AGENDA LANGUAGE: Receive comments regarding the DRAFT Colorado River Corridor Plan and recommended amendments, in Precinct One and four.

BACKGROUND/SUMMARY OF REQUEST AND ATTACHMENTS:

The Commissioners Court approved an Interlocal Agreement with the City of Austin and the Lower Colorado River Authority to develop a long range comprehensive plan for the development of the Colorado River Corridor between Austin and the Travis/Bastrop County line. A DRAFT plan was completed with assistance from the planning firm Bosse Pharis Associates, Inc. Staff held a public meeting and received comments which were posted on the Travis County web page. Staff review and recommended plan amendments are noted in Exhibit one and two.

The purpose of the Corridor Plan is to coordinate regional and local planning and private sector investment to facilitate the preservation and enhancement of valuable environmental, economic, recreational, and cultural resources of the plan area over the next twenty-five to thirty years. The Corridor Plan includes objectives for improved protection of local bio-diversity, preservation and restoration of floodplains and natural areas; the creation of parks, open spaces and greenways; enhancement of corridor quality of life through the long-term restoration and reclamation of mined sites; and enhancement of mobility through capital project development and new design alternatives.

Plan implementation requires private sector and intergovernmental cooperation since multiple government entities are responsible for the various aspects of transportation, natural resource conservation, and environmental protection in the corridor. The Corridor Plan is designed to improve collaboration at the regional and local level, and to enhance the knowledge and understanding of the valuable resources of the Colorado River.

ISSUES AND OPPORTUNITIES:

Planning involves a certain amount of risk-taking. When we engage in planning, we are attempting to shape the future in some desired way, but there can never be an assurance that planning will achieve what we hope it will achieve. We are continually aware of the possibility of failure. The risk elected officials take with specific planning initiatives are obvious and should not be underestimated.

IMPLEMENTATION

A single project or action rarely transforms a community. To be the best it can be, to create an identity and sense of place, the plan calls for sophisticated strategies, a call for actions and initiatives on a number of different fronts and in different geographic areas.

The plan is intended to be used as the basis for making choices. It's about where development should and should not occur, and about the types of development that are appropriate in different areas. There is little doubt, in this day and age, that we will have to be extremely creative and enterprising in identifying sources of public and private funding to implement the plan, and in coming up with innovative way for paying for proposed projects and improvements.

COURT SUPPORT and COMMITMENT

One of the most important ingredients for the corridor plan is for the community to believe that planning matters, which taking the time to try to think through and envision the kind of places we want our communities to be in the future is important, and that time spent developing plans aimed at fulfilling our aspirations is not wasted. If we are skeptical about the likelihood that projects and improvements envisioned in plans will ever be realized, we are much less likely to take planning seriously. When we don't take the plans we prepare seriously, we undermine the ability of planning to bring about positive change. An inability to believe in planning, and in the possibilities for translating plans into reality, can become a major impediment to successful planning. The plan outlines several strategies to be implemented over the next two years, strategies that are ongoing and more longer term items that may not be addressed for five years or more. It is our hope to be able to look back in twenty years and realize that something outstanding has been accomplished by this planning effort, something greater than we thought possible at the outset.

CITY OF AUSTIN

City of Austin Watershed Protection Department staff provided a briefing of the draft Colorado River Corridor Plan to the Environmental Board August 17, 2011. The Board recommended the adoption of the plan. COA staff provided a briefing to the Planning Commission on October 11, 2011. The Planning Commission recommended that a briefing also be provided to the Zoning and Platting Commission, the Waterfront Advisory Board, and the Parks Board. COA staff provided a briefing to the Zoning and Platting Commission on November 1, 2011, to the Waterfront Advisory Board on November 14, 2011, and to the Parks Board on December 6, 2011. Staff provided a memo to the City Council summarizing the Colorado River Corridor Plan, and advising them of the proposed schedule for adoption by the Travis County Commissioner's Court.

THE PLAN

The Colorado River Corridor Plan (Corridor Plan) builds upon the extraordinary assets of corridor to address short, medium and long term transportation, parks, and environmental needs. The Corridor Plan integrates the civic qualities of parks and greenbelts and urbanized vibrancy throughout the corridor. It aims to create locations for future cultural destinations, introduce a mix of uses, revitalize mineral extraction areas, establish a new "eco-corridor" and transform the corridor's experience.

The Corridor Plan presents a vision that accommodates new development while protecting the character and environmental quality of the Corridor. New urban areas are sited along major highways (SH 130, SH 71, FM 973 and FM 969 nodes). This relationship is aligned with the CAMPO 2035 "activity centers" concept.

Transportation corridors in the Corridor Plan have been developed with new multimodal mobility opportunities that currently do not exist within the corridor. Roadways that accommodate bikes lanes and sidewalks and a regional trails network are proposed to seamlessly connect throughout the area. People living and raising families within the corridor will find it an inviting place to live, work, and shop, while still moving motorists, cyclists and pedestrians throughout the corridor.

It is envisioned that transit will be fully integrated within the corridor and have connectivity to the Austin Bergstrom International Airport and the City of Austin's future Urban Rail stations. Congested roadways are planned to be improved and new connectivity created. FM 969 will become a focal "rural parkway" providing

mobility as well as highlighting the visual character of the Colorado River Corridor. Arterials that front along greenways will take advantage of the rural character that defines the corridor. New connectivity is also highlighted in the Concept Plan, especially from residential areas east of SH 130. For example, new connections from Austin's Colony to FM 973 are planned as well as a new regional arterial that crosses the Colorado River connecting FM 969 with SH 71.

The envisioned corridor-wide parks and greenway system – centered on the Colorado River, Onion Creek, Gilleland Creek, and other smaller creeks – weaves together developed and undeveloped lands. The intent is to provide the growing population of the corridor with opportunities to enjoy recreational and natural resources close to where they live and to mitigate the environmental impacts of increased impervious cover in watersheds. Recreational facilities will be built at destination parks; boat ramps will be constructed at FM 973 and SH 130 river crossings and at the confluence of Onion Creek with the Colorado River; and long distance hike and bike trails will be developed along the length of the linear greenways. Bottomland woods, grasslands, and wetlands will serve to capture and filter stormwater, recharge ground water, and mitigate flood damage.

With these land patterns, new transportation opportunities, and corridor-wide parks and greenway system, people living and raising families within the corridor will find it an inviting place to work, live, and shop.

The foundation of the Corridor Plan is the analysis of the following key elements outlined below:

- 1. Land Use
- 2. Drinking Water and Well Water
- 3. Transportation
- 4. Water Quality and Stormwater
- 5. Parks and Land Conservation

1. LAND USE

The Corridor Plan evaluated over 30,000 acres and 32 Colorado River miles. The current population in the corridor approximately10,000 with anticipated population growth over 30,000 by 2035. This is double the CAMPO 2035 projected increase of 10,000.

The most dominant land uses in the corridor are mining (resource extraction) estimated at 11,296 acres. TCAD does not list mining operations within a specific land use category; however, there are 6,549 acres of active and inactive mining operations.

The area is experiencing increased residential development. Current residential land area is 2,927 acres.

The conflict between these land uses (noise, traffic, visual impacts, etc.) is likely to continue in the near future as more residential and mining activity are planned in the corridor.

The area in around ABIA within the corridor is heavily impacted by the airport noise contour overlay. Land in this area is being actively purchased or mitigated by the City of Austin. There is a potential to work with the city to develop proper land use control in this area that increases open space and "re-brands" the front door to our city for many tourists and residents.

There is opportunity to plan the progression of land uses. Reclamation of 2,130 acres along SH 130 has been annouced by TXI, known as Rio de Vida, the area is expected to have a population of 12,000 to 16,000. These new uses can be anticipated to need orderly transition to accommodate transportation, parks, and storm water facilities. Over half of the acres are proposed to be set aside for green space.

There is opportunity to reduce total greenhouse gas emissions by improving bike and pedestrian infrastructure, incentivizing the growth of the number of bicycle and pedestrian commuters, create highly walkable pedestrian-only areas, and introduce new innovative forms of public space such as community gardens, wind energy, and underpass parks.

Rio de Vida and the Water's Edge developments have potential for future City of Austin annexation.

2. DRINKING WATER and WELL WATER SUPPLY

Private wells in the corridor are numerous and the ability to quantify the quality, exact quantity and map the location of these wells has improved as part of the study.

There is an opportunity through the infrastructure planned for future development (ie., Rio De Vida, Water's Edge, Austin Colony) projects to increase the water, electric and wastewater services in the area.

The County/City/LCRA joint support for establishing baseline well water data in the corridor is underway.

There is opportunity to leverage existing grey water infrastructure to improve water efficiency measures and use of appropriate plant species in public landscapes, enable greywater reuse for landscapes.

3. TRANSPORTATION

Expanse and flood plain of Colorado River limits number of potential crossings and north/south connectivity. Flood Plain crossings drive transportation costs up. Mining lands will preclude potential of a robust roadway network, and extraction methods and material movement will mix industrial and residential traffic.

The Corridor relies heavily on two roadways, FM 969 and SH 71, for access and mobility; these same highways provide mobility to developing areas north and south of the Corridor as well as Bastrop County.

Limited public transit service is provided by Capital Area Rural Transportation Service.

CAMPO's 2035 future land use traffic modeling may have under estimated traffic demands.

Improvements are planned for FM 973 and FM 969, and additional roadway connections were approved in the 2011 Bonds for Gilbert Lane.

There is opportunity to provide major regional north/south arterial connectivity from SH 71 East to the north by providing an additional Colorado River crossing.

There is opportunity to provide a significant amount of hike, bike, and pedestrian facilities along roadways and greenways helping to reduce vehicle trips.

4. STORMWATER AND WATER QUALITY

Of the 30,500 Acres in the corridor approx. 13,000 Acres currently lie within the 2008 FEMA 100 year floodplain.

Floodplain reclamation and modification standards that "retain the integrity of in stream channel stability and ecology, protect riparian areas and minimize damage to the physical and biological characteristics of such areas" need to be considered for land in the corridor.

Water Quality Protection Zones can provide linear spaces that can be incorporated into a comprehensive trail and greenway system.

There is opportunity with the resource extraction process to provide topographic relief that presents opportunities for various micro climates that foster various plant and wildlife development.

There is opportunity for parks to capture and store water, turning them into green water treatement systems.

There is opportunity for the increases use of bioswales near transportation systems and add permanent green corridors.

5. PARKS AND LAND CONSERVATION

The Corridor Plan adds to on the county's initiative to build greenways along Onion and Gilleland creeks beginning in 2005 with voter-approved bond funds.

A funding of land acquistion in the corridor was approved in the fall bond election program.

Historically, initiatives for land conservation for non-park purposes in the corridor and Eastern Travis County have not been aggressive. The 2011 Texas State Legislature has given the county new authority to purchase conservation easements. The corridor is a candidate for the use of this conservation program.

Both the COA and Travis County are exploring improved creek protections that will strengthen opportunities for greenway systems.

The provision of an attractive physical environment, including parks for residents and visitors, as well as providing necessary services and facilities, will attract new residents and businesses to the area.

There is opportunity to develop resiliency plans for the plant and animal life within parks and greenways including the introduction of wildlife corridors and drought-tolerant plants.

Summary and Staff Recommendation: The Ray Marshall Center for the Study of Human Resources has completed the latest annual evaluation of Travis County investments in Workforce Development in the attached volumes.

In these two reports, the Ray Marshall Center has used Unemployment Insurance (UI) wage data to compare employment rates, quarterly earnings, UI eligibility and UI claims for a) program participants before and after services and b) program participants to a like group of residents who did not participate in locally funded WFD programs.

Budgetary and Fiscal Impact: None. The report covers approximately \$1.8 million in purchased social services.

Issues and Opportunities: Our ongoing partnership with the Ray Marshall Center continues to provide vital information to guide continuous improvement of local investments in workforce development. Travis County, the City of Austin and Workforce Solutions have all considered this information to guide program improvements. Since the first report in 2007, we have found consistently positive outcomes from our investments. 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Introduction

In recent years, Travis County has funded workforce development demonstration projects with Workforce Solutions – Capital Area Workforce Board.¹ These projects are a collaborative effort to decrease the amount of time an individual is out of work. Travis County funds workforce development and education services targeted at disadvantaged residents through local property tax revenues. As the local Workforce Investment Board, Workforce Solutions provides universal access to labor exchange services and funds training services that are primarily targeted to unemployed, low-income, and dislocated individuals. By working collaboratively on demonstration projects, the County and Workforce Solutions are able to leverage resources, such as placement services and this program evaluation, which might otherwise be unavailable.

The demonstration projects include the *Rapid Employment Model* or *REM project* which launched in 2006 and the *Gainful Employment Model* or *GEM project* which launched in 2009. The REM project combined short-term (less than 6 weeks) occupational and pre-employment/life skills training with structured job search assistance. Building on the lessons learned from REM, the GEM project offered intermediate-length (up to 9 months) occupational training, as well as pre-employment/life-skills training and structured job search assistance.

The Ray Marshall Center for the Study of Human Resources at the University of Texas' LBJ School of Public Affairs is conducting the evaluation of these demonstration projects. Four prior reports by the authors (2007, 2008, 2010, and 2011) detail the evaluation findings, including labor market outcomes and program impacts, through the first quarter of 2010 for REM 2006-2008 participants. This report extends the outcomes analysis of REM participants through March 2011 and adds the cohort of 2009 participants. This report also introduces the GEM project, and provides outcomes and impacts for 2009-2010 GEM participants

Outcomes Evaluation Approach

The research design was developed in concert with Travis County with two objectives: (1) to determine if the REM and GEM projects are effective methods for helping disadvantaged residents find and retain employment; and (2) to identify ways to improve REM and GEM services over time. Key evaluation questions include:

- How effective are REM/GEM, as measured by reduced time unemployed, reduced unemployment insurance payments, employment retention and increased earnings?
- How do key participant outcomes compare to those for similar, nonparticipating individuals?
- Which skills training programs are most effective for graduates and why?
- What changes can be made to services/treatments to improve outcomes for participants?

The outcomes evaluation of REM/GEM focuses on four measures:

- 1. Quarterly employment
- 2. Average quarterly earnings of those employed (e.g., conditional earnings)
- 3. Monetary eligibility for UI benefits in the event of a job loss
- 4. Claims filed for UI benefits

Using participant data supplied by Workforce Solutions, researchers linked to each REM and GEM participant's Texas Unemployment Insurance (UI) wage and claim records. It should be noted that the UI wage records that form the basis of the evaluation have known coverage issues in construction and trucking, industries which rely heavily on independent contractors and the self-employed and are therefore not part of the UI system. Given that truck driving and construction were among the top three occupations in the REM project, it is likely that the labor market outcomes reported here underestimate the actual level of post-service employment and earnings from that project².

Beyond employment and earnings, however, the outcomes evaluation also examines two measures related to UI benefits. In the first measure, monetary qualification for UI benefits, researchers examined REM and GEM participants' work histories in the pre- and post-service period to determine if workforce development services had increased participants' eligibility for receiving UI benefits in the event of a layoff or other employment separation. Qualification for UI benefits is based on length of employment, earnings levels, and reason for separation, among other factors. An individual must have sufficient earnings in at least two of the four quarters prior to separation to qualify for UI benefits (i.e., monetary eligibility). This measure is significant as it looks at the stability of an individual's employment. Prior to entering the REM project, participants often had a history of unstable employment. After their participation, many of these individuals moved into stable employment that qualifies them for benefits through the UI program, the nation's first-tier safety net for laid-off workers that is funded by both employers and workers.3 In the second measure, UI benefit claims filed, researchers examined UI claims in both the pre- and post-service period to determine if REM and GEM participants reduced their reliance on UI benefits.

