (USGS) quadrangle maps available in the THO. However, no evidence of structures was visible at that location in aerial photographs of any age, from the mid-twentieth century through 2009, or on the more recent USGS guadrangle maps, published in 1988 and 2010. The TCAD deed record for the parcel that apparently contained these structures contained a reference to a residence with a 1950 build date (TCAD parcel ID 0202500208). However, this structure does not appear to correspond to the locations of the notations on the USGS maps; it is visible in aerial photographs on the south end of the parcel, approximately 0.6 km (0.37 miles) from the project area (see Figure 3). Even if the 1950 residence were eligible for the NRHP, it would not be indirectly affected by the proposed residences in the Gilbert Lane New Housing Development, as it is located at a considerable distance from the project area and is screened from potential visual impacts by heavy tree cover on the parcel upon which it is located and on intervening parcels. No other evidence of structures was found in the archival research, and no other deed records for

parcels adjacent to the project area contained any mention of structures other than modern residences (typically dating to the 1980s-2000s).

Given the low archeological probability of the project area (as illustrated by the negative results of previous surveys within and adjacent to it, as well as its dominant soil map unit) and its high level of previous disturbance, Cox | McLain Environmental Consulting, Inc. (CMEC) recommends no further archeological study prior to the proposed construction. In addition, based upon the review of aerial photographs, historic maps, and property data for the parcels surrounding the project area, CMEC recommends that the proposed construction will have no direct or indirect impact on historic-age standing structures, and therefore recommends no further historic study. We ask for your concurrence with these recommendations.




Figure 1. Project area location on USGS topographic base (Manor quadrangle).






Figure 2. Aerial photograph (2007) with property boundaries marked in red and the project area in blue. The entire project area was bladed and excavated by heavy equipment for utility installation, road construction, and the preparation of residential lots. In addition, various fills were brought in to level the area (visible as contrasting sediment colors). The aboveground water storage tank at the southwest corner of the project area replaced an earlier (although not historic-age) water tank noted on the 1988 USGS map (Manor quad) shown in Figure 1.

The attached Budget Adjustment from the Allocated Reserve in the amount of \$110,000 is intended to ensure sufficient budget is available to proceed with the Lake Travis Economic and Water Quality Study. The Commissioners Court approved the following as part of Item #23 on November 23, 2010:

- "Travis County support, in principal, participating with the other stakeholders in commissioning a consultant to study the economic value of Lake Travis
- Commit \$20,000.00 towards this project
- Agree to serve as Fiscal Agent for the stakeholder group via interlocal agreements which would be brought back later as they are drafted and executed
- Provide in-kind services including legal, scientific and facilitating contract procurement for the project."

In order to proceed with the estimated \$130,000 contract, the General Fund Allocated Reserve will need to be reduced by \$110,000 (with the remaining \$20,000 for Travis County's portion coming from TNR internal funds). These funds are expected to be certified and returned in FY 11 to the reserves as agreements are finalized. TNR states that in the event that the outside commitment is less than \$110,000, TNR will request to modify the contract and any unused funds would then be returned to the Allocated Reserve. PBO recommends approval of the attached budget adjustment to facilitate the previously Commissioners Court approved project.

Proposed Motion

Approve a budget transfer for \$110,000 from General Fund Reserves for the Lake Travis Economic and Water Quality Study.

Summary and Staff Recommendation

TNR is requesting that the Commissioner's Court approve a transfer of \$110,000 from the General Fund Allocated Reserve account 001-9800-981-9892 for a relocation benefit payment to partially fund the contract award for the Lake Travis Economic and Water Quality Study.

On November 23, 2010, the Commissioners Court approved participation in the Lake Travis Economic and Water Quality Study. Travis County is partnering with approximately 17 other organizations on a study that will evaluate the economic value of Lake Travis. The anticipated total cost of the study and related public information documents is \$130,000. TNR will be providing \$20,000 from its budget for the County's portion. The remaining \$110,000 is due from the other participants. The results of this study are needed prior to the close of the 2011 State Legislature, and therefore funding is required immediately in order to award a contract. Since the County will act as the project leader, we will be contracting with the consultant. In discussions between Commissioner Huber's Office, PBO, the Auditor's Office, and TNR, it was recommended that the County use Allocated Reserves to allow the award. As agreements are signed with each of the parties, their funds will be deposited back into the County's Allocated Reserve account.

Budgetary and Fiscal Impact

This request will reduce the General Fund Allocated Reserve (001-9800-981-9892) by \$110,000. However, as funds are received from the other participating organizations, those fund will be deposited back into the County's Allocated Reserve. In the unlikely event that the total financial commitment from the other participating organizations is less than the \$110,000, TNR will be requesting a contract modification to limit the scope of the study to match the total funding ĕ,

â

available. Furthermore, if the contract is modified to a more limited scope, any unused funds will be returned to the General Fund Allocated Reserve.

