Summary of Recommendations for Substantial Amendment to CDBG PY09-13 Action Plans & PY11-13 Action Plan

Over the last two years, several projects have had cost savings and those funds need to be allocated for another purpose. Furthermore, due to slow spending, HUD reduced the PY13 Action Plan funding by 5%. Consequently, a substantial amendment must occur to notify the public of the proposed changes and uses of funding and the current Consolidated Plan must be updated to reflect any changes to goals.

PY13 Action Plan

In August 2013, the Travis County Commissioner Court approved submission of the PY13 Action Plan based on a planned allocation of \$909,925. Due to issues with timely spending of funds, HUD reduced the PY13 allocation by 5%.

Amendments to the PY09-12 Action Plans

Project Savings

Over several program years, project savings have been identified. The chart below summarizes the project savings and reasons the projects did not spend all of its funding. Project savings are defined as funds available after a project's completion.

Staff recommends the project savings in the PY09-PY12 Action Plans, outlined in Figure 2 above, be reallocated to the following projects outlined in Figure 3 below.

Alternate Projects

In July 2010, the Travis County Commissioners Court approved an amendment to the Citizen Participation Plan to allow for a list of alternate projects to be provided in the Annual Action Plan. This amendment provides the framework to allow the opportunity to have a list of projects that have the potential to be implemented quickly should a funded CDBG project experience cost savings, delays or barriers to completion.

Alternate Projects will contain the same level of information that funded projects contain to ensure appropriate review by the public. Approval by the Travis County Commissioners Court will be necessary to replace a funded project with an alternate or to fund an alternate with cost savings from a completed project regardless of whether or not the increase or decrease exceeds 25 percent. These actions will not require a

substantial amendment since the alternate projects will have gone through a public review process saving 60 to 90 days prior to fund reallocation.

In the event that the projects identified in this substantial amendment (affecting the PY09-PY13 Action Plans) are delayed, canceled, or are performed at a lower cost than the budgeted amount, the Travis County CDBG program plans to pursue one or more of the alternate project listed in Figure 4.