An impacts analysis is planned for REM and GEM participants; however, the lack of adequately-matched comparison groups has prevented this component of the evaluation from being implemented.

Organization of this Report

This report includes four sections beginning with this introduction. The second section provides updated outcomes for 2007-2008 REM participants and for the first time presents findings on the REM 2009 cohort. The third section introduces the GEM project and presents initial findings. The final section offers a summary of findings and documents next steps in the evaluation of local workforce demonstration projects.

The Rapid Employment Model Evaluation

The Rapid Employment Model (REM) project provides pre-employment and life skills training, short-term (up to 6 weeks) occupational training, and structured job search assistance to disadvantaged residents of Travis County. The current evaluation of the REM project follows three separate cohorts: 85 from the 2007 cohort, 81 from the 2008 cohort, and 96 from the 2009 cohort.

Table 1 profiles each of the annual cohorts. Participants in each of these years were drawn heavily from the county's Project RIO (Re-Integration of ex-Offenders)⁴ population, representing approximately 78% of participants. Choices clients, individuals receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) funding, were the next largest share of participants at 19%. The remainder were drawn from participants in the Food Stamp Employment & Training (FSET) program.⁵

While the mix of occupational training shifted somewhat over the course of the project (Table 2), the majority of participants were involved in one of three programs: Construction Gateway (44%); Austin Academy, which provides office skills training, (26%); and Truck Driving, through Austin Community College, (18%).

Labor Market Outcomes

The outcomes presented below are quarterly averages (means) for the identified time period, and all dollar figures are nominal. Outcomes are based on UI wage data through March 2011. It should be noted again that due to the heavy focus on truck driving and construction, industries with limited UI-coverage, the outcomes presented here likely underreport actual outcomes of REM participants.

Table 3 below presents outcomes for REM 2007-2009 participants. Across all cohorts, participant employment peaked in the second post-service quarter (6 months after leaving the program). Across all post-service quarters, almost 37% of REM participants were employed. Quarterly earnings for employed 2007-2008 participants in the 10th quarter after REM services averaged \$5,349. In the 14th quarter post-service, 34% of REM 2007 participants were employed and earned an average of \$3,497 that quarter.

Gainful Employment Model Evaluation

The Ray Marshall Center is also conducting an outcomes evaluation of Travis County's second workforce demonstration project with Workforce Solutions – Capital Area Workforce Board, the Gainful Employment Model or GEM project. Building on the lessons learned from the REM demonstration, the partners developed the Gainful Employment Model to provide disadvantaged county residents (primarily those receiving TANF benefits) the opportunity to access intermediate-length (up to 9 months) training for occupations paying above a living wage.

In total, there were 85 participants in the GEM program, ranging in age between 19 and 66 years old. The average age of GEM participants was 36. The majority of participants were female (78%). GEM participants came from a variety of racial/ethnic backgrounds: 29% were Black or African American; 26% were Hispanic; 21% were White or Caucasian; 9% were Asian or Pacific Islander; and 11% were from another racial/ethnic group. Eighty-six percent of GEM participants had completed 12th grade or gone further in their education. Data on educational attainment were not available for 10 participants. The majority (87%) of GEM participants received public assistance.

Participants of GEM undertake pre-employment and Healthy Choices life skills training prior to starting an occupational training program. Participants could then select among four occupational training programs: pharmacy technician, automotive technician, administrative assistant, and bookkeeping, as well as English as a Second Language (ESL) classes. The majority of participants enrolled in either the administrative assistant or bookkeeping programs (Table 4). Sixty-nine percent of GEM participants completed occupational training.

Labor Market Outcomes

The outcomes evaluation is following 80 GEM participants who could be linked to the administrative records used for analysis. The participants who completed the GEM program exited the labor market during the tepid recovery period that has followed the Great Recession. Table 5 below presents labor market outcomes for GEM participants at 2 quarters (6 months) after leaving the GEM program, and for all post-service quarters through March 2011. Almost 58% of GEM participants were employed two quarters after leaving the program, and those who were employed earned an average of \$3,601 that quarter. Across all post-service quarters, average quarterly earnings were \$3,768. Two quarters after leaving GEM, 7.5% of participants filed a claim for UI benefits, though the average across all quarters was just 4%.

Summary and Next Steps

The investments that Travis County has made in workforce demonstration projects are fairly unique in the country; few local governments put local tax dollars into education and training for disadvantaged adults. The County's partnership with Workforce Solutions – Capital Area Workforce Board leveraged additional state and federal resources to meet the needs of disadvantaged County residents. The demonstration nature of the investments allowed the project to change over time in response to the mix of clients, the needs of education and training providers, and the labor market.

The outcomes associated with the Rapid Employment Model demonstrate the short-term gains associated with less-intensive workforce development interventions. It is worth repeating that the outcomes presented here likely undercount actual employment and earnings levels given training targeted at truck driving and construction, two industries with large shares of self-employed or independent contractors who do not contribute to UI and are therefore not included in the research dataset. Despite this underrepresentation, REM's outcomes still demonstrate that it is meeting the objectives behind the program: helping individuals through rapid skill acquisition and quick connection to employment.

The County extended the REM model in 2009 into intermediate-length training opportunities through the Gainful Employment Model demonstration. This further underscores the importance the County and Workforce Solutions place on connecting individuals to employment at or above the living wage as longer-term training is more likely to prepare individuals for those types of job opportunities. Initial outcomes of GEM participation indicate that a larger share of participants are employed two quarters after leaving the program than had been employed in the four quarters prior to their program entry.

In the next update report, Ray Marshall Center researchers will continue to follow REM and GEM participants for another four quarters post-service. In addition, researchers will continue to explore the feasibility of an impacts evaluation based on a matched comparison group.

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Introduction

BACKGROUND

Since 2006, the Ray Marshall Center for the Study of Human Resources at The University of Texas at Austin has conducted an evaluation of locally-funded workforce development services in Travis County, Texas. Seven local non-profit organizations receive annual funding to provide workforce development services to disadvantaged county residents; these organizations also receive funding from the City of Austin to provide similar services to disadvantaged City residents. ¹ Services range from adult basic education to short- and long-term occupational skills training; often participants receive job search assistance, and some organizations provide wrap-around services to support participant success. The seven providers and their programs are described briefly below and more fully in the next chapter.

- Austin Academy provides training in computer skills and workplace competencies, GED preparation, and job search assistance to disadvantaged County residents. Participants often complete more than one program. A case manager works with each participant to identify and overcome potential barriers to success, such as child care, transportation, housing, or life skills issues. More information is available at: http://www.austinacademy.org/
- Austin Area Urban League provides training in basic office and workplace competency/job readiness skills; basic through advanced computer literacy classes; and GED preparation to disadvantaged County residents. More information is available at: http://www.aaul.org/
- American YouthWorks trains youth (ages 17-24) in jobs programs built around a service-learning model, including Casa Verde Builders and the Environmental Corps. These programs build students' academic and occupational skills through community service projects. More information is available at: http://www.americanyouthworks.org/
- Construction Gateway prepares individuals, primarily ex-offenders, for entry-level work in construction through a five-week, full-time program. Participants work with program staff to develop functional resumes and practice responding to questions about their criminal background during

- Crime Prevention Institute (CPI) provided pre- and post-release services, including one-on-one case management, training, and access to community resources, to individuals transitioning back into the community from incarceration in the state jail system's Travis County Unit. CPI closed on September 30, 2011 due to funding and sustainability issues.
- Capital IDEA provides long-term training services to lift disadvantaged residents out of poverty and into family-sustaining occupations, predominantly nursing and allied health. Capital IDEA also provides wraparound support services, case management, and a peer support network. More information is available at: http://www.capitalidea.org/

The current evaluation series examines participants from each of the workforce services providers which began a program in calendar year 2007 or 2008.² Their outcomes will be analyzed across several research cycles and were first reported in Smith et al. (2011).

EVALUATION APPROACH

The evaluation documents 2007-2008 participants' labor market outcomes and analyzes the labor market impacts of participation in workforce program services for most programs. The *outcomes evaluation* examines the share of participants in employment covered by the Texas Unemployment Insurance (UI) program; average quarterly earnings of the employed; and participants' eligibility and claims for UI benefits. The analysis includes outcomes at points in time—at two, six, and ten quarters after leaving program services for all programs; at fourteen and eighteen quarters post-service for programs with sufficient outcome data—and over all post-service quarters through March 2011 using Texas UI wage records and claims files.

The quasi-experimental impact analysis seeks to gauge the "value-added" from workforce program participation by comparing labor market outcomes for participants with those of a matched comparison group. Comparison group members were drawn from The Workforce Information System of Texas (TWIST) records and include Travis County residents who registered for employment with the state's WorkinTexas program or who received job search services at local Workforce Solutions Career Centers. Quasiexperimental approaches tend to work well when participants for whom comparison groups are created have sufficient prior employment and earnings histories and when data are available on a sufficient number of variables with which to perform the match. Youth and ex-offenders are problematical in this regard precisely because their prior employment and earnings histories are either lacking or difficult to determine with any real confidence. Ex-offenders present an additional problem since offender status is generally lacking for comparison group members. The report presents quasiexperimental impacts only for groups/providers for which adequate matching could be performed. Six of the seven providers are included in this analysis; Crime Prevention Institute is the only program for which an adequately-matched comparison group could not be established. Net effects and adjusted net effects are included in the impact estimates; adjusted net effects (labeled as "impact measure" in the tables) have been modified to account for unmeasured socioeconomic and other differences not already controlled in the matching process. More information on the matching process and the quality of comparison groups is provided in Appendix A.

Two caveats should be noted about the data used for the evaluation. First, incomplete participant records resulted in a number of individuals being dropped from the analysis. Second, labor market outcomes data were obtained from Texas UI wage and claim records, which have known gaps in coverage. Employment in certain industries which rely heavily on self-employed workers or independent contractors, such as construction and trucking, is a recognized gap in the coverage of the UI program (see Stevens, 2007). Researchers therefore acknowledge that employment and earnings outcomes reported here for some programs (e.g., Construction Gateway) likely undercount the actual labor market outcomes of participants relative to their comparison group counterparts.

REPORT ORGANIZATION

This report is organized into four sections including this Introduction. The second section presents outcome and impact findings for participants from 2007 and 2008. The third section details findings on the only long-term training program in the evaluation, Capital IDEA. The final section summarizes findings to date from the evaluation of locally-funded workforce development services, and outlines next steps for the research. Appendix A details the quasi-experimental impact evaluation process.

Evaluation of Participants in Short-Term Workforce Development Programs

This chapter provides a brief introduction to the 2007-2008 cohorts from six providers and their associated workforce training programs. Workforce services offered by these providers are predominantly low-intensity job search and other assistance combined with short-term basic skills training for entry-level occupations and case management services (e.g., Goodwill). These types of programs, as intended, generally have the greatest impact on labor market outcomes in the quarters immediately following participation. The outcomes and impacts evaluation tracks four key measures:

- 1. Quarterly employment
- 2. Average quarterly earnings of those employed (i.e., conditional earnings)
- 3. Qualified for UI benefits (i.e., monetary eligibility based on employment and earnings history)
- 4. Filed a Ul claim

In addition, the impacts analysis also tracks unconditional earnings (i.e., earnings for all individuals regardless of employment) to compare participants and comparison group members over time.

Labor market outcomes at the 2nd, 6th, 10th, and in some cases the 14th quarter after leaving program services are detailed, as well as summarized in the "all quarters after service" average through March 2011. In addition, quasi-experimental impacts are detailed for five programs for which an adequately-matched comparison group could be created (see Appendix A for more detail). This report is based on the most recent UI wage and claim files available; therefore, some numbers may have changed from what was reported in the 2011 evaluation update.

AMERICAN YOUTHWORKS

The current evaluation includes 81 participants from American YouthWorks' 2007-2008 cohorts. The youth were served by two programs: 33 trained in **Casa Verde**

Builders, and 48 joined the **Environmental Corps** (E-Corps) program. Seventeen participants were in adjudication or had other involvement with the criminal justice system. Thirty-eight AYW participants held a high school diploma at program entry; nineteen earned a diploma after starting at AYW. Program records also document that thirteen participants went on to further education and training after leaving Casa Verde Builders or the E-Corps.

Table 1 provides labor market outcomes for 2007-2008 AYW participants through the 10th quarter post-service (2.5 years after leaving training).³ Twice as many AYW participants were working in the 10th quarter after service as were working in the four quarters prior to starting at AYW. Average quarterly earnings of participants were down in the 10th post-service quarter (to \$3,021) from a high of \$3,651 in the 6th quarter. The share of participants who met the monetary eligibility requirements for UI benefits continued to grow, with 34% qualified based on earnings in all post-service quarters. On average, only one percent of participants had filed a claim for UI benefits in any quarter after leaving AYW.

Table 2 presents findings from the impacts analysis comparing the outcomes of the 2007-2008 cohorts of AYW to the outcomes of a matched comparison group.

Participation was positively associated with three of the four outcomes of interest: a 13

percentage point increase in employment, an \$854 advantage in average quarterly earnings for those employed, and a ten percentage point gain in the share qualified for UI benefits.




Figure 1. Unconditional Earnings Over Time, AYW Participants vs. Comparison Group

In Figure 1 below, the impact of participation in American YouthWorks is examined by looking at participants' earnings over time, regardless of employment status (i.e., unconditional earnings), in relation to the comparison group's unconditional earnings. The analysis shows that AYW participants have equaled or out-earned the comparison group in every quarter since the 2^{nd} quarter after starting the AYW program. AYW participants also show a quarterly earnings advantage over the comparison group of more than \$1,000 in the 12^{th} quarter after entering the program.

AUSTIN ACADEMY

The evaluation includes 115 Austin Academy participants, 53 in the 2007 cohort, and 62 in the 2008 cohort. The average age of participants in the cohorts was 32 and 34 years, respectively. The majority (58) participated in two or more of the four programs offered by Austin Academy: **GED preparation**, **job placement assistance**, **computer literacy**, and **workplace competency**. Eighteen participants were missing program data.

Table 3 provides participant outcome data at several points in time, up to 10 quarters (2.5 years) after completing Austin Academy services, as well as for all quarters through March 2011. Just under half of participants were employed in the 10th quarter post-service, down eight percentage points from the 6th quarter post-service. Earnings were also down in the 10th quarter to an average of \$4,369 for those

employed. Almost 44% of Austin Academy participants met UI monetary eligibility requirements in the 10th quarter, while 4.2% filed a claim for UI benefits that quarter.

The results of the impacts analysis are presented in Table 4. Participation in Austin Academy's 2007-2008 cohorts was only significantly associated with impacts for two outcome measures: quarterly employment and average quarterly earnings. Austin Academy participants were almost 5 percentage points *more* likely to be employed in any given post-service quarter than the matched comparison group. However, employed participants earned an average of \$662 *less* per quarter than the comparison group.




Figure 2. Unconditional Earnings Over Time, Austin Academy vs. Comparison Group

Another way of looking at the impact of Austin Academy participation is to examine participant earnings over time, regardless of employment status, in relation to those of the comparison group (i.e., unconditional earnings). In Figure 2 below, the analysis shows that Austin Academy participants out-performed the comparison group in the four quarters immediately following the quarter they started the program. Since the 5th post-service quarter, however, the comparison group has exhibited stronger earnings. This result is consistent with expectations given the short-term nature of the training.