SUMMARY AND IGR RECOMMENDATION

IGR recommends adoption of the following additional item to the Policy Positions section of the County's legislative agenda:

Support legislation that would restrict the ability of a homeowners' association to prohibit the installation of solar panels on a home. (GMLU-5).

ISSUES AND OPPORTUNITIES

IGR recommends expanding the County's legislative agenda to address the issue of homeowners' association restrictions on the rooftop installation of solar panels.

In recent years, the rooftop installation and use of solar panels on residential structures has grown significantly. Solar panels on houses offer several advantages:

- * A typical solar power system sufficient to power a house has no moving parts. Consequently, the array requires very little maintenance time.
- The basic components of a solar power system for homes are easily expandable – a homeowner can install as much generating capacity as needed. Moreover, many smaller units are easily transportable.
- Solar power also has stout environmental credentials. The fuel that generates solar power is a free, clean, sustainable and renewable resource.
- ★ Because solar panels have next to no moving parts, solar power creates absolutely no noise pollution in a residential setting.
- Solar power offers independence from the "grid" to its users. Power outages do not affect people who generate electricity through solar panels. Moreover, "distributed energy" programs like those offered by Austin Energy allow homeowners to sell excess power generated on their solar arrays back to the grid.

Homeowners' associations (HOAs) are intended to maintain common areas in residential neighborhoods and to protect homeowners' investments in their property by enforcing certain aesthetic guidelines. In recent years, some HOAs have prohibited the installation of solar panels on or near residences, much to the frustration of individual homeowners.

This session, four bills have been filed to balance the community's interest in maintaining consistent aesthetics with the freedom of individual homeowners to make investments in clean energy. All of the proposed bills are essentially the same, and prohibit a property owners' association from imposing or enforcing a restriction against solar energy devices, except under certain listed circumstances. The bills also provide that restrictions that violate the law are void. The bills are <u>HB 450</u> (by Lucio), <u>SB 238</u> (by West), <u>SB 302</u> (by Wentworth), and <u>SB 447</u> (by Jackson).

Highlights of Legislative Activities
Tuesday, February 15, 2011

- 1. The **Senate Finance Committee** has already completed public hearings on the 2012-2013 budget for Article II, which covers health and human services, and is now considering Article III on education. Beginning Wednesday, February 16, it will turn to Article I, the general government agencies, proposed cuts to some of which may affect Travis County. *A complete schedule of Senate Finance Committee hearings is attached*.
- 2. The Senate Committee Coordinator has published a **weekly hearing schedule for Senate committees**. *The schedule is attached*.
- 3. **House committee assignments** were made on Wednesday, February 9th. A list of the assignments, by committee and by member, has already been provided to your offices.
- 4. The **House Appropriations Committee** began its hearings on Thursday, February 10th, at 7:00 a.m. This will be an organizational meeting, and we'll report to the Court as soon as they have developed a schedule of hearings on HB 1.
- Another of Travis County's legislative priorities clarifying the authority of a commissioners court to delegate the lifting of a burn ban to another person has taken shape in <u>House Bill 1174</u> by Rep. Paul Workman.
- 6. Here is the status of the **Governor's five emergency items**:
 - a. Voter ID: SB 14 passed the Senate, awaiting committee referral in the House
 - b. Eminent domain: the State Affairs Committee passed out a bill on Monday, February 7, and passed the Senate on Wednesday, February 9. The bill is on its way to the House.
 - c. Sanctuary cities: no hearings scheduled on the plethora of immigration-related bills
 - d. Mandatory sonograms: the Senate State Affairs Committee heard testimony on Wednesday, March 9,
 - e. Balanced budget amendment: this calls for a concurrent resolution by the two chambers; three House Concurrent Resolutions have been filed.
- 7. The board of the Conference of Urban Counties (CUC) met last week and ratified the actions of its Policy Committee in support of several Travis County initiatives.
- 8. The IGR staff and your legislative consultant are setting up **office visits** with members of the key House committees affecting Travis County-related legislation: County Affairs, Ways and Means, and Natural Resources. We have already been visiting with members of relevant Senate committees.
- 9. As of Wednesday, February 9, the IGR staff is tracking **454** bills. Key County staffers are analyzing relevant bills through the ATLAS system.

Travis homeowner, association tangle over solar panels

Legislature weighs whether to stop associations from preventing energy-saving devices.





Atop a Hill Country bluff where builders have cleared land for his half-finished 6,000-squarefoot home, John Thoppil says that he and his wife moved to Austin's outskirts because they "like the environmental attitude here."

But when Thoppil wanted to add solar panels to his Travis County home to power a water heater, he was met with disapproval from the Caslano homeowners association.

In January, the association's architectural control committee rejected the panels because they would be visible to neighbors.

The dispute comes as lawmakers propose measures that would stop homeowners associations from interfering with owners' efforts to erect solar devices, as long as they are on a roof or in fenced-in property.

"I think it's really very reasonable," said Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, one of at least three state senators to file such a proposal. "I don't have much patience for those sorts of nit-picky rules."

