## **AGENDA LANGUAGE:**

Consider and Take Appropriate Action to Approve a Request from Travis County Health and Human Services and Veterans Service to Use Grant Money from The Children's Continuum to Send Staff from Partner Agencies to a Two-day Training in Austin, Texas.

# **BACKGROUND/SUMMARY OF REQUEST AND ATTACHMENTS:**

In FY2012, Travis County received a grant in the amount of \$550,000 from the US Department of Justice's Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention to enhance the Travis County Drug Treatment Court. Since that time, the Court has sought to provide judicial oversight for parents with substance dependency issues who are involved in the child welfare system by providing resources through a child welfare case worker and a Court Appointed Special Advocate for the children. Attending the proposed training in partnership with The Children's Continuum, a program funded through the grant, will enable case workers to identify a child's needs, take steps for immediate intervention and set up a monitoring system for the welfare of the child.

## **STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS:**

Staff recommends that the Court authorize Travis County and partner agency staff to attend this conference.

## **ISSUES AND OPPORTUNITIES:**

Attending the conference will allow staff from Travis County and partner agencies to develop skills that will help them be more effective serving

## **Proposed Motion:**

Consider and take appropriate action to approve a request from Travis County Health and Human Services and Veterans Service to use grant money from The Children's Continuum to send staff from partner agencies to a two-day training in Austin.

# **Summary and Staff Recommendations:**

TCHHSVS received a \$550,000 grant in FY'12 from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention to enhance the Travis County Family Drug Treatment Court. The Travis County Family Drug Treatment Court (TCFDTC) was established in the fall of 2007 as a specialized docket managed by the 126<sup>th</sup> District Court. The aim is to provide judicial oversight for parents with substance dependency issues who are involved in the child welfare system. Although all children involved with the TCFDTC receive monitoring by a child welfare case worker and Court Appointed Special Advocate, these children, unlike their parents, are not provided with a consistent assessment nor are they connected to an easy to navigate continuum of services.

The grant funds a program, known as The Children's Continuum, that allows early identification of a child's needs, immediate intervention and monitoring. Partners in the program include the Travis County Civil District Courts, Travis County Health and Human Services and Veterans Service, Travis County Child Protective Services, Court Appointed Special Advocates of Travis County (CASA), Austin Recovery, Foundation Communities, the Travis County District Attorney's Office, Casey Family Programs, the Texas Department of State Health Services, and Court Appointed Family Advocates, among others.

There will be five people attending the conference: three from Travis County, one from Child Protective Services, and one from CASA.

## **Budgetary and Fiscal Impact:**

The early bird cost for registration is \$319.19 per person. The regular price is \$349.99 per person.

## **Issues and Opportunities:**

Attending the conference will allow staff from Travis County and the partner agencies to develop skills that will help them be more effective in serving children.

## **Background:**

The purpose of the Family Drug Court Programs run by the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) in the U.S. Department of Justice is to build the capacity of states, state and local courts, units of local government, and federally recognized Indian tribal governments to either implement new drug courts or enhance existing drug courts for substance-dependent adults involved with the court as a result of child abuse and neglect issues. Applicants must provide services to the children of the parents in the program as well as to the parents. The program provides seed money, not long-term support. OJJDP expects successful applicants to develop and implement a sustainability plan during the grant period to continue operation of the family drug court when the grant ends.

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This two-day seminar delivers the bio-psycho-social aspects of traumatic stress, traumatic grief, & traumatic loss. Mental health professionals are on the front lines and, in many cases, have the initial contact with the individuals) who has experienced traumatic stress. Clinicians are routinely called upon to serve survivors of major disasters, war, childhood physical and sexual trauma, rape, violent crime, and other forms of traumatic events. Participation in this workshop leads to a holistic and systemic understanding of traumatic stress and provides skills for immediate use in a variety of clinical settings.

How people respond to traumatic stress is an individual matter based on a number of factors including psychological, emotional, social, cultural, biological, spiritual, and familial. Key approaches and interventions include:

- Crisis intervention

## Speaker

Michael G. Rank, Ph.D. is a tenured associate professor at the University of South Florida (USF). School of Social Work and an international scholar and researcher. He is a decorated Vietnam veteran, having served as a combat infantryman in the US. Army between 1969-1970. Michael directed Family Advocacy and Children Have a Potential (CHAP) programs for the United States Air Force; was a team leader for the Veterans Administration Vet Center program; and was a director of employee assistance programs for Family Service America. In addition to the clinical services required by each of these positions, he also maintained a private practice specializing in treating stress and anasety disorders.

Michael has researched, published, and presented seminars and workshops about veterans issues, treating veterans and their families, the psychological effects of biological and chemical disasters, critical incident stress debriefing, traumatic stress, posttraumatic stress disorder and compassion fatigue. Most notably he completed an investigation of the experiences of survivors of traumatic stress in three countries. Nicaragua, the Dominican Republic, and selected counties in South Tiolida which was funded by the Office of Naval Research through the USF Center for Disaster Management and Humanitarian Assistance. He has also created a biotecrorism training protocol for mental health preparedness funded by the Department of the Army.

Michael received his doctorate in Social Work Education from the University of South Carolina, his master's degree in Social Work from Bryn Mawr College, and his B.A. in Sociology from Bloomsburg University.