AUSTIN AREA URBAN LEAGUE

The current evaluation includes 516 Austin Area Urban League (AAUL) participants through its contracts with Travis County and the City of Austin, 242 in 2007 and 274 in 2008. The majority of participants enrolled in either GED Preparation (44%) or Essential Office Skills training (48%), with the remainder in Evening Computer Training.

Table 5 presents labor market outcomes for AAUL participants at the 10^{th} and 14^{th} quarter post-service (2.5 and 3.5 years later), and across all post-service quarters through the first quarter of 2011. Positively, the share of participants filing a claim for

UI benefits was slightly lower in the 14th post-service quarter (at 1.4%) than in the 10th quarter (when it was at 1.7%). Quarterly employment, which peaked in the 2nd post-service quarter at 55%, stood at approximately 41% in the 14th quarter. The average quarterly earnings of those employed reached a post-service high in the 6th quarter of \$4,504; across all post-service quarters the average was \$4,226. Finally, the share of AAUL participants who met the monetary eligibility qualifications for UI benefits was greatest in the 6th post-service quarter (45.4%).

Table 6 above presents the results of the impacts analysis comparing the outcomes of the 2007 AAUL participants to the outcomes of a matched comparison

group. Across all post-service quarters, AAUL participants filed a claim for UI benefits at a significantly lower rate (1.5 percentage points) than the comparison group. Two other measures showed a statistically significant difference between the outcomes of AAUL participants and the comparison group: fewer participants qualified for UI benefits (3.5 percentage points), and the quarterly earnings of employed participants averaged \$667 less.




Figure 3. Earnings Over Time, AAUL vs. Comparison Group

Figure 3 provides a chart of earnings over time for the participant and comparison groups. These earnings are averaged across all individuals, whether employed or not, i.e. unconditional earnings. In three of the first five post-service quarters AAUL 2007 participants had higher average earnings than the comparison group. Since the sixth post-service quarter, AAUL participants have had lower average earnings than comparison group members. As with many of the other programs, these results are not un-expected.

CONSTRUCTION GATEWAY

The current evaluation is following 184 Construction Gateway participants, 91 from 2007 and 93 from 2008. The majority (147) are ex-offenders with an average age of 37. It is important to note that the source of data for the outcomes evaluation, UI wage records, does not fully capture construction employment as a large number of jobs in the industry are filled by self-employed workers and independent contractors, who are not covered by UI. Therefore, the outcomes presented in Table 7 likely underestimate actual employment and earnings for Construction Gateway participants.

The average quarterly earnings of employed Construction Gateway participants have grown in the post-service period, rising to \$4,847 in the 14th quarter. The share of participants who were employed in a UI-covered position, however, dropped to 30% in the 14th quarter, but averaged 42.3% across all post-service quarters. An average 2.3% of Construction Gateway participants filed a claim for UI benefits in the post-service period.

Quarterly impacts for Construction Gateway's 2007 participants are detailed in Table 8. The analysis identified two outcomes with significant differences between participants and the comparison group: quarterly employment and qualified for UI benefits based on monetary eligibility criteria were both significantly lower for participants than the comparison group. Given the issues noted above concerning the lack of UI-covered employment in the construction industry, these differences are expected.



The analysis also compared unconditional earnings over time for Construction Gateway participants and the comparison group, whether or not an individual was employed in a particular quarter (Figure 4). The earnings of participants in UI-covered employment were consistently lower than the comparison group's earnings pre- and post-service.

CRIME PREVENTION INSTITUTE

Crime Prevention Institute (CPI) closed on September 30, 2011 due to funding and sustainability issues. Therefore, this is the last report on CPI participant outcomes. CPI served 218 participants transitioning out of the state jail system's Travis County Unit, 98 in 2007 and 120 in 2008. Almost sixty percent of participants had a high school diploma or GED; an additional ten percent had some college experience. The average age of the participants served by CPI was 41, with a range of 22 to 61 years.

Table 9 provides the labor market outcomes for CPI participants. The largest share of CPI participants employed occurred in the last quarter of program participation. Across all post-service quarters the share of employed participants exceeded the share employed in the year prior to receiving CPI services by six percentage points. Fewer participants were employed in the 10th quarter after service, however, than in any of the four quarters prior to program entry. The share of participants qualified for UI benefits based on monetary eligibility averaged approximately 3 percentage points lower in the post-service period than in the preservice period. Quarterly earnings for employed participants peaked in the 6th post-service quarter at an average \$4,003, dropping to \$3,263 in the 10th quarter. Two percent of participants filed a claim for UI benefits in the 10th quarter after CPI services ended.

No adequate comparison group could be established for Crime Prevention Institute's 2007-2008 cohorts. Therefore, the organization is not included in the impacts analysis.

GOODWILL

There were 451 participants in the 2007-2008 cohorts of Goodwill's **Ready-to-Work** program, 171 and 280 participants respectively. Approximately two-thirds of participants had a criminal background. The Ready-to-Work program also serves homeless individuals and disadvantaged residents living in southeast Travis County.

Goodwill participants' labor market outcomes are detailed in Table 10. While employment was down in the 10^{th} quarter post-service to 43.7%, the quarterly earnings of those employed averaged \$6,322. The share of Goodwill participants who met the monetary eligibility qualifications for UI benefits reached 51% in the 6^{th} quarter after service ended. In that same quarter, 5.7% of participants filed a claim for UI benefits.


Table 11 presents the results of the impacts analysis. Only the 2007 Goodwill cohort is included since a matched comparison group could not be established for the 2008 cohort. No significant differences were found between Goodwill's 2007 participants and its matched comparison group.

Figure 5 presents the unconditional earnings over time for the Goodwill participants and the comparison group. Earnings are averaged across all individuals, whether employed or not. In the first four quarters following the start of the Goodwill program, participants' out-earned the comparison group; since that time the earnings of the two groups have been very similar.

Outcomes and Impacts From Investments in Long-Term Training, 2003-2008

CAPITAL IDEA

Capital IDEA has the distinction of being the only Travis County-funded workforce services provider offering long-term training for high-skill, high-wage occupations. Through its College Prep Academy, occupational training programs, and weekly peer support sessions with a career counselor, individuals are often involved with Capital IDEA over the course of several years. Support services available to participants include child care and transportation assistance.

Training programs (up to an associate's degree) are regularly reviewed by Capital IDEA to verify demand in the labor market. Current programs open to County residents include **nursing and allied health professions** (e.g., dental hygienist, medical lab technician, occupational/physical therapy assistant, surgical technician, emergency medical technician); **technology careers** (e.g., automotive technician, computer aided design, video game development, network/system administrator); and **professional trades** (e.g., electrician, lineman, plumber, power utilities technician, HVAC repair).

This section presents outcomes for 879 participants who started and either completed or dropped out of the Capital IDEA program between 2003 and 2008.⁵ Employment and earnings outcomes are reported through March 2011. Impact estimates are provided for the 2003-2008 cohorts, using the same comparison group matching process described earlier and further detailed in Appendix A.

Outcomes

Capital IDEA participants show strong employment, earnings, and UI benefit outcomes through 18 quarters (4.5 years) post-service (Table 12). In that quarter, earnings for employed participants rose to an average \$8,017. The share employed and the share qualified for UI benefits based on monetary eligibility standards were both

above 70% across all post-service quarters. Approximately 3.3% of Capital IDEA participants filed a claim for UI benefits in the 18th quarter after leaving the program.

Impacts

The impact analysis of participation in Capital IDEA's 2003-2008 cohorts is detailed in Table 13. In relation to the matched comparison group, Capital IDEA participants experienced significant gains in three measures: quarterly employment, average quarterly earnings of those employed, and qualifying for UI benefits based on monetary eligibility standards. Capital IDEA participants had a 12.3 percentage point advantage in the share employed as well as the share qualified for UI benefits based on monetary eligibility standards. Participants also earned an average \$759 more in each post-service quarter than the comparison group.



Figure 6 presents a more complete picture of how Capital IDEA participants performed in terms of earnings over time in relation to the comparison group. These earnings are averaged across all individuals regardless of employment (i.e., unconditional earnings). In the first five quarters following their entry into Capital IDEA, a time period when many were still engaged in education and training, participants' earnings lagged behind the earnings of the comparison group. Capital IDEA participants overtook the comparison group's earnings in the 6th post-service quarter, and since that time (more than seven years post-service) participant's earnings have grown while the comparison group's earnings have remained relatively flat.

Summary and Next Steps

Workforce development programs funded by Travis County's Health and Human Services Department between 2007 and 2008 appear to have made a positive difference in the labor market outcomes of participants across most programs it has invested in. These individuals left a workforce training program and entered the job market during the most recent economic recession. Employment and earnings outcomes are greatest in the immediate post-service quarters (especially at the 2nd and 6th quarters) for programs with short-term interventions. In some short-term programs, participants who remain employed exhibit longer-term earnings growth as well.

The impacts analysis of the short-term programs identified mixed results. American YouthWorks participation had a strong, positive impact on three measures: quarterly employment, average quarterly earnings, and meeting UI monetary eligibility qualifications. It is the only short-term program to have a positive impact on average quarterly earnings of those employed. Austin Academy and AAUL participation was significantly associated with lower average quarterly earnings, though each program did have a positive impact on at least one measure. Austin Academy participation was associated with higher quarterly employment, while AAUL participation was associated with lower filing rates for UI benefits.

Capital IDEA, the only long-term occupational training program supported by the County, had a positive, statistically significant impact on average quarterly earnings of those employed. Participants earned on average \$759 more per quarter than the comparison group over the entire period measured. Participation in Capital IDEA also was strongly associated with increased employment and eligibility for UI benefits in the event of a job loss. These results, especially in light of the more modest impacts for short-term interventions, suggest that longer-term investments in skills training yield large, lasting returns in the labor market even seven years after services have ended.

NEXT STEPS

The Local Investments in Workforce Development Evaluation will next report on 2007-2008 participant labor market outcomes at the 14th and 18th quarter post-service for all programs. The evaluation will also continue to follow all of Capital IDEA's 2003-2008 cohorts—including additional participants who complete their training during the intervening time period—to better understand the long-term impacts of investments in intensive occupational training programs. In addition, new cohorts (2009 and 2010 participants) may be added for some programs.

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Appendix A. Quasi-Experimental Impacts Analysis

In an attempt to measure the impacts of locally-funded workforce services, researchers conducted a quasi-experimental analysis comparing labor market outcomes for workforce participants with those of a comparison group of similar non-participants. Quasi-experimental analysis has been shown to produce impact estimates comparable to those resulting from more rigorous and costly approaches involving the use of experimental designs that randomly assign individuals to treatment and control status.⁶ In fact, for some groups, quasi-experimental estimates tend to understate employment and earnings impacts from workforce services. For these reasons, results presented in this report should be considered conservative estimates of the true impacts.

Quasi-experimental approaches tend to work well when participants for whom comparison groups are being created have sufficient prior employment and earnings histories and when data are available on a sufficient number of variables with which to perform the requisite match. Youth and ex-offenders are problematical in this regard precisely because their prior employment and earnings histories are either lacking or difficult to determine. Quasi-experimental impacts are presented only for those groups/providers for which adequate matching could be performed.

Potential comparison group members were drawn from two sources: individuals who either registered to look for employment using the state's WorkinTexas program or who received "core" services under the Workforce Investment Act (such as job-matching or resume development). Thus, the comparison group selected as described below is not a "no-services," but rather a "low-intensity services" group. The resulting impact estimates thus reflect the incremental value of the community's investments in workforce services. For providers that are primarily providing job search assistance and short-term training services (e.g., Austin Academy, Austin Area Urban League, Construction Gateway, Goodwill), impact estimates are likely to be biased downward even more so than expected, in that comparison group members may have received similar services. For providers like Capital IDEA that are providing

longer-term, intensive skill investments, the estimated impacts will be conservative estimates of the incremental value of local workforce investments over and above low-intensity services already available through WorkinTexas or WIA "core" services provided through Workforce Solutions Career Centers.

Workforce services participants were matched on a one-to-one basis with potential comparison group members using a method known as weighted multivariate matching. This technique places greater weights on those variables showing greater initial (pre-service) differences. Matching was done by selecting for each participant the one comparison group member judged most similar. Matching was done without replacement, with no caliper applied to eliminate poor matches, since doing so would have reduced the generalizability of the results.

Researchers were able to access matching variables for most participants in locally-funded workforce services. Exact matches carried out included: county of residence; year of entry into the program; and whether or not individuals had recently experienced an earnings dip of 20% or more. Distance matches were also carried out on up to 16 variables by treating them as numeric and including them in the overall multivariate distance measurement. These variables included: age (for those participants with a recorded birth date); gender; race/ethnicity (White, Black, Hispanic); time since first earnings; employed at entry; percent of time employed over four (4) years prior to program entry; average quarterly earnings over four (4) years prior to program entry; percent of time in any workforce development service in the year immediately prior to program entry (matched according to service intensity: high for training programs, and low for job placement services); any prior participation in Project RIO; any UI claims filed in the year prior to program entry; any UI benefits received in the year prior to program entry; and whether the individual's earnings history qualified for UI if he/she were to lose a job. For those experiencing a recent earnings dip, the time since the earnings dip and the percent of earnings represented by the dip were also included in the matching process.

The adequacy of each comparison group for the quasi-experimental impacts analysis was judged by performing t-tests. These tests compared treatment and comparison groups on the same 19 dimensions. If the groups were statistically

different at p<.01 on more than two dimensions, the comparison was considered inadequate. Table A-1 provides the results of these tests.

Proposed Motion:

Consider and Approve Reappointment of Philip P. Huang, M.D., M.P.H, as Health Authority and designation of Paul Hinchey, M.D., Birch Duke Kimbrough, M.D., and Jose G. Cabanas, M.D., each individually, as an Alternate Health Authority for Austin/Travis County Health and Human Services Department, effective April 1, 2012.

Summary and Staff Recommendation:

On January 15, 2008, the Court approved staff recommendation to designate Dr. Philip P. Huang as Health Authority upon the departure of Dr. Adolfo Valadez, MD, MPH. The Court had previously approved Dr. Huang's appointment in to commence April 6, 2008, to replace Dr. Linda Dooley, who served as Acting Health Authority after the resignation of Dr. Adolfo Valadez, who was designated Health Authority in February 2004, reappointed in 2006, until his resignation in February of 2008. Dr. Huang was subsequently reappointed by the Court on April 6, 2010. In accordance with the Texas

Health and Safety Code, the Court appointed the Health Authority to a 2-year term and may reappoint to an unlimited number of terms.

The purpose of this action is to reappoint Dr. Philip P. Huang, M.D., M.P.H., as Health Authority for a 2-year term effective April 1, 2012, and to appoint three qualified physicians to act as Alternate Health Authority when designated by the Health Authority, also effective April 1, 2012.

Under Section 121.029 of the Texas Health and Safety Code, the Health Authority may delegate any power or duty imposed on the heath authority to a properly qualified physician to act while the health authority is absent or incapacitated. The physician designated by the health authority must:

- Meet license and residence requirements;
- · Be appointed as a designee in the same manner as the Health Authority; and
- File an Oath of Office, executed by a duly appointed Notary Public, with the Texas Department of Health.

The delegation is effective during the term of the Health Authority making the delegation. The Health Authority is responsible for the acts of the physician to whom the powers have been delegated. In addition, the entity that appoints the health Authority must have procedures in place to prevent duplication of authority and provide notice to the Department when authority is transferred.

With approval of the HHSD Director, Dr. Huang has requested that Dr. Paul R. Hinchey, Dr. Birch Duke Kimbrough, and Dr. Jose G. Cabanas be designated, each individually, as Alternate Health Authority.