Similar proposals failed in the previous session, but so did most bills, as a few controversial measures gummed up the 2009 Legislature.

There's precedent for the Legislature to pass the proposal: A 2003 state law authored by Rep. Robert Puente, D-San Antonio, prevents property owners' associations from prohibiting watersaving measures such as installing rain barrels or implementing efficient irrigation systems. But the Wentworth measure is likely to face opposition as long as it allows homeowners an unrestrained right to put up the panels, said Greg Cagle, a lawyer who represents homeowners and associations and has written the book "Texas Homeowners Association Law."

"I don't think there's a significant opposition to homeowners having the right to have solar panels so long as they are erected and constructed in a manner consistent and harmonious with the community and not obtrusive," Cagle said.

But in the dispute at the Caslano subdivision, one person's harmony is another's cacophony. The letter to Thoppil from the architectural control committee reads: "Based on the information submitted, on-site review, and consultation with neighbors we have determined that the proposed placement of these panels makes them visible from neighboring properties and community common areas and we, therefore, must reject this request."

Sandy Denton, a spokeswoman for Texas Community Association Advocates, which represents homeowners associations and homebuilders, among others, echoed Cagle. "We certainly are supportive of solar panels and other energy-saving devices, but we support the concept that associations should have the right to establish guidelines for aesthetics purposes," Denton said. "Solar panels placed anywhere could be detrimental to property values."

Thoppil, an OB-GYN in Cedar Park, said that any legislative relief would come too late for his house as it nears completion.

He said he and his wife, a Round Rock pediatrician, who have a 1-year-old child, are building an energy-efficient house. "Hydrocarbons cause damage to our environment," he said. The back patio with the deep swimming pool is an easy place to forget about the 25-minute commute to work in his BMW convertible.

Thoppil said his car is more energy-efficient than most, that it was hard to find an attractive piece of land near the medical centers, and that he and his wife are building a large home to house a large extended family, which spends as much as half the year with them.

"We respect their job in protecting the neighborhood," Thoppil said of the architectural control committee, "but we differ with them on what's aesthetically pleasing." *asherprice@statesman.com*; 445-3643

Who makes the rules?


A homeowners association is an organization including all the homeowners of units in a development. The association often has an elected board, which collects fees, maintains common areas and enforces the group's rules.

A deed restriction, also known as a restrictive covenant, places legal limits on land developments and persists even if the land is sold. Some are simple, and others are very specific. Homeowner advocates recommend that buyers ask a title company to check what – if any – deed restrictions exist on property they might buy.

Summary and Staff Recommendation:

Staff has received a request from the property owner's agent requesting to vacate a portion of a drainage easement located along the back portion of the owner's lot, which is better described as Lot 18, Block A of Granada Oaks. The drainage easement in question is of various widths and basically encompasses the rear half of the lot. The purpose of this request is so that the lot would have a larger buildable area.

A drainage study was performed by Professional engineer Robert C. Thompson. Mr. Thompson then submitted a drainage report summarizing his findings along with a Letter of Map Revision (LOMR) for this area. In the report Mr. Thompson states:

"The purpose of this study was to assess if some of the drainage easement on Lot 18 could be released. Based on this work, it is our opinion that most of the platted drainage easement at the south end and through the middle of Lot 18 can be released. However, the drainage easement on the north end is still required and is actually a little deficient. Therefore, with the request for release of a part of the drainage easement, we've also included the dedication of a bit more drainage easement to remedy the deficiency."

After review of the submitted drainage report and LOMR, Travis County engineer John Ellis has stated he has no objections to this vacation. TNR recommends the vacation of the

portion of the subject drainage easement as described in the attached Order of Vacation and as shown on the attached field notes and sketch.

According to the December 15, 2009 Interlocal Agreement between the Travis County Housing Finance Corporation (TCHFC) and the Housing Authority of Travis County (HATC), whereby TCHFC agreed to loan funds to HATC for payment of management assessment consulting services provided by SHCC Consultants and the independent auditor Agreed Upon Procedures performed by Leal and Carter to analyze the inter-fund balances identified by the HUD OIG audit, HATC is to provide an annual report on the value of resident services it has provided and claiming as a credit against the loan proceeds received from TCHFC.

HATC borrowed a total of \$8,415 during 2010; however, we are not seeking your consideration of a credit against the loan at this time. Conversely, we do want to inform the TCHFC Board that HATC partnered with Frameworks Community Development Corporation for delivery of the Financial Literacy Program series of workshops in 2010; a new program offered by HATC. Public housing and housing choice voucher residents were informed of the workshop topics and schedules through information flyers delivered on property, direct referrals from voucher staff, and advertisement during HATC staff meetings with residents. During the period June through November, 2010 two series of workshops were held at the HATC that were attended by 46 people. Frameworks donated these services to HATC and represented the value to be \$70.27 per person for a total of \$3,232. The value of HATC staff involved in these workshops will be presented to Mr. Harvey Davis prior to the next Annual Report presentation along with the request to receive a credit against the loan.