Budgetary and Fiscal Impact:

Under Interlocal Agreement, Travis County reimburses the City of Austin for a percentage of the salary of the Health Authority. Funding is included in Travis County Health and Human Services and Veterans Service FY2012 Budget. This action will not impact the Budget.

Background:

Dr. Huang earned his M.D. from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School, Houston, Texas, in 1986, and a Masters of Public Health from Harvard School of Public Health, Boston, Massachusetts, in 1990. His medical education includes internship and residency in Family Practice at Brackenridge Hospital, Austin, TX. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice (1989). Dr. Huang most recently served as the Medical Director for the Texas Department of State Health Services, Chronic Disease Prevention, and was previously employed as Chief of the Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Chronic Disease and Tobacco Prevention, and as Epidemic Intelligence Service (EIS) Officer with the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, Atlanta, Georgia. He actively serves on a number of committees including the Government

Relations and Tobacco Control Committees of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society; the American Heart Association's Medical and Scientific Committee; the Texas Diabetes Council; the University of Texas Health Science Center, Houston, School of Public Health's Prevention Research Center Advisory Committee; the Texas Medical Association's Physician Oncology Education Program; and the Austin Indigent Care Collaboration's Physician Advisory Board Steering Committee. Throughout his career, Dr. Huang's work has been published in many medical and scholarly journals and publications.

Dr. Hinchey earned his M.D. from State University of New York at Buffalo School of Medicine and Biomedical Science and a Masters of Business Administration at State University of New York at Buffalo School of Management. His medical education included a residency in Emergency Medicine and an EMS Fellowship at the University of North Carolina, Department of Emergency Medicine. He holds board certifications from the American Board of Emergency Medicine and United States medical Licensing Examination Step I-III, and numerous special certifications, including Air Medical Physicians Association medical Director Part II and III, Advanced Cardiac Life Support, Advanced Trauma Life Support, FEMA Urban Search and Rescue medical Specialist and NAEMSP National Medical Director. Dr. Hinchey has served in many professional capacities as a Medical Director or Assistant Medical Director in Emergency Medical Services. He is currently serving as the System Medical Director for the Austin/Travis County Emergency Medical Services and meets all of the requirements of the Health and Safety Code to be designated an Alternate Health Authority.

Dr. Kimbrough earned his M.D. from the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio, San Antonio, Texas, in 1974. His medical education includes an internship and residency in General Surgery at North Carolina Memorial Hospital, Chapel Hill, NC and residency in General Surgery at Madigan Army Medical Center, Tacoma, WA. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Surgery in General Surgery (1983) and the American Board of Emergency Medicine (1992) and holds certifications in Pediatric Life Support, Cardiac Life Support, Trauma Life Support and Swift Water Rescue. Dr. Kimbrough is a Veteran of the US Army Active Reserve, retiring at the rank of Colonel, having served as Chief, Department of Surgery, 5501 US Army Hospital and as Chief Medical Officer for Emergency Treatment Service, 114th Evacuation Hospital. He has been a staff physician in the Emergency Department at South Austin Medical Center since 1989. Currently, Dr. Kimbrough serves as Associate Medical Director in the Austin/Travis County Office of Medical Director.

Jose G. Cabanas earned his M.D.'s from San Juan Bautista School of Medicine, Caguas, Puerto Rico in 2002 and Ross University, Dominica, West Indies, in 2005. Dr. Cabanas is also currently enrolled in the Masters in Public Health (MPH) Program at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, in 2012. His medical education includes an Emergency Medicine Residency at University of Puerto Rico, San Juan, PR, Health Policy Internship at George Washington University in Washington, D.C. and an Emergency Medical Services Fellowship at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, NC. He is a Diplomate of the American Board of Emergency Medicine (2009). He has

held a number of key positions in the area of Emergency Medicine including Emergency Medical Attending Physician, Wake Emergency Physicians, PA, Raleigh, NC; Associate Director of Research, Emergency Services Institute, and Medical Director Special Operations, WakeMed Health and Hospitals, Raleigh, NC; and Deputy Medical Director of Wake County Emergency Medical Services (EMS), Raleigh, NC. Currently, Dr. Cabanas serves as Deputy Medical Director of Austin/Travis County Emergency Medical Services (EMS).

BACKGROUND/SUMMARY OF REQUEST AND ATTACHMENTS:

In FY2012, Travis County received a grant in the amount of \$550,000 from the US Department of Justice's Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention to enhance the Travis County Drug Treatment Court. Since that time, the Court has sought to provide judicial oversight for parents with substance dependency issues who are involved in the child welfare system by providing resources through a child welfare case worker and a Court Appointed Special Advocate for the children. Attending the proposed training in partnership with The Children's Continuum, a program funded through the grant, will enable case workers to identify a child's needs, take steps for immediate intervention and set up a monitoring system for the welfare of the child.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

Proposed Motion:

Consider and take appropriate action to approve a request from Travis County Health and Human Services and Veterans Service to use grant money from The Children's Continuum to send staff from partner agencies to a two-day training in Austin.

Summary and Staff Recommendations:

TCHHSVS received a \$550,000 grant in FY'12 from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention to enhance the Travis County Family Drug Treatment Court. The Travis County Family Drug Treatment Court (TCFDTC) was established in the fall of 2007 as a specialized docket managed by the 126th District Court. The aim is to provide judicial oversight for parents with substance dependency issues who are involved in the child welfare system. Although all children involved with the TCFDTC receive monitoring by a child welfare case worker and Court Appointed Special Advocate, these children, unlike their parents, are not provided with a consistent assessment nor are they connected to an easy to navigate continuum of services.

The grant funds a program, known as The Children's Continuum, that allows early identification of a child's needs, immediate intervention and monitoring. Partners in the program include the Travis County Civil District Courts, Travis County Health and Human Services and Veterans Service, Travis County Child Protective Services, Court Appointed Special Advocates of Travis County (CASA), Austin Recovery, Foundation Communities, the Travis County District Attorney's Office, Casey Family Programs, the Texas Department of State Health Services, and Court Appointed Family Advocates, among others.

There will be five people attending the conference: three from Travis County, one from Child Protective Services, and one from CASA.

Budgetary and Fiscal Impact:

The early bird cost for registration is \$319.19 per person. The regular price is \$349.99 per person.

Issues and Opportunities:

Attending the conference will allow staff from Travis County and the partner agencies to develop skills that will help them be more effective in serving children.

Background:

The purpose of the Family Drug Court Programs run by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) in the U.S. Department of Justice is to build the capacity of states, state and local courts, units of local government, and federally recognized Indian tribal governments to either implement new drug courts or enhance existing drug courts for substance-dependent adults involved with the court as a result of child abuse and neglect issues. Applicants must provide services to the children of the parents in the program as well as to the parents. The program provides seed money, not long-term support. OJJDP expects successful applicants to develop and implement a sustainability plan during the grant period to continue operation of the family drug court when the grant ends.

Funds from this grant will be used to create public outreach and educational curricula for the Ransom and Sarah Williams Farmstead Project in southern Travis County.



- C. Ratify contract with the Texas Historical Commission to receive National Park Service resources to the Travis County Historical Commission for public outreach and educational curricula related to the Ransom and Sarah Williams Farmstead Project in south Travis County. Requires additional funds for a cash match;
- D. Approve contract with the Corporation for National and Community Service to continue the Coming of Age Program in the Health and Human Services & Veterans Service Department; and
- E. Approve permission to continue the Comprehensive Energy Assistance Program and use Health and Human Services and Veterans Service's budget for related operating expenses until the forthcoming FY 12 agreement is fully executed.

BACKGROUND/SUMMARY OF REQUEST AND ATTACHMENTS:

Items A & B were approved by the Court on February 21,2012, the Office of the Governor, Criminal Justice division requested changes to the resolution that was required and in the case of item B, some changes to the performance measures in the grant. To meet the requirements of the grantor, the resolutions were signed by the Judge and these items were submitted to approve the revised resolution.

Item C is to approve a new contract with the Texas Historic Commission and Travis County. The originals for this contract were inadvertently submitted to the Judge as follow-up documents to the Application that was approved in December. However the

document was not submitted to the State and is submitted to the whole Court for approval before submitting the document to the State.

Item D is to continue an existing grant program.

Item E is an extension of an existing Permission to continue. The document is in the final stages of readiness for Court approval, but an additional continuation is needed to avoid a gap in service.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

PBO recommends approval of all items.

ISSUES AND OPPORTUNITIES:

Additional information is provided on each item's grant summary sheet.

FISCAL IMPACT AND SOURCE OF FUNDING:

PBO Recommendation:

The Juvenile Probation Department is requesting a re-ratification of the already approved Trauma Informed Assessment and Response, due to minor adjustments to the program's grant resolution.

PBO recommends approval of the request.

1. Brief Narrative - Summary of Grant: What is the goal of the program? How does the grant fit into the current activities of the department? Is the grant starting a new program, or is it enhancing an existing program?

The goal of the newly created program (Trauma Informed Assessment and Response) is to develop a trauma-informed infrastructure that will aid in the identification of youth who have been exposed to trauma and provide targeted services for intervention. Identifying and directing care toward the needs of these youth will provide linkages to services that appropriately target trauma, improve behavioral and emotional functioning of both youth and their families, and empower parents and youth to develop better coping strategies. Eligible youth from the COPE Mental Health Court and CPS Crossover Unit will be directed to services that include more rigorous psychological evaluation, psychiatric evaluation, trauma-based therapy, youth advocacy, alternative therapies (e.g., equine, music, or art therapy), and other services based on individual needs.

There are two objectives of this program. One is to improve outcomes for youth with identified mental health needs by diagnosing trauma and providing specific treatment and targeted services to meet those needs. A more rigorous mental health assessment process will identify a larger number of youth who have experienced trauma. Another objective is to leverage the existing collaborative efforts between TCJPD, CPS, and CASA for youth with trauma-based mental health disorders. Collaboration between these agencies will allow the program to provide more intensive services to address the needs of these youth.

The grant will pay for newly hired .50 FTE senior counselor and/or therapist (licensed), who will be paid solely out of this grant, a contract with CASA of Travis County to provide a guardian *ad litem* for program participants, a contract with Dr. Casey O'Neal to provide intensive psychological and/or psychiatric evaluations, and traditional and alternative therapeutic services to program participants for a total cost of \$192,666.

There are no long term County funding requirements of this grant.

The Department intends to request subsequent year continuation funding for the personnel contractual and services through proposals submitted to the Federal and State government, as well as private foundations. As previously presented to the Court, the County will have the opportunity to consider investment in the staff positions as well as other areas of Special Services Division. There is no provision in this grant for indirect costs.

6. If this is a new program, please provide information why the County should expand into this area.

The Travis County Juvenile Probation Department (TCJPD) works with a significant number of youth who have been identified as having mental health issues. In State FY10, there were 2,862 juveniles referred to TCJPD, representing 5,439 referrals. Of the 2,535 youth screened, it was determined that 31% (780) had a mental health need. A more intensive assessment was conducted with 67% (525) of these youth. Of those assessed, 20% received a trauma-based diagnosis (e.g., neglect, sexual abuse, physical abuse, and post-traumatic stress disorder). However, it is estimated that more than 60 percent of youth involved in the juvenile justice system nationwide have experienced some form of trauma. With enhanced trauma-based tools, we anticipate the number of Travis County Juvenile Probation youth properly identified as having a trauma-based diagnosis will increase substantially. Better assessment and diagnosis will allow for more targeted recommendations and interventions. Youth with a history that includes trauma have more complex needs and require therapeutic services to specifically address their exposure to trauma. Youth with an identified mental health need, including those who have experienced trauma, have a higher rate of recidivism (30%) than those without an identified need (24%). This new program will services youth who are being supervised in the COPE Mental Health Court and the CPS Crossover Unit by incorporating collaboration with CASA of Travis County, which will help to better serve our population.

7. Please explain how this program will affect your current operations. Please tie the performance measures for this program back to the critical performance measures for your department or office.

The Travis County Commissioner's Court approved the community plan, entitled--"Travis County Community Plan for Coordination of Criminal Justice and Related Activities FY 2012 - FY 2015," on December 6, 2011. Nearly 30 Travis County government agencies including Travis County Juvenile Probation Department, school districts, and nonprofit organizations participated in developing the Community Plan. This project addresses priority C from the juvenile justice section. Priority C states: "Travis County is in need of services and programming for youth with mental health/co-occurring disorders and substance abuse problems." To address this priority, the Trauma Informed Assessment and Response program will collaborate with service providers, non-profits, and multiple units within TCJPD to maximize resources, improve quality of services and outcomes, and reduce justice system involvement for youth experiencing mental health/co-occurring disorders and substance abuse problems associated with exposure to trauma.

This application is being re-presented based upon the preliminary review comments from the Office of the Governor Criminal Justice Division (CJD). Per CJD's feedback this grant should have been categorized into a different priority and this change resulted in a different set of performance measures. Based on an annual calculation of juvenile crime data in Travis County, the Juvenile Probation Department is eligible to apply for \$31,926 for this grant.

The goal of the Eagle Resource Project is to enhance and expand a continuum of vocational and life skills opportunities to 15-17 year old juveniles that reside in our ISC program and re-integrating back in the community. This continuation grant is the third year of a declining three year project.

Juveniles being released from Travis County Juvenile Probation Department's Intermediate Sanction Center (ISC) Programs that are age appropriate for work are presenting multiple needs and require differentiation of individualized training and services in order to successfully reenter the community. These juveniles lack adequate life skills; vocational training and hands on work experiences needed to successfully reenter into the community and are at risk for returning to criminal behavior.

In FY11, the Eagle Resource Grant provided services to 79 juveniles between the ages of 15 and 17 in the ISC Programs. In FY11, 127 (79%) of the 160 juveniles served by the ISC were 15 – 17 years of age. The majority of these youth do not have hands-on vocational skills or experience upon entry, and none have had individualized job coaching. Upon admission to the program, 65% are behind grade level and lack sufficient high school credits. As a

result of this project, the program has continued an on-site GED program in which 30 students were enrolled, 15 prepared to test, and 11 students tested and reentered the community with a GED earned while in the program. These students also have access to an on-site job coach for career assessment and exploration, résumé writing, and mock interviewing.

The Goal of this project is to equip juveniles enrolled in ISC programs with life skills, vocational training, and job/career coaching, as well as to provide multiple hands on experiences that will help them enter the world of work or higher education when they re-integrate into the community. In FY11, the Eagle Resource grant provided services to 79 juveniles in the ISC Program. Year one of implementation provided participating youth a foundation for successful reentry. Juveniles referred for services continue to present multiple needs and require differentiation of services based on their past school successes or failures. In response, the program has continued an on-site GED program in which 30 students were enrolled, 15

prepared to test, and 11 students tested and reentered the community with a GED. Those juveniles who are on track for traditional High School graduation are given opportunities to accelerate their academics and access higher education in the local community college. PBO Recommendation:

The Historical Commission is requesting Commissioners Court approval of a new grant contract with the Texas Historical Commission, to create an educational outreach program for the Ransom and Sarah Williams farmstead project in southern Travis County.

The grant requires a \$7,500 cash match from Travis County. The department does not have sufficient internal funding to cover that match. PBO recommends transferring \$7,500 from Allocated Reserves because the funds are needed in FY12, and will work with the department to bring forward a budget request for the cash match from this fund. This grant requires no ongoing funding commitment from the County.

The grant contract has already been signed by Judge Biscoe but not yet submitted to the grantor; therefore, the department is bringing the grant forward for approval of Commissioners Court.

PBO recommends approval of the request.

1. Brief Narrative - Summary of Grant: What is the goal of the program? How does the grant fit into the current activities of the department? Is the grant starting a new program, or is it enhancing an existing program?

This grant provides funding for public outreach and educational curricula for the Ransom and Sarah Williams farmstead project in south Travis County. The Travis County Certified Local Government has participated in the CLG grant program since receiving our designation in 2004. We began that year with our first grant application, a cultural resources project to supplement previous work by others in East Austin. We have successfully followed that project with two in northeastern Travis County: one in the city of Manor and one in the rural area of the county north and east of Manor. Our fourth project, currently underway, is a resource survey in the Webberville corridor of eastern Travis County, an area bounded by US 290 on the north, State Highway 130 on the west, the Colorado River on the south, and the Bastrop County line on the east. We will survey this area to identify its cultural resources ahead of additional future County growth and development. We are also working to extend our vision by encompassing projects located throughout Travis County that require technical and/or financial assistance.

2. Departmental Resource Commitment: What are the long term County funding requirements of the grant?

This specific grant terminates September 30, 2013, with the completion of the project. Future projects are developed on a regular basis and will require grant support from the County and/or other local sources to meet the needed match for grant funds.

A county match is required, funded through budget changes to the County Historical Commission.



FISCAL YEAR 2012 CERTIFIED LOCAL GOVERNMENT (CLG) GRANT CONTRACT TX-12-025

I. PARTIES

The parties of this contract are the Texas Historical Commission, an agency of the State of Texas, hereinafter referred to as Commission; and Travis County hereinafter referred to as Grantee.

II. PURPOSE

This contract is entered into pursuant to a grant made to the Commission for fiscal year 2012 by the U.S. Department of the Interior, National Park Service, under the provisions of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, P.L. 89-665 (16 U.S.C. Sec. 470 f). This grant is made for the purpose of funding a project or projects to be undertaken by Grantee as a participant in the Certified Local Government program.

III. SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED

The following services are to be provided within the contract period on a schedule to be agreed upon by the parties to this contract. However, the services designated with specific deadlines must comply with those deadlines.

The Grantee shall undertake and complete the project or projects as set out in the Project Notification (Attachment A) with detailed budget. Products developed under this agreement must conform to the requirements of the Commission and the Project Proposal, as stipulated in the Expected Products of Education and Outreach Projects (Attachment B).

Project personnel employed by the Grantee shall meet the Standards for Professional Qualifications as outlined in 36 CFR 61 (Attachment C), as appropriate to the scope of the project, and be employed by competitive procurement. Regulations of the U.S. Department of the Interior strictly prohibit unlawful discrimination in federally-assisted programs on the basis of race, color, and/or national origin. Therefore the Grantee must sign DI Form 1350 U.S. Department of the Interior Civil Rights Assurance (Attachment D) and return the signed form to the Commission with this contract. In all cases the person(s) employed by the Grantee to complete the work specified in this contract must meet with the approval of the Commission. The professional staff hired must also contact the Commission's Certified Local Government staff prior to commencing work.

IV. AMOUNT OF THE CONTRACT

The total amount of this contract shall not exceed \$7,500.00. The Commission shall reimburse the Grantee exclusively from U.S. Department of the Interior grant-in-aid funds for historic preservation (Certified Local Government), and this contract is subject to the availability of those funds.

V. PERIOD

This contract shall commence on March 1, 2012 and shall terminate on December 31, 2013. It is further agreed that all work associated with this project shall be completed by September 30, 2013 and all materials stipulated in Attachments A and B and all reimbursement requests shall be submitted to the Commission by October 31, 2013.

An extension for completing materials stipulated in Attachment B may be granted by the Commission upon review and approval of a written extension request by the Grantee, provided that a draft of the grant product(s) has been previously reviewed and approved. The final product must be received by the Commission no later than **December 31, 2013**. All expenses incurred by the Grantee associated with work completed after **September 30, 2013** shall be considered ineligible for reimbursement under this grant contract.

Contract amendments may be submitted in writing using the Contract Amendment Form (Attachment E) at any time between March 1, 2012 and August 31, 2013 at the option of the Commission.

VI. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

The Grantee is a political subdivision of the State of Texas. It is not an agency of the State of Texas. It is expressly understood and agreed that any subcontractor is an independent contractor and not an employee of the Texas Historical Commission. The Grantee or any subcontractor shall not be considered the agent, the servant, or the employee of the Commission for any purpose whatsoever.

VII. DOCUMENTATION AND PAYMENT

Grantee may submit to the Commission, for its approval, a properly completed invoice for services rendered in compliance with all requirements of the contract as specified in the Reimbursement Request Procedures and Required Records (Attachment F). Grantee will provide invoices to the Commission as costs are incurred and work is completed, but not more frequently than monthly.

It is further agreed that the Grantee will provide written quarterly updates on the Grant Product Quarterly Report Form as provided by the Commission on the progress of the grant product. Each update will outline the tasks completed and expenses incurred on the project and provide a timeline and status of the overall project. The Grant Product Quarterly Report will be due on April 30, 2012, August 30, 2012, December 31, 2012, April 30, 2013, and August 30, 2013. Failure to submit quarterly reports as required on a timely basis may constitute breach of this grant contract and result in forfeiture of the grant.

Reimbursement to the Grantee shall be on a matching basis as outlined in the Project Notification's Budget section, subject to receipt of funds from the National Park Service and successful completion of all project work activities. The Commission agrees to pay the Grantee up to \$7,500.00 in federal funds. The Grantee agrees to contribute matching share, either donated services or cash match, for a minimum total of \$7,500.00 or 50% of eligible costs, whichever is less.

Such payments shall be made as requested for services actually rendered, or if mutually agreed, in one lump sum upon completion and approval of all the requirements set forth in this agreement. It is further agreed that a sum not to exceed 25% of the total grant award will be retained by the Commission until the following have occurred: (a) Commission review of the draft project materials and comments incorporated into the project; (b) receipt of two (2) detailed and documented final completion reports; and (c) receipt of properly documented reimbursement materials.

Subject to the limitations of the contract, the Commission's payments will be made in accordance with the Texas Prompt Payment Act.

VIII. OWNERSHIP OF PRODUCTS OF THIS CONTRACT

All material, concepts and products produced, developed or conceived by the Grantee during or arising out of the contract shall remain the property of the Commission. The Grantee shall have an unrestricted right to use any or all materials so produced, developed, or conceived at no additional cost. Pursuant to the stipulations in Attachment B a minimum of two (2) copies of all final products and completion reports, if applicable (Attachment G) are to be supplied to the Commission before final reimbursement is made. All materials published, printed or used for public distribution funded in whole or in part by this grant shall note the following on the materials:

Final invoices shall be submitted to the Commission not later than 30 days following the date of termination of this contract.

X. APPLICABLE LAWS

This contract shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the rules and policies of the Commission. All projects funded under the Certified Local Government program must meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards. XI. AUDIT

The Commission may audit the Grantee's records to verify the costs or expenses incurred in the performance of this contract or may, at its option, require an audit of the Grantee's records by an independent accounting firm, at the Grantee's expense, or by Federal auditors to verify costs or expenses incurred in the performance of the contract. The Grantee shall keep accurate financial records available for audit for three years from the project end date. In addition to the terms detailed in this Agreement, all federal requirements governing grants (Office of Management and Budget Circulars A-87 or A-122, A-102 or A-110, A-133, and A-128) are applicable.

ATTACHMENT F

REIMBURSEMENT REQUEST PROCEDURES AND REQUIRED RECORDS

The required reimbursement procedures and format are found in this chapter. Requests must be received by THC to later than October 31, 2013, and may be submitted electronically as a pdf file or hard copy by US mail, or local and-carrier service. Each request must be separated accordingly per grant number. Requests for payment shall be accompanied by complete documentation, including receipts for all expenses and all products identified in the approved application. Non-federal or match share should be documented in the same method as federal expenditures. If you will be submitting your request electronically, please send it to Matt Synatschk at matt.synatschk@thc.state.tx.us. Acceptable documentation must show:

- invoices in the name of the CLG;
- 2. invoice dates within the project/contract period;
- 3. purchase price compatible with the estimated budget costs;
- purchase(s) relevant to the scope of the project/contract;
- 5. copies of properly endorsed cancelled checks (both front and back);
- 5. evidence that invoices were properly approved for payment including evidence that discounts and other credits were deducted and evidence that merchandise/services were received;
- 7. copies of daily time records including supervisor's verification of time worked, and evidence of employees' rates of pay including justification for rates paid;
- evidence that work was accomplished in accordance with the terms of the grant agreement and evidence
 that the method for selecting professional services was accomplished in accordance with federal
 procurement requirements.

Grant participants should maintain any other documentation that might be useful to an auditor in verifying the propriety of the procedures used and compliance with federal and state regulations.

CLG's must retain financial records, supporting documents, statistical records, and all other records pertinent to a grant for a period of three years or until an acceptable audit has been performed and resolved. The three-year retention period begins from the date of the submission of the final expenditure report. The grant participant will provide access to, and the right to examine, all records, books, papers or documents related to the grant to authorized representatives of the Texas Historical Commission. Only items listed in the approved Budget and Application will be approved for payment.

Under the "Single Audit Act of 1984," a single, comprehensive, organization-wide audit of local governments receiving any federal funds will be conducted. Governments that receive \$100,000 or more in federal funds from all sources during their fiscal year will be required to have a single audit. Governments receiving between \$25,000 and \$100,000 federal assistance have the option of having a single audit or complying with any applicable audit requirements of the individual grants they have received. Governments receiving less than \$25,000 are exempt from the act. The CLG is responsible for covering the cost of the audit.

Time Sheets

Each employee or volunteer engaged in activities to be claimed against the grant must submit a time sheet signed by the employee/volunteer and the supervisor. Such records must show the actual hours worked, date worked and the specific duties performed. The records should also indicate the basis for determining the rate of the volunteer's contributions. Employees can claim their regular hourly wage. Time sheets must certify no other federal funds were used to pay salaries and that their salaries were not used as match for other federal grants.

Volunteers must claim a reasonable wage rate. Professionals may claim their standard professional wage if volunteering professional services. In any case, hourly wages may not exceed the maximum rate of \$74.92/hour. A sample volunteer time sheet is attached under miscellaneous forms attached.

2. Travel

The miscellaneous forms include a travel record. This identifies traveler, dates of travel, mileage, lodging, costs of meals and other miscellaneous travel expenses. Receipts for all expenses are required. See attached allowable travel rates for limits.

3. Miscellaneous Expenses

Proper documentation for miscellaneous expenses includes that information identified in the beginning of this attachment. Following this attachment are additional sample records for miscellaneous volunteer costs.

Subcontracts

All services and products must be procured according to federal procurement standards set forth in OMB Circulars A-87 and A-112. If the government is not doing the actual work, it muse execute a contract with the subgrantee – i.e., professional consultant, local historical society, individuals, etc.

All subcontracts must include the Assurances for Consultants and Subcontractors, attached. A very simple letter of agreement to be used as a guide is found in Attachment C. Since each local government may have different requirements, the appropriate local official should review this letter.

A copy of the contract between the CLG and a subgrantee must be sent to the SHPO for audit purposes.

. Payment Schedule

Reimbursement payments to the CLG will be made according to the schedule outlined in the contract:

- (a.) after an acceptable billing and final product have been approved by the SHPO; and
- (b.) when federal funds become available to the State.
- If there is more than one activity identified under the grant, each expense must be attributed to a specific activity to evaluate actual costs versus proposed costs. For example, if a grant funded both National Register nominations and survey, the billing must show each expense allocated to either nominations or survey.

PBO Recommendation:

This grant contract with the Corporation for National and Community Service provides \$50,495 in grant funds to enhance the county's Coming of Age program that seeks to increase volunteerism among baby boomers.

PBO recommends approval of this contract.

1. Brief Narrative - Summary of Grant: What is the goal of the program? How does the grant fit into the current activities of the department? Is the grant starting a new program, or is it enhancing an existing program?

Coming of Age focuses on the skills available in the Baby Boomer population (those born between 1946 and 1964) as well as older retirees to create more value for the community. Coming of Age volunteers focus on the following service areas: education, independent living, health and human services, volunteer mobilization and capacity building. Volunteers will be able to explore their future, become community leaders, pursue lifelong learning, and engage in meaningful service. Activities these volunteers will pursue include tutoring, mentoring, food distribution, caregiver services, health education, recruiting volunteers for nonprofit organizations, and coordinating fund-raising events for nonprofits.

Coming of Age receives two grants from the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS). The grant for \$50,495 comes directly from CNCS. Another grant for \$24,484 comes from the Texas Dept. on Aging and Disability Services (DADS) and is passed through CNCS. Coming of Age also receives an \$8,845 grant from the University of North Texas (UNT). These grants enhance an existing program.

2. Departmental Resource Commitment: What are the long term County funding requirements of the grant?

The \$50,495 grant requires a 30% cash match of \$15,149 from the General Fund. The General Fund budget for Coming of Age more than covers the match requirement. This grant pays for approximately 45% of the Coming of Age Director's salary and benefits as well as operating expenses. The General Fund would most likely have to cover this if the grant is not renewed.

3. County Commitment to the Grant: Is a county match required? If so, how does the department propose to fund the grant match? Please explain.

The county is required to provide a 30% (\$15,149) cash match. This is more than covered by the current Coming of Age budget. No additional funds are required. The \$321,591 in the County Cost Share column shows the amount of General Fund money committed to the program. This includes the required 30% match.

4. Does the grant program have an indirect cost allocation, in accordance with the grant rules? If not, please explain why not.

The current indirect cost rate assigned to TCHHSVS by the consultant Maximus is .5542. At this rate, the cost for grant administration would be \$27,984. There is not enough money elsewhere in the Coming of Age budget to cover the shortfall that would result if this amount were requested for grant administration.

5. County Commitment to the Program Upon Discontinuation of Grant by Grantor: Will the program discontinue upon discontinuance of the grant funding? (Yes/No) If No: What is the proposed funding mechanism: (1) Request additional funding (2) Use departmental resources. If (2) is answered, provide details about what internal resources are to be provided and what other programs will be discontinued as a result.

The Coming of Age program would have to seek funding from other sources, including the General Fund, if the Corporation for National and Community Service reduced or discontinued this grant.

Summary and Staff Recommendation:

Coming of Age Austin Metro (formerly known as Travis County RSVP) broadens the scope of RSVP by focusing on the skills available in the Baby Boomer population (those born between 1946 and 1964) as well as older retirees to create more value for the community. Coming of Age volunteers focus on the following service areas: education, independent living, health and human services, volunteer mobilization and capacity building. Volunteers will be able to explore their future, become community leaders, pursue lifelong learning, and engage in meaningful service. Activities these volunteers will pursue include tutoring, mentoring, food distribution, caregiver services, health education, recruiting volunteers for nonprofit organizations, and coordinating fundraising events for nonprofits.

TCHHSVS staff recommends approving this grant.

Budgetary and Fiscal Impact:

PBO Recommendation:

HHS&VS is requesting a Permission to Continue funding five temporary employees in the 2012 CEAP grant for another three months or until the contract is fully executed. In addition, the department is requesting that it be allowed to continue using General Fund resources to fund the operating portion of the grant program. As part of the first Permission to Continue request, HHS&VS requested that \$175,000 in General Fund resources be used to continue providing a level of service until the grant contract is fully executed. Operating funds are still available from that first request and HHS&VS requests that it be allowed to continue to spend from those available funds until May 31, 2012.

Because a draft of the 2012 CEAP grant contract has been released to Travis County by the state, PBO recommends approval of this request.

1. Brief Narrative - Summary of Grant: What is the goal of the program? How does the grant fit into the current activities of the department? Is the grant starting a new program, or is it enhancing an existing program?

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs has released to Travis County a draft of the 2012 CEAP grant contract. The contract states the award for this grant will be \$2,901,313. This funding provides \$455,078 for salary expenses relating to the allowable tasks of the 3 full-time and 2 part-time temporary workers, and other department staff providing outreach and case management activities. This grant funding also provides \$2,445,035 for utility assistance relating to the three utility component budgets and \$1,200 for training and travel expenses.

The program assists low-income households with heating and cooling energy utility assistance. This helps in meeting the program goal of achieving energy self-sufficiency for low-income families and individuals. Program guidelines allow households to seek utility assistance to

address a crisis situation relating to household energy bills or the household situation may need a copayment or multiple payment term to achieve energy self-sufficiency.

The department also utilizes funding from this CEAP program for providing clients with case management services to address other household issues other than those encompassing energy needs.

No additional funds are required.

Travis County Health and Human Services & Veterans Service Family Support Services division staff performs client eligibility interviews with clients seeking assistance provided by this program and the other programs available through the department. These CEAP grant funds provide household utility assistance through the three utility assistance program components.

The CEAP program funding represents the department's largest program source for utility assistance. Proposed Motion: Consider and take appropriate action on the request from Travis County Health and Human Services & Veterans Service for permission to continue funding temporary employees funded by the Comprehensive Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) in the 2012 program year until a fully executed contract is obtained from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.

Program Summary: The department has requested permission to continue these salaries in the amount of \$58,392. for five temporary employees in the 2012 CEAP grant for the next three months. The grant period for 2012 began January 1, 2012. A prior permission to continue for these salaries was approved by Commissioners Court on December 27, 2011. TDHCA has provided a draft of the 2012 CEAP grant contract and it is under Travis County review. The department anticipates the grant contract should be fully executed within the next three months.

These office specialists are needed to continue the services provided by this grant program pending the approval of the grant contract. The department deems it necessary to retain this staff for maintaining a level of continuity for serving the residents of Travis County with this program assistance.

This funding will be used to fund the revenue and expenditure budgets for the next three months' worth of salary and benefits. The grant will reimburse the General Fund upon execution of the grant contract.

TCHHSVS staff recommends approving the permission to continue.

Budgetary and Fiscal Impact:

The \$58,392 will come from salary savings of vacant slots 171 and 270. No matching funds are required. The current contract period is from 01-01-12 and ends 12-31-12.

Issues and Opportunities: The department uses CEAP funds for direct assistance for qualified clients in Travis County, allowable administrative and case management costs, and allowable direct services support costs for outreach. The grant allows the department to provide assistance to clients who are experiencing an energy-related hardship. This program is designed to assist clients in obtaining energy self-sufficiency and is consistent with the goal of the Travis County Health and Human Services and Veterans Service Department. In the last program year, funds from the CEAP grant were used to assist more than 5,133 households within Travis County.





Summary and Staff Recommendations:

The Howard Lane I Project (from Dessau Road to Cameron Road) is complete (with the exception of a couple of minor waterline related items). It is fully opened to traffic and have been for several months now. The requests for contract modifications were forwarded to the City of Austin Water Utility Department (the City) for their approval and funding since both requests were for work related to items funded by the City in accordance with the interlocal agreement.

Construction change order request:

Joe Bland Construction, Inc. submitted the attached change order request for compensation related to the construction of miscellaneous water line related items. The total cost for the construction changes is \$112,148.71.

The Howard Lane I Road and Drainage Improvements project is funded with money from the 1997, 2001, and 2005 Bond Projects Funds. It is located in the Northeast sector of Travis County traversing both Precincts One and Two, from Dessau Road to Cameron Road, along what was generally known as Gregg Lane. The proposed improvements, in compliance with the current CAMPO plan, includes roadway widening from the existing two lane rural roadway to a four—lane urban design section (curb and gutter) with sidewalks and dedicated bicycle

lanes, subsurface storm sewer system, bridge, and associated utility relocations. Attachment "A" is a Project Location Map.

The City has approved this change request, and provided the funds to the County on February 2, 2012.

Issues and Opportunities:

TNR is working on the final steps to complete all remaining applicable work under this contract.

Budgetary and Fiscal Impact:

The Howard Lane I Road and Drainage Improvements project is funded with money from the county's 1984 and 2005 Bond Projects Funds, (and the City for waterline relocation and extension costs).

Issues and Opportunities:

CJS was recently modified to disburse partial payments and eliminate the need for the manual disbursements.

Hamer Enterprises Quote #9950 (attached) provides for following modifications to the e-JUSTICE software to synchronize assessment and disbursement balances between CJS and e-JUSTICE:

- 1. Custom Import of Prior Payment Disbursement Detail from FACTS/CJS into e-JUSTICE Payment History Disbursement Detail Database.
- 2. Change payment disbursement priority for both cash and non-cash payments. (No Charge, included as part of Software Maintenance Agreement due to Legislative changes.)
- 3. Modify Assessment Import and DB Structure to import additional fields and store for Tax Office Query use.

These modifications will facilitate a more accurate conversion from CJS to Odyssey.

Background:

Historically, the CJS system did not disburse payments that are receipted for less than the total costs & fees assessed on a case. 

A) The Reserve at Lynnbrook Final Plat (A Small Lot Subdivision) (Final Plat - 35 total lots (34 single family residential lots and one drainage/greenbelt/open space lot) - 11.563 acres - City of Austin ETJ); and

B) A subdivision construction agreement between Travis County and Lynnbrook Reserve Ltd. in Precinct Three.

BACKGROUND/SUMMARY OF REQUEST:

- A) This final plat consists of 35 total lots (34 single family residential lots and one drainage/greenbelt/open space lot) on 11.563 acres. The property fronts on Lynnbrook Drive, which connects to Old Manchaca Road to the east of Slaughter Lane via Bauerle Ranch to the west. The application includes 775 linear feet of proposed public streets. Water and wastewater service will be provided by the City of Austin. Parkland fees in lieu of parkland dedication have been paid to the City of Austin in the amount of \$6,287.00.
- B) The applicant proposes to enter into a subdivision construction agreement between Travis County and Lynnbrook Reserve, Ltd. to outline construction of the subdivision's infrastructure improvements.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

As this final plat application meets all Single Office requirements and was approved by the City of Austin Zoning and Platting Commission on March 6, 2012, Single Office staff recommends approval of the final plat.





LOCATION MAP NOT TO SCALE











§ EXHIBIT 82.401 (E) SUBDIVISION CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENT

STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF TRAVIS

This Agreement is made and entered into by and between Lynchological Kistor, L10., (the "Subdivider") and Travis County, Texas, (the "County), hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Parties".

WHEREAS, the Subdivider owns the tract of real property described in Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and made a part hereof, (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, the Subdivider desires to subdivide the Property, pursuant to the proposed final plat of "Reserve a Lynnbowk" (the "Subdivision"); and

WHEREAS, the County desires to set forth the Subdivider's responsibility for the construction of the Subdivision's roads and drainage facilities (the "Improvements"); and

WHEREAS, the Subdivider desires to set forth the County's responsibility to accept the constructed Improvements for maintenance;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

I. Subdivider's Obligations

A. Improvements. The Subdivider shall construct the Improvements required to comply with the County's Standards for the Construction of Streets and Drainage in Subdivisions (the "Standards"). The Improvements will conform to the construction plans, permits, and specifications approved by the County prior to commencement of construction.

- B. Security. To secure the Subdivider's obligations, the Subdivider will provide a financial guarantee of performance in the amount of the estimated cost of constructing the Improvements (the "Security"), which has been determined by a professional engineer and approved by the County's Transportation and Natural Resources Department ("TNR"). The Security must be in a form approved for use in the Standards or otherwise approved by the County Attorney's Office.
- C. Alternative Fiscal. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Agreement, the Subdivider may request the Commissioners Court to hold the administratively approved plat in abeyance until all streets, alleys, sidewalks, and drainage improvements in the Subdivision. The Subdivider must post fiscal security to secure restoration of disturbed areas should construction not be completed. Upon satisfactory completion, the submitted plat shall be forwarded to the Commissioners Court for approval and recording, provided adequate fiscal security has been posted to secure the one year Construction Performance Period described below.
- D. Completion. The Improvements must be constructed no later than three (3) years after the effective date of this Agreement. This period may be extended by the delivery to the County at least forty five (45) days prior to the expiration of the Security of an extension of the Security in a form approved by the County. Upon completion of the Improvements, the Subdivider will

provide the County with a complete set of construction plans for the Improvements, certified "as built" by the engineer responsible for preparing the approved construction plans and specifications.

- E. Warranty. The Subdivider warrants the public Improvements will be free from defects for a period of one (1) year from the date the County accepts the construction of the public Improvements (the "Performance Period"). The Subdivider shall correct and repair any defects in materials or workmanship, including design inadequacies and damage to or deterioration of the public Improvements, that occur before and during this Performance Period due to any cause. As a condition of the County's acceptance of dedication of any of the public Improvements, the Subdivider must post fiscal security in the form of cash, a performance bond, or other approved form and in the amount of ten percent (10%) of the cost of constructing the public Improvements, to secure the warranty established by this Agreement. It is expressly acknowledged that the public Improvements must meet County Standards at the end of the one year Construction Performance Period in order for the County to release the construction performance fiscal security.
- F. Increase in Security. If the County determines the cost of constructing the Improvements exceeds the posted Security, within thirty (30) days after notice and demand, the Subdivider shall provide additional Security in an amount equal to the additional estimated cost.
- G. Reduction in Security. During the construction of the Improvements, the Security may be reduced in accordance with the percentage of completion of the construction. The Executive Manager of TNR will execute Statements of Partial Reductions in the Amount of Security, when provided with the following documentation:
 - 1) a professional engineer's certification of quantities of work completed;
 - 2) a contractor's invoice for work completed; and
 - 3) a TNR inspection report, indicating the completion of the portion of the work represented by the contractor's invoice.

After the approval and acceptance of the construction of the Improvements, the Security for the public Improvements may be reduced by ninety percent (90%) of the cost of the approved construction and held for the one-year Performance Period. After the approval of the construction of the private Improvements, the Security posted for the private Improvements will be fully released. In addition, the County agrees to release or reduce, as appropriate, the Security provided by the Subdivider, if the County accepts a substitute Security for all or any portion of the Improvements.

H. Covenant, Restriction, and Condition. In the event that the Improvements are not constructed to County Standards and the required Security has expired, the Subdivider shall not sell, transfer, or convey any of the lots in the Subdivision until sufficient Security has been posted with the County for the completion of the construction.

II. County's Obligations

A. Inspection and Approval. The County will inspect the Improvements during and at the completion of construction. If the Improvements are completed in accordance with the Standards, the County will approve the Improvements and accept the public Improvements.

- B. Notice of Defect. The County will notify the Subdivider, if an inspection reveals that any portion of the Improvements is not constructed in accordance with the Standards or is otherwise defective. However, the County is not responsible for the construction of the Improvements, the quality of the material, or the construction methods utilized. In addition, the County is not responsible for making continuous on-site inspections of the construction work and the County has no privity with or responsibility for the construction contractor or any subcontractors. The Subdivider will have thirty (30) days from such notice to cure the defect. It is an event of default under this Agreement, if the defect is not cured prior to the expiration of the time to cure.
- C. Performance Period Security Release. Upon the expiration of the one-year Performance Period with no damages or defects which the Executive Manager notifies the Subdivider must be corrected, the Executive Manager will release the Performance Period Security.
- D. Conditions to Draw on Security. The County may draw upon any Security posted under this Agreement upon the occurrence of one or more of the following events:
 - a. The failure of the Subdivider to construct the Improvements to the applicable County Standards;
 - b. The Subdivider's failure to renew or replace the Security at least forty-five (45) days prior to its expiration;
 - c. The acquisition of the Property or a portion of the Property by the issuer of the Security or other creditor through foreclosure or an assignment or conveyance in lieu of foreclosure;
 - d. The arrangement by the Commissioners Court for the completion of one or more of the Improvements; or
 - e. The determination by the Commissioners Court that the completion of one or more of the public Improvements is in the public Interest.
- E. Notice of Intent to Draw. The County shall provide ten (10) days written notice of the occurrence of such an event to the Subdivider with a copy provided to any fiscal surety, lender, or escrow agent. The notice will include a statement that the County intends to provide for the performance of some or all of Subdivider's obligations hereunder for the construction of the Improvements, if the failure is not cured. The County shall be entitled to draw the amount it considers necessary to perform the Subdivider's obligations under this Agreement up to the total amount allocated for the Improvements. In lieu of a drawing based on an event described in subparagraphs (b) or (c), above, the County may accept a substitute Security.

F. Use of Proceeds.

- 1) The County must utilize the proceeds of any posted security solely for the purpose of completing the Improvements to the County's Standards or to correct defects in or failures of the Improvements.
- 2) The County may in its sole discretion complete some or all of the unfinished Improvements at the time of default, regardless of the extent to which development has taken place in the Subdivision or whether development ever commenced, without incurring any

obligation to complete any of the unfinished Improvements. If the County uses the proceeds to complete, repair, or reconstruct the Improvements, it will do so as a public trustee of the development process in order to protect purchasers and taxpayers from the adverse consequences of a subdivider default or to protect the public interest by completing the Improvements.

- 3) The County is not a private subdivision developer and its draft on the Security and utilization of the proceeds to complete, repair, or reconstruct the Improvements is not an acceptance of the dedication of the Improvements. The acceptance of the Improvements is specifically contingent upon the delivery to the County of Improvements, which have been constructed to County Standards or the express order of acceptance by the County's Commissioners Court.
- 4) The Subdivider has no claim or rights under this Agreement to funds drawn under the Security or any accrued interest earned on the funds to the extent the same are used by the County hereunder.
- 5) All funds obtained by the County pursuant to one or more draws under the Security shall be maintained by the County in an interest bearing account or accounts until such funds, together with accrued interest thereon (the "Escrowed Funds"), are disbursed by the County.
- 6) The County shall disperse all or portions of the Escrowed Funds as Improvements are completed by the County, or in accordance with the terms of a written construction contract between the County and a third party for the construction of the Improvements.
- 7) Escrowed Funds not used or held by the County for the purpose of completing an Improvement or correcting defects in or failures of an Improvement, together with any interest accrued thereon, shall be paid by the County to the Issuer of the Security or, if the Security was originally in the form of cash, to the Subdivider, no later than sixty (60) days following the County's acceptance of the Improvement or its decision not to complete the Improvements using Escrowed Funds, whichever date is earlier.
- G. Releases. The Executive Manager will, subject to the performance of the Subdivider of its obligations under this agreement and the Travis County Standards for Construction of Streets & Drainage in Subdivisions, execute such releases of this Agreement as are necessary and reasonable upon the request of the Subdivider or a purchaser of a portion of the Property.

III. MISCELLANEOUS

- A. Covenants, Restrictions, and Conditions. These Covenants, Restrictions, and Conditions will operate as covenants running with the land and will be binding upon the Subdivider and the Subdivider's legal representatives, successors and assigns.
- B. Measure of Damages. The measure of damages for breach of this Agreement by the Subdivider is the actual cost of completing the Improvements in conformance with the County's Standards, including without limitation its associated administrative expenses.
- C. Remedies. The remedies available to the County and the Subdivider under this Agreement and the laws of Texas are cumulative in nature.

- D. Third Party Rights. No non-party shall have any right of action under this Agreement, nor shall any such non-party, including without limitation a trustee in bankruptcy, have any interest in or claim to funds drawn on the posted Security and held in escrow by the County in accordance with this Agreement.
- E. Indemnification. The Subdivider shall indemnify and hold the County harmless from and against all claims, demands, costs, and liability of every kind and nature, including reasonable attorney's fees, for the defense of such claims and demands, arising from any breach on the part of Subdivider of any provision in this Agreement, or from any act or negligence of Subdivider or Subdivider's agents, contractors, employees, tenants, or licensees in the construction of the Improvements. The Subdivider further agrees to aid and defend the County, if the County is named as a defendant in an action arising from any breach on the part of Subdivider of any provision in this Agreement or from any act or negligence of Subdivider or Subdivider's agents, contractors, employees, tenants, or licensees in the construction of the Improvements.
- F. No Waiver. The waiver of any provision of this Agreement will not constitute a waiver of any other provision, nor will it constitute a continuing waiver unless expressly provided for by a written amendment to this Agreement. The County's failure to enforce any provision will not constitute a waiver or estoppel of the right to do so.
- G. Attorney's Fees. The prevailing party in any litigation hereunder is entitled to recover its costs, including reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, and expert witness fees, from the other party. If the court awards relief to both parties, each will bear its own costs.
- H. Successors and Assigns. This Agreement is binding on the Subdivider and the heirs, successors, and assigns of the Subdivider and on any person acquiring an ownership interest in the Property through the Subdivider. The Subdivider's obligations under this Agreement may not be assigned without the written approval of the County; provided the County's approval shall not be unreasonably withheld if the Subdivider's assignee expressly assumes all obligations of the Subdivider under this Agreement. An assignment shall not be construed as releasing the Subdivider from Subdivider's obligations under this Agreement and Subdivider's obligations hereunder shall continue notwithstanding any assignment approved pursuant to this Paragraph unless and until the County executes and delivers to the Subdivider a written release. The County agrees to release the Subdivider, if the Subdivider's assignee expressly assumes the Subdivider's obligations under this Agreement and has posted the Security required by this Agreement. The County in its sole discretion may assign some or all of its rights under this Agreement and any such assignment shall be effective upon notice to the Subdivider.
- I. Expiration. This Agreement will terminate upon the vacation of the Subdivision by the Subdivider or the completion of the Subdivider's obligations under this Agreement, whichever occurs first.

J. Notice. Any notice under this Agreement must be in writing and will be effective when personally delivered or three (3) days after deposit in the U.S. Mail, postage prepaid, certified with return receipt requested, and addressed as follows:

The parties may change their respective addresses for notice to any other location in the United States in accordance with the provisions of this Paragraph.

K. Severability. If any provision of this Agreement is held by a court to be illegal, invalid, or otherwise unenforceable, such illegality, invalidity, or unenforceability shall not affect the validity of any other provision and the rights of the parties will be construed as if such provision was never part of this Agreement.

L. Jurisdiction and Venue. This Agreement concerns real property located in Travis County, Texas, and shall be governed and construed under Texas law. Venue for any action arising under this Agreement shall be exclusively in Travis County, Texas.

M. Captions Immaterial. The captions or headings of the paragraphs of this Agreement are for convenience only and shall not be considered in construing this Agreement.

N. Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof. Any oral representations or modifications concerning this Agreement shall be of no force or effect, except a subsequent written modification executed by both parties. NO OFFICIAL, EMPLOYEE, OR AGENT OF THE COUNTY HAS ANY AUTHORITY, EITHER EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, TO AMEND, MODIFY, OR OTHERWISE CHANGE THIS AGREEMENT, EXCEPT PURSUANT TO SUCH EXPRESS AUTHORITY AS MAY BE GRANTED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT.

This Agreement is executed as of the dates set forth below and is effective upon approval by the County of the final plat for the Subdivision or upon approval of Alternative Fiscal in accordance with County regulations.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the requirements of TEXAS HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE, Chapter 711, and other applicable statutes, Travis County has acquired land for the purpose of providing burials for eligible individuals pursuant to County Policy, as shown in the documentation attached to this Resolution as Exhibit 1 and made a part of this Resolution.

WHEREAS, Travis County desires to set aside that property set forth in Exhibit 1 to this Resolution as a nonperpetual care cemetery, and to dedicate that property as delineated exclusively to cemetery purposes.





BACKGROUND/SUMMARY OF REQUEST:

The River Cove Home Owners Association (the "Association") entered into a Participation Agreement with the county wherein they will provide funds to be used with county funds to improve Michael's Cove in their subdivision. Improvements required to bring the roadway into compliance with minimum standards set forth in Travis County Chapter 84, Unaccepted substandard roadway specifications include existing pavement, relocation re-surfacing of of subdivision sign/landscaping away from clear zone and construction of a section of concrete curb and gutter. The estimated construction cost of pavement re-surfacing and concrete curb and gutter is \$12,000.00. The Association will be providing \$2,400.00 cash as their participation amount and will also be responsible for the relocation of the subdivision entrance sign and landscaping.

Now that The Association has removed the subdivision entrance sign and landscaping away from the clear zone, at an expense of more than \$2,000, and has deposited their cost share of \$2,400.00 with the county, TNR recommends acceptance of this roadway into county system so to allow for the needed road improvement work to be performed on this accepted roadway. Acceptance of this roadway will add 0.18 miles into county's road system. A portion of subdivision entrance sign/landscaping will remain within the right-of-way but is away from the clear zone. The Association agrees to enter into a license agreement with the county to allow for the remaining subdivision entrance sign/landscaping to stay within the right-of-way. The Association has made the security deposit of \$100 and has included the appropriate insurance certificate as required by the license agreement.

STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:

TNR recommends acceptance of this roadway and approving the license agreement.

ISSUES AND OPPORTUNITIES:

Inefficiencies are introduced into these projects when all residents are not supportive of either the project or the project design requirements. Most notably, program participants are totally responsible for dedicating all required right-of-way and removing all private property, such as fences, walls, and buildings that encroach into the dedicated right-of-way. In the past TNR has expended significant surveying, engineering, and right-of-way resources only to have projects delayed or indefinitely postponed because some residents did not want to dedicate easements, or did not like the impacts the construction would have upon their specific property. Inefficient re-design to accommodate residents was common. To address this issue TNR recommended using Public-Private Participation Agreements. Under the terms of these agreements cost are shared between the county and the property owners. This should provide an impetus for property owners to work with the county to minimize "custom" design or redesign.

Travis County Chapter 82 establishes the standard for new street and drainage construction. Many substandard roads were constructed or partially constructed prior to Travis County's adoption of roadway standards and to bring them up to today's standards would be cost prohibitive, in most cases, and drastically alter the character of some neighborhoods. As such, the standards in Chapter 84 are lower than those in Chapter 82. county responsibility for maintenance and liability will increase as roads are accepted onto the county system. The acceptance of roads could result in additional home building in older neighborhoods, which could increase the county's tax base.

In regards to the proposed license agreement, "...The Association agrees to and shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the COUNTY and its officers, agents and employees against all claims, suits, demands, judgments, expenses, including attorney's fees, or other liability for personal injury, death, or damage to any person or property, which arises from or is in any manner connected to or caused in whole or in part by The Association's construction, maintenance or use of the licensed property." The Association has provided insurance that adds Travis County as an additional insured for the improvements as described in the attached agreement.

FISCAL IMPACT AND SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The Court approved \$500,000.00 to fund the Substandard Road Program in the FY 07 budget process. The voters also approved additional amount of \$1,654,279.00 in the 2011 Bond Referndum for the Substandard Road Program. TNR's preliminary estimate of the total cost of the project is \$12,000.00. Per the terms of the Participation Agreement, The Association has provided \$2,400.00 in cash to help pay the costs of improving 950 feet of Michael's Cove in the River Cove Subdivision. The Association has also removed the subdivision entrance sign/landscaping awary from the clear zone at an expense of more than \$2,000.

If the project is completed under the estimated amount The Association will be reimbursed its pro-rata share of the savings based upon its financial contribution. In this case, the total estimated amount is \$12,000.00, The Association's financial contribution is \$2,400.00, so The Association's pro-rata share of any savings will be 20%. The county will not reimburse the Association for costs related to the removal of the subdivision entrance sign and landscaping. The county's funds are in account 506-4931-808-8164 and The Association's funds are in account 475-4994-750-8164. The \$12,000.00 has been encumbered on requisition number 534395 and the commodity/sub-commodity codes are 968/054.

LICENSE AGREEMENT

This Agreement is made and entered into by and between Travis County, Texas, (the "COUNTY") and the RIVER COVE HOME OWNERS ASSOCIATION (the "ASSOCIATION"), hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Parties", for the purposes and consideration described herein.

WHEREAS, the ASSOCIATION plans to install, pay expenses, and maintain certain landscaping and improvements in portions of the right-of-way of MICHAEL'S COVE in the Subdivision; and

WHEREAS, the landscaping and improvements include, but are not limited to, an irrigation system, lighting, trees and shrubs (the "Improvements") within portions of the right-of-way of the Subdivision roads, which are not intended or used for vehicular traffic; and

WHEREAS, the area of the right-of-way within which the Improvements are to be installed and/or maintained (the "Licensed Property") is described in the Exhibit "A", which is attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes;

NOW, THEREFORE, the COUNTY and the ASSOCIATION agree as follows:

I. Grant

Subject to the conditions in this Agreement and to the extent of the right, title and interest of the COUNTY in and to the Licensed Property and without any express or implied warranties, the COUNTY grants to the ASSOCIATION permission to use the Licensed Property to construct, maintain and repair the Improvements existing in the Licensed Property as of the date of this Agreement.

II. Consideration

The COUNTY and the ASSOCIATION each acknowledge the receipt and sufficiency of good and valuable consideration for the execution of this Agreement, including but not limited to the following:

1. The beautification to be afforded to the community by the Improvements; and

2. The agreement by the ASSOCIATION to provide the below-specified insurance and indemnification in favor of the COUNTY.

III. County's Rights to Licensed Property

- A. This Agreement is expressly subject and subordinate to the present and future right of the COUNTY, its successors, assigns, lessees, grantees, and licensees, to construct, install, establish, maintain, use, operate, and renew any public utility facilities, franchised public facilities, roadways or streets on, beneath or above the surface of the Licensed Property. The COUNTY shall take reasonable measures to prevent damage to any Improvements on the Licensed Property, however, any damage to or destruction of the ASSOCIATION's property by the COUNTY in the exercise of the above-described rights shall be at no charge, cost, claim or liability to the COUNTY, its agents, contractors, officers or employees. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to limit in any way the power of the COUNTY to widen, alter or improve the Licensed Property pursuant to official action by the governing body of the COUNTY or its successors; provided, however, that the COUNTY shall provide the ASSOCIATION with at least thirty (30) days prior written notice of any such contemplated action.
- B. NOTWITHSTANDING ANY PROVISIONS IN THIS AGREEMENT TO THE CONTRARY, THE COUNTY RETAINS THE RIGHT TO ENTER UPON THE LICENSED PROPERTY, AT ANY TIME AND WITHOUT NOTICE, ASSUMING NO OBLIGATION TO THE ASSOCIATION, TO REMOVE ANY OF THE IMPROVEMENTS OR ALTERATIONS THEREOF, WHENEVER SUCH REMOVAL IS DEEMED NECESSARY FOR: (A) EXERCISING THE COUNTY'S RIGHTS OR DUTIES WITH RESPECT TO THE LICENSED PROPERTY; (B) PROTECTING PERSONS OR PROPERTY; OR (C) THE PUBLIC HEALTH OR SAFETY WITH RESPECT TO THE LICENSED PROPERTY.

IV. Insurance

A. The ASSOCIATION shall, at its sole expense, provide extended public liability insurance coverage, written by a company acceptable to the County, licensed to do business in Texas, in the amounts of FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$500,000.00) per occurrence and ONE MILLION DOLLARS (\$1,000,000.00) in the aggregate for property damage and personal injury and death, which coverage may be provided in the form of a rider and/or endorsement to a previously existing insurance policy. Such insurance coverage shall specifically name the COUNTY OF TRAVIS as co-insured or as an additional insured. This insurance coverage shall cover all perils arising out or connected in any way to the activities of the ASSOCIATION, its officers, employees, agents or contractors, relative to this Agreement. The ASSOCIATION shall be responsible for any deductibles stated in the policy. A true copy of each instrument affecting such additional coverage shall be delivered to the COUNTY'S Executive Manager of Transportation & Natural Resources Department within twenty-one (21) days of the effective date of this Agreement.

B. The ASSOCIATION shall not cause any insurance to be canceled nor permit any insurance to lapse. All insurance certificates shall include a clause to the effect that the policy shall not be canceled, reduced, restricted or otherwise limited until thirty (30) days after the COUNTY has received written notice as evidenced by a return receipt of registered or certified mail.

V. Indemnification

To the extent permitted by Texas law, the ASSOCIATION agrees to and shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the COUNTY and its officers, agents and employees against all claims, suits, demands, judgments, expenses, including attorney's fees, or other liability for personal injury, death, or damage to any person or property, which arises from or is in any manner connected to or caused in whole or in part by the ASSOCIATION's construction, maintenance or use of the Licensed Property. This indemnification provision, however, shall not apply to any claims, suits, damages, costs, losses or expenses (i) for which the COUNTY shall have been compensated by insurance provided under Paragraph IV, above, or (ii) arising solely from the negligent or willful acts of the COUNTY, provided that for the purposes of the foregoing, the COUNTY'S act of entering into this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a "negligent or willful act".

VI. Conditions

- A. Compliance with Regulations. The ASSOCIATION agrees that all construction, maintenance and repair permitted by this Agreement shall be done in compliance with all applicable City, County, State and/or Federal policies, traffic, building, health and safety ordinances, laws and regulations.
- B. ASSOCIATION's Responsibilities. The ASSOCIATION will be responsible for any damage to or relocation of existing facilities required by the construction of the improvements. Further, the ASSOCIATION shall reimburse the COUNTY for all reasonable costs incurred by the COUNTY in replacing or repairing any property of the COUNTY or of others which was damaged or destroyed as a result of activities under this Agreement by or on behalf of the ASSOCIATION.
- C. Maintenance. The ASSOCIATION shall maintain the Licensed Property by keeping the area free of debris and litter. The removal of dead, or dying, plants shall also be handled by the ASSOCIATION at its expense.
- D. Removal or Modification. The ASSOCIATION agrees that removal or modification of any improvements now existing or to be later replaced shall be at the ASSOCIATION's sole discretion, except where otherwise provided by this Agreement. This Agreement, until its expiration or revocation, shall run as a covenant on the land on the above-described real property, and the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be binding on any successors and assigns in interest to the ASSOCIATION or the COUNTY. A written memorandum of this agreement shall be filed in the Official Public Records of Travis County, Texas.

- E. Security Deposit. The ASSOCIATION shall provide the COUNTY with cash in a cashier's check in the amount of <u>One hundred</u> AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$ 100, 000). Cash provided to the COUNTY will be deposited with the County Treasurer and interest, on the amount, will be paid to the ASSOCIATION, on an annual basis upon the receipt by the Treasurer of a letter requesting such interest. The only condition to a draft on the cash security shall be a letter from the Travis County Judge indicating that the ASSOCIATION has not fulfilled its obligations under this Agreement and that the COUNTY has incurred or will incur expenses with regard to the Improvements located on, upon or in the Licensed Property.
- F. Default. In the event that the ASSOCIATION fails to maintain the Licensed Property, then the COUNTY shall give the ASSOCIATION written notice thereof by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, to the addresses set forth below. The ASSOCIATION shall have thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of such notice to take action to remedy the failure complained of and, if the ASSOCIATION does not satisfactorily remedy the same within the thirty (30) day period, the COUNTY may, at the COUNTY'S option, perform the work or contract for the completion of the work. In addition, the ASSOCIATION agrees to pay, within thirty (30) days of written demand by the COUNTY, all reasonable costs and expenses incurred by the COUNTY in completing the work.

VII. Commencement; Termination by Abandonment

This Agreement shall begin on the date of full execution and continue thereafter for so long as the Licensed Property shall be used for the purposes set forth herein, unless terminated under other provisions of this Agreement. If the ASSOCIATION abandons the use of all or any part of the Licensed Property for such purposes set forth in this Agreement, then this Agreement, as to such portion or portions abandoned, shall expire and terminate following thirty (30) days written notice by the COUNTY to the ASSOCIATION, if such abandonment has not been remedied by the ASSOCIATION within such period. The COUNTY shall thereafter have the same title to the Licensed Property so abandoned as though this Agreement had never been made and shall have the right to enter on the Licensed Property and terminate the rights of the ASSOCIATION, its successors and assigns hereunder. All installations of the ASSOCIATION not removed shall be deemed property of the COUNTY as of the time abandoned.

VIII. Termination

- A. Termination by the ASSOCIATION. The ASSOCIATION may terminate this Agreement by delivering written notice of termination to the COUNTY not later than thirty (30) days before the effective date of termination. If the ASSOCIATION so terminates, then it may remove installations, that it made, from the Licensed Property, within the thirty (30) day notice period. Any installations not removed within said period are agreed to be the property of the COUNTY.
- B. Termination by County. The COUNTY may revoke this Agreement at any time, if such revocation is reasonably required by the public interest, after providing at least thirty (30) days prior written notice to the ASSOCIATION. Subject to prior written

notification to the ASSOCIATION or its successors in interest, this Agreement is revocable by the COUNTY if:

- 1. The Improvements, or a portion of them, interfere with the COUNTY'S use of the Licensed Property;
- 2. Use of the Licensed Property becomes necessary for a public purpose;
- 3. The Improvements, or a portion of them, constitute a danger to the public, which the COUNTY deems not to be remediable by alteration or maintenance of such Improvements;
- 4. Despite thirty (30) days written notice to the ASSOCIATION, maintenance or alteration necessary to alleviate a danger to the public has not been made; or
- 5. The ASSOCIATION fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, the insurance requirements specified herein.

If the ASSOCIATION abandons or fails to maintain the Licensed Property, and the COUNTY receives no substantive response within thirty (30) days following written notification to the ASSOCIATION, then this Agreement shall terminate and the COUNTY may remove and/or replace all Improvements or a portion thereof and collect from ASSOCIATION the COUNTY'S actual expenses incurred in connection therewith.

IX. Eminent Domain

If eminent domain is exerted on the Licensed Property by paramount authority, then the COUNTY will, to the extent permitted by law, cooperate with the ASSOCIATION to effect the relocation of the ASSOCIATION's affected installations at the ASSOCIATION's sole expense. The ASSOCIATION shall be entitled to retain all monies paid by the condemning authority for its installations taken, if any.

X. Interpretation

In the event of any dispute over its meaning or application, this Agreement shall be interpreted fairly and reasonably and neither more strongly for or against either party.

XI. Application of Law

This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas. If the final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction invalidates any part of this Agreement, then the remaining parts shall be enforced, to the extent possible, consistent with the intent of the Parties as evidenced by this Agreement.

XII. Venue

TO THE EXTENT ALLOWED BY TEXAS LAW, IT IS AGREED THAT VENUE FOR ALL LAWSUITS CONCERNING THIS AGREEMENT WILL BE IN TRAVIS COUNTY, TEXAS. THIS AGREEMENT CONCERNS REAL PROPERTY LOCATED IN TRAVIS COUNTY, TEXAS, AND IS WHOLLY PERFORMABLE IN TRAVIS COUNTY.

XIII. Covenant Running with Land

This License Agreement and all of the covenants herein shall run with the land; therefore, the conditions set forth herein shall inure to and bind each party's successors and assigns.

XIV. Assignment

The ASSOCIATION shall not assign, sublet or transfer its interest in this Agreement without the written consent of the COUNTY. If such consent is granted, it shall then be the duty of the ASSOCIATION, its successors and assigns, to give prompt written notice to the COUNTY of any assignment or transfer of any of the ASSOCIATION's rights in this Agreement, giving name, date, address and contact person.

XV. Notice

Any notice and/or statement, required or permitted hereunder, shall be deemed to be given and delivered by depositing same in the United States mail, certified with return receipt requested, postage prepaid, addressed to the appropriate party at the following addresses or at such other addresses specified by written notice delivered in accordance herewith:

Any other references to COUNTY employees shall be construed to mean the analogous CITY employee or officer.



"Community prosecution focuses on targeted areas that involve a long-term, proactive partnership among the prosecutor's office, law enforcement, the community and public and private organizations, whereby the authority of the prosecutor's office is used to solve problems, improve public safety and enhance the quality of life."

American Prosecutors Research Institute

History/Goals of the Downtown Neighborhood DA Initiative:

The Travis County District Attorney's (TCDA) Downtown Neighborhood District Attorney Initiative (Downtown NDA) began in January 2002 with a Community Prosecution Leadership grant through the U.S. Department of Justice's Bureau of Justice Assistance. The goals of the project include to:

- Enhance the quality of life;
- Reduce crime;
- Enhance criminal justice processes;
- Partner with community stakeholders; and
- Enhance offender reentry processes in the downtown community.

The role of the Downtown NDA includes activities such as:

- developing opportunities to create partnerships with criminal justice and community stakeholders that will lead to enhancing the safety and quality of life downtown;
- providing assistance in development of effective investigative and search and arrest processes that lead to court-ready cases being filed;
- Working with key stakeholders on development of strategies that impact safety and quality of life downtown; and
- serving as a link to trial courts to effectively communicate issues to prosecutors that impact the downtown community and leads to effective dispositions of cases.

Since 2003, the Downtown NDA program has been a public-private collaboration that includes funding from Travis County, City of Austin and the Downtown Austin Alliance. The donations from the Downtown Austin Alliance and the funding provided through an interlocal agreement with the City of Austin have allowed the District Attorney's Office to continue dedicating an Assistant District Attorney (ADA) to this cooperative program. The donations and interlocal funds are used to hire temporary staff to assist in covering the other responsibilities of the ADA position.

In February of 2010, Travis County Assistant District Attorney Jason English was assigned as the Downtown Neighborhood District Attorney. Other key TCDA staff that participate in various programs and initiatives connected to the Downtown NDA program include: John Neal (TCDA First Assistant District Attorney), Dayna Blazey (Director of TCDA Strategic Prosecution Division), Buddy Meyer (Director of TCDA Trial Bureau), Robert Smith (Director of TCDA Courts Division) and Darla Gay (TCDA Planning Manager for Community Justice Programs).

Downtown Crime Trends:

The geographical area covered by the Downtown NDA is the Austin Police Department's Downtown Area Command. In January of 2011, the Austin Police Department readjusted/reorganized their police sector boundaries and the boundaries for the Downtown Area Command policing sector (George Sector) were changed. The new boundary lines are: **South---**Town Lake, **North—12**th Street (west of IH 35) and 11th Street (east of IH 35, **West—**Lamar Blvd, and **East—**Chicon).

Because of the APD boundary changes and reorganization, the Austin Police Department crime analysts adjusted the 2010 crime statistics for comparison purposes for their month to month comparisons for 2010 and 2011. The comparisons are for the current geographic area for 2010 data. As of October 2011, the Austin Police Department reported:

• City-wide¹:

- Violent crime is down 7% while property crime is down 9% city-wide (when compared to the same time period in 2010).
- Narcotic offenses are down 12.1% and weapons violations are down 10.5% city wide.

George Sector²:

- During the same time period, George Sector experienced a 31% increase in violent crime with Robbery and Aggravated Assault offenses as the major drivers for the increase.
- Property crime in George Sector increased 14% with residential burglaries and thefts as the drivers of this increase.
- Narcotic offenses were down 19% and weapons violations were down 9% in George Sector.

Downtown NDA Highlighted Initiatives During FY 2011:

During FY 2011, there were several key initiatives that were launched or continued within the Downtown NDA program:

5th Street Initiative:

(Oct. 2010-April 2011)

Goal:

To provide targeted prosecution strategies for selected felony offenses that occur in a Downtown 5th Street Neighborhood (5th Street from Brazos to IH 35 West Frontage Road)

Activities:

- Attended community meetings to keep neighborhood informed.
- Met with key individual stakeholders to review results and discuss initiative.
- Tracked cases through the court processes.

Results/Impact:

- Over 20 felony cases were tracked and followed by the Downtown NDA.
- This initiative led to the development of the Downtown Crime Initiative which broadened the geographic area served and enhanced goals (see below).

Reentry Planning for Homeless, Mentally III Frequent Offender Initiative

(January 2011-Current)

Goal:

To develop a reentry plan for a mentally ill frequent offender in the downtown community as he exits the Texas Department of Corrections facility

Activities:

- Analyzed arrest/jail use and cost history of the frequent offender (Since 2000: TDCJ: \$112,637 and Travis County Jail: \$94,330).
- Convened/engaged more than 30 persons representing 12 organizations to help develop a reentry plan and discuss current reentry planning processes for mentally ill offenders including:

Austin Travis County Integral Care (ATCIC), Defense Attorney, Downtown Austin Community Court, Front Steps, TDCJ-Jester Unit, TDCJ-Reentry and Rehabilitation, TDCJ-Travis State Jail Reentry Specialist, TDCJ-State Jail, TDCJ-TCOOMMI, Travis County Criminal Justice Planning, Travis County Court Administration, Travis County DA's Office, Travis County Jail.

- Developed strategies and leveraged resources for a reentry plan including ATCIC engagement/case management at moment of release, transitional housing options, and benefits application supports (he had never been a client of the public mental health system due to his frequent arrest/jail history and so had never received social security benefits).
- Developed re-engagement strategies utilizing Front Steps (homeless shelter),
 Downtown Community Court, Travis County Jail, Travis County Court
 Administration and ATCIC case manager to continue engaging the defendant after his release for services.

Results/Impact:

Although the defendant initially refused to participate in the reentry plan upon his release in March 2011, the partners continue engaging the defendant whenever he enters the jail or Community Court. The same ATCIC case manager attempts to meet with the defendant when he is in custody to establish a relationship with the defendant. The result has been that the defendant is now asking to see the ATCIC case manager when he is in custody and appears to be developing a more trusting relationship which may help us convince him to engage in services, particularly housing.

The initiative helped us recognize disconnects between partners and reinforced how frequent cycling in and out of jail results in some individuals not being engaged in community based mental health services effectively. We are working now in a variety of initiatives to attempt to impact reentry planning for frequent offenders.

Downtown Crime Initiative

(May 2011-Oct. 2011)

Goal:

To improve the quality of life, enjoyment and safety of residents, businesses and visitors to the downtown entertainment area by reduction of drug, violent and public disorder crimes by coordinated, enhanced enforcement, prosecution and communication between the Austin Police Department (APD), Travis County District Attorney's office (TCDA) and residents, businesses and visitors to the area.

Activities:

- Created program/screening criteria:
 - Targeted Felony Offenses: Over 60 felony offenses are included in a list of target cases including offenses related to Part I violent crimes and property crimes as well as Part II offenses including narcotic, prostitution, and weapons-related offenses. In addition the targeted offenses include resisting/evading arrest, retaliation as well as those dealing with tampering with evidence.
 - Geographic Area of Offense: North—10th Street, South— Cesar Chavez, East—Comal Street, and West--North Lamar to Comal Street
 - TCDA NDA will review offense reports referred to our office and make appropriate punishment recommendations on cases (and the NDA may adopt specific cases for personal prosecution).
 - Felony drug offenses to be included in special prosecution initiative will be reviewed by APD and the NDA and factors to be taken in consideration for inclusion in the program include: prior arrest and criminal history, connection to drug dealing, occurrence on street in drug dealing area, quantity of drug, and whether the defendant is a known offender in downtown area.
- Held five planning meetings and with key stakeholders.
- Engaged partners in development of the program including: Austin Police Department, Crime Records Unit of Austin Police Department, Travis County DA's Trial Court Division and Records Division.
- Developed process for tracking cases within the DA's Office in order to monitor outcomes and assess dispositions.

Results/Impact (May 16th, 2011-October 10th, 2011):

- A total of 240 cases have been reviewed and 134 cases accepted for the program.
- 90 cases of the 240 reviewed were rejected for the program with 62% of those cases not meeting criteria for inclusion and 27% for not being within the target area.
- 32 cases have been disposed as of October 10th, 2011:
 - 81% resulted in guilty pleas.
 - Of those guilty pleas, 31% resulted in a sentence to TDCJ-Prison and 27% to TDCJ-State Jail facility (58% to TDCJ total).
 - Of the 32 cases disposed of to date, 47% were related to Possession of a Controlled Substance and 25% related to Delivery of a Controlled Substance.

Other Key Activities of the Downtown NDA Project During FY 2011:

- Downtown Austin Community Court (DACC) Frequent Offender Initiative: During the year, the Travis County DA's Office worked closely with the DACC staff and Advisory Board to develop/enhance their frequent offender initiative which included adding two additional intensive case managers to help focus on the 270 plus individuals who they have identified as their frequent users of their court. Activities included participating in DACC Advisory Court meetings and DACC staff meetings. We also helped connect DACC staff to other conversations/initiatives in the community that could help them link to or leverage additional resources for their clients.
- Caritas' My Chance Program: In the 81st Texas Legislature (2009), funding was approved to launch the Homeless Housing and Support Services Program (HHSP) to the eight largest cities in Texas. The City of Austin received \$1.9 million and used the bulk of those dollars to fund 46 units of permanent supportive housing. Ten of those 46 units were for a direct reentry PSH initiative serving men who were exiting the Travis State Jail who would have been released to the downtown homeless shelter. The program was launched in March of 2010 and all housing was filled by June. Activities by the DA's Office included: assisting Caritas and Crime Prevention Institute (providing in-prison reentry planning services) in developing a working partnership as well as developing a document that summarizes the characteristics of the population being served including previous criminal history as well as re-arrest history for all clients after one year in housing. We also assisted in arranging technical assistance training by the Corporation for Supportive Housing for Caritas, CPI and DACC case managers around managing permanent supportive housing for a reentry population. (FOLLOW UP: During the 82nd Texas Legislature, the HHSP program was not approved in the normal budgeting process. If funding could be found after session, the City of Austin recognized that it would be greatly reduced. Caritas was unable to sustain the My Chance Program and it was formally closed at the end of August 2011. All clients were transferred in to other housing but it did not include the on-site support services offered during the My Chance program.)

- Goodwill Employment Readiness Services in Travis County Jail: The Downtown NDA helped
 coordinate meetings with staff and managers from Goodwill who were attempting to use a grant for
 employment readiness programming to serve inmates of the Travis County Jail. We were able to
 connect Goodwill with Travis County Adult Probation for further conversations for possible services
 to those in the SMART residential treatment program.
- Facilitated Community Meeting Regarding Local Application for a Second Chance Act Federal Grant: In March 2011, the TCDA Community Justice Senior Planner facilitated a community forum regarding a possible application from our community for a BJA Second Chance Act. Goodwill partnered with Crime Prevention Institute for an application for mentoring and reentry planning services within the Travis County Jail and the Travis State Jail. In August, BJA announced that Goodwill did receive a \$220,000 grant award and efforts are underway to launch the program.


